Work Progressing On 2 Dams, 4 More To Be Let

Construction on two retention dams is now underway in the Cross Plains area and contracts will be let this month for four more.

Presently being built are

flood control projects west of Cottonwood. One of the dams is on land owned by the Coats heirs, Floyd Odell and Claude Joy. The other is on land owned by the Evans heirs.

Due for letting at Temple Friday are two more projects. They are those numbered eight and nine. Eight is on land owned by Damon D. Jones, formerly known as the Moore place, southwest of Cottonwood. Project number nine is on the Oliver D. Worthy place, one mile north of Cross Plains.

Scheduled for contract letting April 20 are two more dams. They are those numbered 10 and 12 on the Soil Conservation Service's area program. Site 10 is on the C. B. Edington, Mrs. Annie Davis and Oliver Freeman places. Site 12 is on land owned by Edington, Mrs. Augusta Koenig, E. C. Koenig and D. B. Bludworth. All are southwest of Cross Plains, just over in Brown County.

Ultimately 12 dams will be built along the watershed of Turkey Creek to retard the runoff of flood waters. In addition soil building practices are being instituted along headlands as a means of further curtailing water runoff.

The projects to be built just inside the Brown County line, those numbered 10 and 12, call for 265,000 cubic yards of fill, 530 cubic yards of quarried rock to be compacted and 470 feet of 24 inch concrete pipe to be installed at spillways.

Construction is still in initial stages on the first two projects in the Cottonwood area. However, additional machinery arrived last week and work is expected to accelerate immediately.

Award \$15,000 Contract To Improve Jail Building

Callahan County's present jail building will be remodeled. That decision was made by the Commissioners Court at Baird Friday. Total cost of the renovation project will be \$15,000, exactly the amount approved by voters in a bond election last July.

After the bond was voted sentiment arose in various parts of the county for building a new jail as opposed to repairing the old. Commis-

sioners advertised for bids on that proposition, however, costs exceeded available funds. First bids on repairing the old jail were also more than available money, however, the low bidder, Fred Williams Construction Company, Abilene, reworked estimates and shaved the total to \$15,000.

Work on the project will begin soon, said County Commissioner Claude Foster to this newspaper yesterday.

Wayne Gibbens Outlines His Legislative Viewpoint

Wayne Gibbens, State Representative and Democrat from Stephens County, today issued his formal statement of candidacy for a second term to the Texas House of Representatives from the newly-created 63rd Legislative District, composed of Callahan, Eastland, Palo Pinto, Shackelford and Stephens Counties.

Prior to election to the House in 1960, Gibbens obtained his B.A. degree in government from Texas Tech in Lubbock, where he was a nationally recognized scholar and leader. He is also a graduate of Breckenridge High School and has attended the University of Texas Law School. Rep. Gibbens is a member of the Lions Club, the Chamber of Commerce, and is quite active in all civic affairs. Gibbens is an active member of the First Baptist Church of Breckenridge where he has taught a high school boys' Sunday School Class.

Gibbens prefaced his announcement with a statement that he would seek this office on the merits of his past record of performance and his positive program of progress for Texas. Gibbens said, "I shall conduct a hard, vigorous campaign, but will not resort to smear tactics."

Gibbens proposed a 10-point program for the new 63rd District and Texas:

1. Revision of the state Sales Tax to remove all the inequities and to lower the cost of administration and remove the burdens of collection.
2. Enactment of small loan

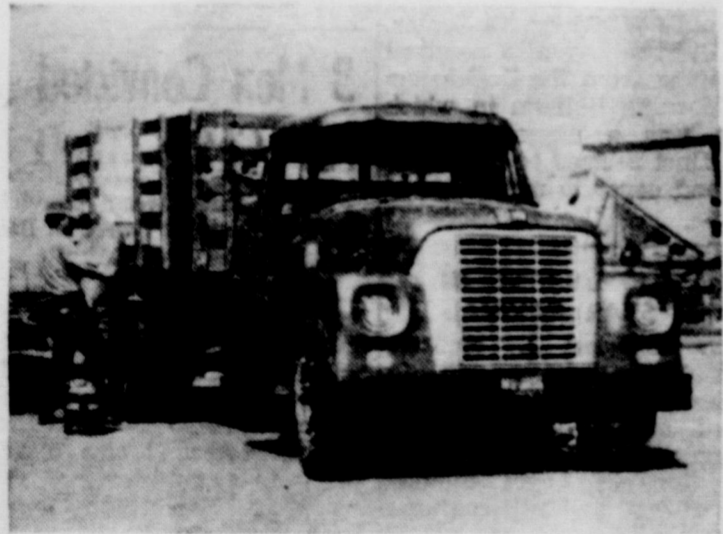

regarding the question as to whether or not Cross Plains should request the federal government to contract for a post office building, the count was "yes" by four to

of the Cross Plains went on record as being in favor of law enforcement. To the question, "Do you believe law enforcement should be stronger, weaker or is

about right," only one said "weaker." The count was exactly equal between those replying "stronger" and "presently o. k." One person recommended adding another daytime officer and one other suggested a group discussion on the proposition by sober minded citizens.

To the question, "Do you believe deed records and other vital papers in the courthouse should be periodically microfilmed and stored elsewhere as a safeguard against catastrophe," local people said yes by seven to one. No one questioned the cost.

Sentiment here is about three to one against Texas statutes which permit "wet" precincts in "dry" counties. One person simply marked his ballot, "It's here," obviously referring to alcoholic beverages. One other commented, "Should be all wet or all dry."

Returns favored a new city charter being drafted by a tally of four to one. Let's bring it up to date, make it simple and enforceable, were comments which accompanied the questionnaires.

On the question as to whether or not a park, including a swimming pool should be built here for youngsters, the count was "yes" three to one. One responder qualified his answer with these words: "If we have the water, yes."

Almost a unanimity of opinion was found in the proposition as to whether or not the City of Cross Plains

should begin now a long-range study, designed to improve water, gas and sewer facilities. Responders said "yes" by better than 20 to one.

Opinion was 12 to one that merchants should combine to modernize store fronts and better light Main Street.

Sentiment favored subsidizing the Bookmobile with tax funds by nearly three to one. Some responders voiced strong opposition, however, indicating other things were needed more.

Opinion was nearly two to one that the City Marshal here should be uniformed similar to a Highway Patrolman. One answer indicated that he believed the officer is already attired in a blue outfit.

On the question as to whether Callahan County should build a new jail or repair the old structure, the count was better than two to one in favor of "fixing the old". Numerous comments were penned on questionnaires regarding this matter, however, no particular pattern was observed.

legislation to rid Texas of the name, "Loan Shark State."

3. Legislation to implement and aid law enforcement in Texas including, for example, a juvenile parole system to aid local authorities in the rehabilitation of juvenile delinquents.

4. Water conservation measures to develop the water resources of our area and passage of stringent, but uniform water pollution law.

5. Protection of every Texan's guarantee to the right to choose his job and where he works, by fighting the proposed repeal of our Texas Right to Work Law. The labor lobbyists who are supporting my opponent have made this their number one project.

6. Unemployment compensation legislation to better provide for those families whose breadwinners are honestly out of work, by slashing from this program all those who are too lazy to work and who will not accept a job when made available.

7. Equal rights for women by removing those gross inequities placed in the law years ago.

8. Economy measures such as the one that Gibbens co-sponsored during the last session of the Legislature which would have saved Texas taxpayers \$25,000,000.00 by eliminating waste, extravagance and duplication in our too-many bureaus and agencies.
