Several months ago at Waxahachie, he secured the conviction of Oscar Kernohan for a triple murder in Pecos after a change of venue was granted. Kernohan, who was represented by Ellis County Judge Melvin Hartsfield and Billy Colvin of Ennis, was sentenced to

three separate 99-year terms. McGowen was born in Santa Anna and reared in Monahans, where his late father was in the real estate and insurance business. His mother teaches school in Monahans now.

McGowen spent five years in the insurance business there after earning a business administration degree and an Army Reserve commission from Texas A&M in 1949.

He was married the same year and he and his wife now have two sons, ages 11 and 9. "I had to work for five years

He received his law degree from the University of Texas in 1956. His successful race for district attorney in 1960 was his first venture into politics. 
