Each of the five Callahan County communities will utilize its school cafeteria as site for Sunday afternoon vaccinations. Hours will be from one until six.

First round vaccinations were taken by 5.383 persons in Callahan County Sept. 23. Second round vaccinations were given Nov. 11.

It is stressed that all residents of the five Callahan County school districts - not necessarily residens of the county itself - should take the vaccination Sunday. A donation of 25 cents is requested, however, the drug is free to those unable to contribute.
