The report for 1961 showed pumpings for each month as follows: January 1,986,000 gallons, February 1,750,000, March 2,020,000, April 2,524,000, May 2,480, 000, June 2,525,000, July 2,621,000, August 3,570,000, September 2,450,000, October 2,012,000, November 1. 813,000 and December 1, 980,000. Annual consumption for the city was reported at 27,731,000 gallons.


