## \$1,200 Needed For Band Suits

A total of \$1,200 is reported needed to successfully culminate a drive begun last week to buy 80 new uniforms for Cross Plains High School Buffalo Band.

Raised the first week of campaign was \$1,800. Total cost of the suits—enough to outfit every member of the school's marching band—is said to be

\$6,000. Cross Plains school board launched the recent drive by accepting \$3,000 of the uniform cost from the school's local budget. Public subscriptions this week and the board's commitment brought the aggregate to \$4,800, leaving a deficit of \$1,200 to reach the necessary goal.

Daily water consumption is on the rise in Cross Plains.

Figures on total pumpings for the first 20 days of the month were announced yesterday by Mayor Ted Souder in gallons as follows:

The city is now required to furnish the State Board of Water Engineers with an annual report of water usage here. The report for 1961 showed pumpings for each month as follows: January 1,986,000 gallons, February 1,750,000, March 2,020,000, April 2,524,000, May 2,480,000, June 2,525,000, July 2,621,000, August 3,570,000, September 2,450,000, October 2,012,000, November 1,813,000 and December 1,980,000. Annual consumption for the city was reported at 27,731,000 gallons.

## Grain Harvest About To Begin Over This Area

First wheat and oats from the new crop are expected to be harvested in the Cross Plains area early next week.

Dale Gary, local buyer, said yesterday first sales would probably be made Monday or Tuesday.

Both wheat and oats are opening higher this year than a

year ago. Number one wheat was quoted in Cross Plains yesterday at \$2 per bushel, as compared with \$1.80 in 1961. Present price of oats is 70 cents per bushel. Opening price last year was 60 cents.

Facilities at Gary Mill and Elevator Company are currently being enlarged. Present investment at the firm is said to

be around \$60,000 in buildings and equipment and plans are to eventually double that outlay.

Gary reported Monday that whereas grain purchased last year aggregated \$92,285, they would probably be about \$65,000 this year.

"The crop is about a third shorter," he said.

## Man, 24, Gravely Hurt Here Sunday

Tommy Davidson, 24, of near Cottonwood, was critically injured in a one-car accident three miles south of here just inside the Brown County line Sunday night at six o'clock.

Davidson was driving north, having recently left a group of friends at Brownwood Lake. He apparently lost control of his new Chevrolet on State Highway 279, alongside the Petty place, and the vehicle hurtled a fence and somersaulted before coming to rest 25 feet inside a field.

He was rushed to a Brownwood hospital in a local ambulance, where his condition is said to be grave. Injuries included mangled arms, broken ribs, ruptured diaphragm and hurts about the head. His automobile—only five days old—was demolished.

Highway Patrolman Jerry Mathews, who investigated the accident, said indications pointed to the belief that the car wandered to a shoulder of the road and when the driver attempted to whip back on the pavement the rapid turn threw it into the narrow ditch and over the field fence.

Davidson had been working for General Dynamics in Abilene. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Johnny Davidson, are also employed in Abilene and the three have been commuting. The Davidsons built a new home early this year about two miles west of Cottonwood. Mrs. Davidson is the former Stella Coats, member of one of the well-known families in that locality.

## Outlook For Pecan Crop Below Normal

Pecan growers of the Cross Plains area were reminded yesterday by L. D. Romberg, superintendent of the U. S. Pecan Field Station in Brownwood, that this is an ideal time to spray trees for casebearers, which present a threat to yields.

Outlook for the 1962 pecan crop throughout this section of Texas is sub-normal, experts opine, and infestations may be above average.

## Baird Man, Known Here, Found Dead

Claude (Rabbit) Johnson, 57, field officer for the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee (ASC) office in the courthouse at Baird, was found dead at 6 a. m. Tuesday. He was said to have died in his sleep.

Johnson was well-known in the Cross Plains area, having measured crop acreage on most farms in this part of the county.

He was a native of Baird, having been born there Nov. 19, 1904.

Survivors include his wife, the former Fleta Clark of Clyde; one son, Bill, of Big Spring; a sister, Mrs. R. P. Reeder, also of Big Spring, and a granddaughter.

## Capital Sought For Peanut Dryer Here

Gary Mill and Elevator Company of Cross Plains has applied for a \$40,000 loan from the Small Business Administration, which if granted would be used to install a peanut drying plant here.

Much of the building and incidental equipment is already being readied.

If the loan is granted within the next 60 days, Dale Gary, owner of the firm, told this newspaper yesterday that he will have the peanut drying equipment ready for use by the last of September.

## Annual Audit Shows City In Good Financial Shape

Annual audit of the City of Cross Plains, which was completed May 17 by Charles F. Hemphill of Albany, public accountant, has been delivered to members of the City Council for study.

The report reflects the municipality in a stronger financial condition than possibly ever before in history. Total bonded debt is currently listed at \$40,000, having been reduced \$4,000 in the past 12 months.

Total revenue received by the city during the fiscal year, which ended April 1, was \$66,607.00 an increase of \$3,890.84 over the year before.

Gas, water and sewer revenues rose to \$54,673.30 during the year, an increase of \$5,202-

13. Franchise taxes were nothing last year as compared with \$1,841.52 the year before. Penalties and interest were \$287.83, increase of \$117.75. Total tax collections amounted to \$10,576.02, an increase of \$138.45 over the year before. Miscellaneous and paving costs were \$134.40, a drop of \$52.42. Receipts from street lighting fell \$12 to \$327. Dividends from public scales remained unchanged at \$60, as did rent received at \$210.

Total expenses of the city were \$50,222.00, a drop of \$692.23 over the year before.

Hemphill's report complimented the efficient bookkeeping methods being practiced in the city office.

## Screwworms Will Remain Problem For Cattle Herds

Although headway has been made in a statewide fight on screwworms, local ranchers can expect continued trouble from the expensive pests.

Callahan County Agent Travis Allen reported Tuesday that four samples taken from separate sections of Callahan County and sent to scientists at Mission, Tex., had been definitely identified as screwworms, indicating that the menace is not yet removed from local herds.

Of the four samples, one each taken in the Putnam, Baird, Clyde and Eula areas, positive identification of screwworms was made. A sample sent from the Cross Plains area was identified as maggots, with no screwworms present.

"As these cases come from

all parts of the county it is pretty well established that we will have screwworm cases in all sections," Allen said.

The following advice to livestock owners was given by Allen, who said that complete eradication is definitely within the realm of possibility if close vigilance is exercised by herds-men.

"Every livestock owner is urged to give immediate attention to any case of worms he discovers. Killing out a case of screwworms rapidly can eliminate the danger of hundreds of other cases later. Each rancher and farmer is still urged to send samples of any suspicious cases to P. O. Box 969, Mission, Tex., or bring them to the County Agent's office at the courthouse in Baird."

## Social Security Checks For County Run \$43,118 Monthly

Bahian County showed an increase of 16.1 per cent in the number of monthly social security checks from Dec. 1960 to Dec. 1961, according to figures just released by R. R. Tuley, district manager for Social Security Administration at Abilene.

One hundred and eighty-six checks for \$43,118 in retirement benefits were paid in December 1961, compared with 155 checks for \$37,548 in retirement benefits in December 1960. There were 11 others received from disability claims.

One hundred and seventy-seven checks for \$4,995 from a retired or deceased person were paid in December 1961, compared with 177 checks for \$4,493 from claims on a dependent. One hundred and

thirty-two widows, dependent widowers, and parents received \$7,140.

At the present time, social security benefits total over a billion dollars a month to just over seventeen million beneficiaries. Tuley gave these reasons for the rise in beneficiaries: (1) more persons in the aged group, (2) age qualification now 62 instead of 65, and (3) less social security credit now needed for eligibility to retirement or survivors benefits.

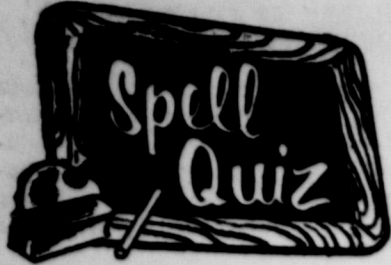
