It was with a feeling of nostalgia that many persons read in the Review last week of the disbanding of the little Baptist Church at Rowden.

The folding of little churches such as that is symbolic of the times. Emphasis is on numbers and consolidation. As people have migrated from the rural areas, the few left behind have faced an unbearable burden to maintain the focal points of community and spiritual life. Such a fate was inevitable.

It was more than 40 years ago — the little Rowden church was painted brown and located a mile farther north than — that Calvin Miller, Voncille Gibbs and a communist slipped away from services one Sabbath morning and raided a near-by water melon patch. In the shade of a large oak, enjoying the freshness of a melon fresh from the vine, the boys could hear the congregation singing that old hymn "Little Church in the Wilderness." Always, through the intervening four decades, that song seemed specially written for the little Rowden church. News of its disbandment was like the passing of a childhood friend.

Few people look good on television. Most appear aged, half sick unless highly made up for the bright klieg lights which the electronic master requires.

Baird Liquor Vote Set For January 5

An election to vote on legalizing the sale of all alcoholic beverages for off-premises consumption has been set in Baird for Jan. 5.

Members of Callahan County Commissioners Court ordered the election Monday after a petition bearing the signatures of 161 qualified voters asking the referendum was formally submitted. A minimum of 150 signers had been previously announced as a requirement.

Baird was wet when the county voted dry July 31, 1941. A recent interpretation by the Texas Supreme Court held that there could be wet precincts in dry counties, the same as there can be dry precincts in wet counties. It is this ruling that

makes the forthcoming election possible.

When Callahan County went dry in 1941 the vote at Baird was 389 for continuing the sale of 3.2 beer and 170 against.

Another county-wide beer election was held the following year—March 21, 1942—at which time an effort was made to legalize the sale of 14 per cent beer. That effort was defeated in the county by more than two to one, however, Baird was again wet by a count of 389 to 291. By coincidence the same number of wet votes—389—was polled in both elections, however, in the second referendum the dry forces picked up 121 in the Baird precinct.

In the last county-wide election on the beer question only

the Baird, Hart and Belle Plain boxes were wet. All others were dry with the overall count being 1,735 against beer and 738 for the beverage.

There has been no countywide election on the sale of hard liquors in the past 40 years.

16 Teams From 9 Schools Play In Cage Tourney Here

A field of 16 teams, eight boys and eight girls, representing nine schools, will open the Cross Plains High School Invitational Basketball Tournament here this afternoon, Thursday.

Both boys and girls teams from Cross Plains, Bangs, Early, Baird, Eula, Talpa and Santa Anna will tangle on the local hardwood and Coleman girls and Ballinger boys are entered in the three-day affair.

According to a schedule released by local school authorities, six games will be played Thursday and Friday afternoons and evenings. Eight games are on tap Saturday.

Initial action will be furnished by the Bangs and Early girls at 3 p.m. Thursday, followed by the boys quintets from the same schools at 4:15. At 5:30 p.m. the Baird and Eula girls tangle, and at 6:45 Baird and Eula boys meet.

The two host teams will provide the late play opening night with the Buffettes playing Coleman and the Buffaloes taking on Ballinger at 8 o'clock and 9:15 respectively.

First round eliminations continue Friday afternoon also beginning at 3. Second bout games start at 5:30 with the consolation girls bracket leading the way. Four games Saturday morning.

ing will finish furnishing finalists for Saturday night's four title games. Saturday evening's entertainment, which will produce the winners, runners-up and consolation winners, will tipoff at 5:30 with the girls consolation game.

Trophies will be presented to the three finalist teams in both divisions and a boys and a girls all-tournament team will be selected. Special awards will be presented to coaches of the three winning teams in each bracket in ceremonies following the final game Saturday night.

Buff coach Bill Gunn sees Talpa and Bangs as the top threats to carry off the title in the boys class, and Buffette tutor Terry Watkins said Tuesday that Baird and Coleman looked to be the strongest in the female bracket.

Admission is 25 cents for students and 50 cents for adults for each session.

\$42,000 Rest Home Assured

A modern, 30-room rest home, to cost \$42,000 loomed as a virtual certainty for Cross Plains yesterday as a committee of business and professional men pledged \$1,000 for land to be donated as a building site.

Mayor Ted Souder and Fred Tunnell negotiated with Mrs. Tom Bryant for six lots, which

had been previously approved as a site for the project, and transfer papers are now being drawn. Site is in the Tom Bryant Sub-division to the City of Cross Plains, located at the east end of 14th Street.

The rest home is to be built by Heritage Homes of Dallas and a representative of that corpora-

tion told Souder Monday that actual construction would begin within two days after legal paper work is completed. The building site has been staked and machinery will level the ground this week.

Plans call for the building to be so constructed that additions may be made later in conformity with the overall design.

Contact with the rest home builders was made by Souder and an agreement reached whereby the Dallas firm would build and operate a nursing home here if the land could be donated by the city or local civic groups. The mayor called business and professional men into meeting and received their guarantee of funds to purchase the approved property. Committees are now at work raising the \$1,000 and indications yesterday were that the total would be achieved by Saturday.

"Persons who feel that the rest home will be a valuable addition to our town and are willing to donate toward procurement of the site are asked to leave contributions with me, or at the Citizens State Bank," Souder said.

Know Sewing Machine? Age No Barrier To Jobs

Persons who have had experience on sewing machines, regardless of age, are being asked to sign up at the City Hall here Saturday for possible employment with a garment factory, said to be considering locating in Cross Plains.

Mayor Ted Souder reported yesterday that 61 persons registered last Saturday.

The first call was for persons under 40 years of age. The present request for registration includes unskilled workers under 40 and everyone with sewing machine experience, regardless of age.

A representative of the garment manufacturer will be at the City Hall from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Saturday and potential workers are asked to register during these hours.

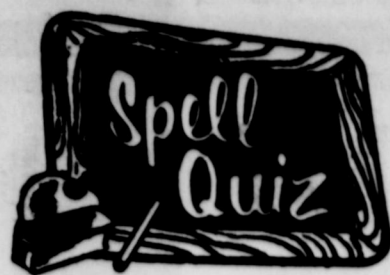
