Escaped Mental Patient Captured In Cafe Friday

A 27-year-old mental patient, escaped from an Abilene institution, was apprehended in Cross Plains Friday morning.

The man had gone into Jean's Truck Stop Cafe on East Highway 36 to eat, when Deputy Sheriff N. L. Long, Jr. entered the restaurant. The officer noticed the man acted strangely and startled the man and he jumped up and ran outside. Long caught him easily.

He told the officer that his home was in Galveston and that he was returning there from

El Paso, where he'd gone to visit his father. Investigation proved that he had no money to pay for the food he had just eaten in the cafe and Long took him into custody and radioed the State Highway Patrol to see if a mental patient was reported missing. He was immediately advised that a man had escaped from Abilene State School early that morning and was presently being sought. Identification checked and the fugitive was jailed here until officers arrived from Abilene

2 Inch Snow Wets Parched Pastures

Local residents arose Monday morning to find ground covered in the current Winter's first snow. It measured two inches within the town but was said to be heavier in some rural areas.

Despite sub-freezing weather all Cross Plains school buses

operated on schedule and 85 per cent attendance was reported. There were only 80 absentees in the entire system, 72 in elementary grades and eight in high school.

Schools Warm

Custodians at the school had arisen early and rooms and

halls were warm and completely comfortable as students arrived. Lunchroom personnel prepared a noon meal particularly fitting for the weather and school administrators said the day of instruction passed without discomfort or much inconvenience to anyone.

The moisture from Monday morning's snow was the first measurable amount received here since Christmas eve day, S. F. Bond, official Weather Bureau observer, recorded .25, the first precipitation entered in his records in 49 consecutive days.

Falls Numerous

Slips and falls were common on downtown streets Monday morning, however, no one was seriously hurt. Oscar Koenig and Jack Scott were seen taking awkward falls on icy pavement and a Comanche man slipped off the 12-foot-high roof of the Higginbotham store. Mrs. Lloyd Bryan lost her balance Tuesday and fell while walking on Main Street. She, too, was unhurt and jumped up quickly.

Automobiles moved cautiously through city streets with no accidents being reported.

Paul Lutzenberger reported roads near his place north of town especially hazardous. He utilized his farm tractor to help a milk transport truck negotiate a treacherous stretch of unpaved road.

Snow began falling in Cross Plains again at mid-morning Tuesday, however, bright sunshine in the afternoon brought a fast thaw.

Atwell Pavement Given Big Boost

Possibility of a paved road being built from Atwell to intersect with FM Road 880, which runs from Cross Plains to Putnam, were brightened last week as the Texas Highway Department announced that a survey would be made preparatory to programming.

Callahan County Commissioners Court had previously passed a unanimous resolution calling for construction of the road. Although work is not expected to begin any time soon, proponents of the project are delighted with reports that it is being favorably considered and may be included in 1963-64 work plans.

2 Callahan Exhibitors Get \$5,936 In El Paso

Two Callahan County junior livestock exhibitors returned from the El Paso Stock Show last week end with \$5,936.40 jingling in their jeans.

Miss Vicki Finley of Baird had \$4,486.80, representing the sale price of two calves and a lamb, another \$40 in prize money.

Scott Odum of Cross Plains had \$1,305.60, representing the sale price of two calves and another \$44 in cash premiums.

The Callahan County girl showed the first Angus to a

grand championship in history of the El Paso exposition. She also had the reserve champion in the Angus class and the reserve champion lamb.

The Cross Plains boy had the second place winner in the lightweight Angus division and the third place winner among heavyweight Herefords.

Ronnie Edington of Cross Plains had a 14th place winner in the lamb division of the show, however, the animal was not sold at El Paso.

With Money Withdrawn, Bookmobile Quits March 1

The Tri-County Bookmobile, which has served residents of Callahan, Taylor and Shackelford Counties the past two years, will not be continued in this county after Feb. 28.

Whether or not the mobile library service will be maintained in the other two counties has not been immediately learned.

Callahan County Commissioners Court in regular session Monday voted to discontinue \$4,000 annual payment for the Bookmobile's maintenance. During the first two years of operation, the tri-county unit had received \$8,000 annually from

Taylor County, \$4,000 from Callahan and \$2,000 from Shackelford. During this two-year trial period the state had provided the truck and assumed expenses, which officials say approximately equaled the money spent by the three counties.

State support of the local unit is being withdrawn March 1 and the specially-equipped truck will be assigned to another county on a two-year trial basis.

Members of the Commissioners Court expressed themselves as being unwilling to assume additional cost of the Bookmobile's maintenance.

4,388 In County Drink Polio Vaccine Sunday

A total of 4,388 persons took third round vaccinations against polio in Callahan County Sunday. Tabulations from the five communities were:

Make-up vaccinations are continuing all this week in Cross Plains with the drug administered at the office of Dr. Carl J. Sohns and at Neal's Drug Store. It was estimated here Tuesday that Cross Plains' total in the third-round dosing will ultimately pass 1,500. Similar make-up programs are underway in the other four Callahan County communities.

The vaccination in the third round is against Type III polio, said to be the most crippling variety of the dreaded disease.

"Persons who have not yet taken the immunization should do so at once," said Dr. Sohns, city health officer.

County Judge Byron Richardson and Ike Neal expressed deepest gratitude for the community yesterday to the volunteer workers who helped throughout the three programs.

"Such public spiritedness as these people so willingly demonstrated bespeaks the high type of people which inhabit our area," Neal said.

G. W. (Pete) Fore has called a meeting of all farmers and livestock raisers of the Pioneer area to meet in the Community Center building there Saturday night at seven o'clock.

Purpose of the gathering will be to organize that area in the statewide fight for screwworm eradication.

Fore told the Review yesterday that representatives would be present to outline what has

been done thus far and plans for the future.

"We've got the screwworm on the run," Fore said, "and if all of us redouble our efforts right now the pest can be forever eradicated."

Fore urged that livestockmen of the Pioneer area help to pass the word along to others about the meeting. "It's important that most every owner of cattle, hogs, horses, sheep and goats be present," he declared.

Plans are to erect a tile building at the site of the present firehouse. Public support will be required to finance the undertaking.

ner-up in their division, but built their record to a respectable 8-7.

Three local cagers placed on the two all-tournament teams. Darlene Hargrove was selected at a forward post, and Betty Purvis was chosen as a guard on the female all-star squad. Joe Pierce, the Mites' "man of many talents", earned a spot on the boy quintet.

Friday night both local teams defeated Eastland. The girls won 27-22 and the boys rolled to a 36-24 decision. Darlene Hargrove paced the girls with 15 points, and Joe Pierce collected 18 for the boys.

February 17, 1933
An attempt to assassinate President Franklin Delano Roosevelt at Miami, Fla., Wednesday night failed, but six people were shot. The President-Elect was uninjured.

A new oil company was formed in Cross Plains last week by Ed Schaffner, C. D. Lane and E. D. Priest. The organization has been

titled "Optimistic Oil Company."

February 23, 1934
C. W. (Ches) Barr became owner of the Schooley Bakery here last week end after a deal with H. T. Schooley, former owner of the business. Mr. Barr assumed management immediately and is now in charge of the bakery.

The A. G. Foster Service Station and Grocery in the north part of town was completely destroyed by fire Wednesday morning. The loss of several thousand dollars was only partially covered by insurance.

February 15, 1935
Because roads are impassable, a specially chartered airplane will land in Cross Plains Friday morning and pick up a committee of citizens and transport them to Baird, where a plea for "action on Highway 36" will be presented County Judge J. H. Carpenter. The plane will be piloted by L. E. Derryberry of Abilene who will return the committee, perhaps three persons, to Cross Plains.

February 21, 1936
Miss Rexine Shields, attractive young school teacher here, and Orba Booth, one of the town's most promising sons, will trip to Hymen's Altar Sunday. Just where they will recite the marriage vows is not immediately learned, however it is authentically known that the date has been set for Feb. 23.

An old-age pension office has been set up in Cross Plains by local merchants to assist elderly people in preparing application blanks. Mrs. Paul Boase has been employed to do the work.

February 26, 1937
Eleven carloads of junk iron have been shipped from Cross Plains in the past 28 days and six or seven more will be moved from here within the next few weeks. \$3,458.21 has been paid for the old metal.

A rail carload of horses and mules left Cross Plains first of the week enroute to Mississippi. The animals were purchased throughout the Cross Plains trade territory by Ed Morgan and Sam Sipes.

"Range seeding is now in progress in the Lower Clear Fork Soil Conservation District and Callahan County," says

John D. Isenhower of Putnam District Supervisor of the Lower Clear Fork District. Each year there arises numerous questions as to what, where, when and how to go about getting this all-important job done, he says.

Mishaps Increase In 4-County Area

In the four-county area which includes Brown, Callahan, Coleman and Eastland Counties, there were two fatal accidents during January. Five more mishaps occurred in the area in 1963 than during 1962.

Texas Department of Public Safety gives the following report on rural accidents by counties.

Brown: a total of 16 accidents as compared with 11 for the same month of the year before. One person was killed, six injured and property damage totaled \$4,205.

Callahan: a total of 10 accidents as compared with 12 for the same month in 1962. One person was killed, two injured and property damage totaled \$6,409.

Coleman: a total of four accidents, the same number as for January the year before. Three persons were injured and property damage amounted to \$2,600.

ing of range and pasture grasses.

D. C. Cox, Work unit Conservationist of the Soil Conservation Service, states, "The optimum seeding dates for warm season grasses in this area are Feb. 15 to May 1 with the maximum lasting to June 1 under certain conditions."

Cost share assistance through the Great Plains Conservation Program and the Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Service are providing financial assistance in getting these needed conservation practices applied.

When considering the land and other resources, the following questions should be considered, Isenhower points out.

1. What is this plot of land best suited for over a long period of time?

2. What should I expect from this plot in the way of production?

3. What treatment or management is needed to bring about this desired sustained production?

Planting grass on rangeland following brush control is needed in many instances. Most of it is done following chopping or some other satisfactory seeded preparation. Local Soil Conservation Service Technicians are available to assist you in planning and applying brush control, grass seeding and other conservation measures needed in a complete conservation program.

There are several farmers and ranchers interested in planting old fields that have been in cultivation and are now turned out. Most of these are being planted on a well prepared firm seedbed. Others are planting in a thin stand of small grain where blowing is a problem. Using this method the grain is mowed or shredded in the boot or early head stage. This allows the new grass seedling to have access to more sunshine and less competition for moisture.

There are many different factors effecting the final outcome of a range seeding program. Soil types, condition of or type of seedbed preparation, kind and amount of seed to plant, deferment of the grasses and last and probably the most important is to use it properly after the grass is established. By training and experience your local Soil Conservation Service Technicians have the answers to many of the questions that come up concerning the plant-

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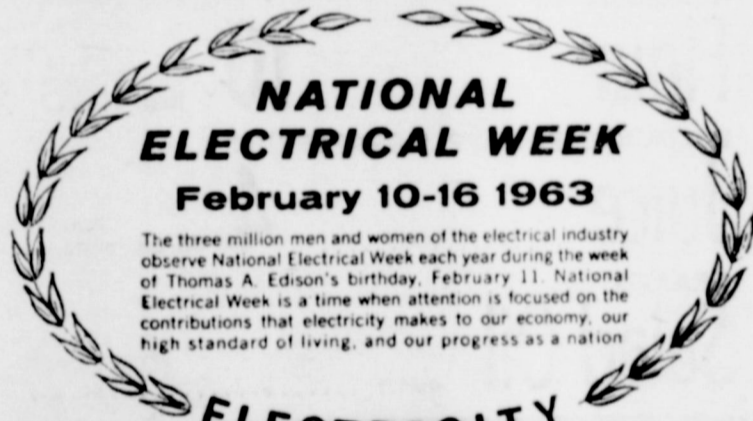

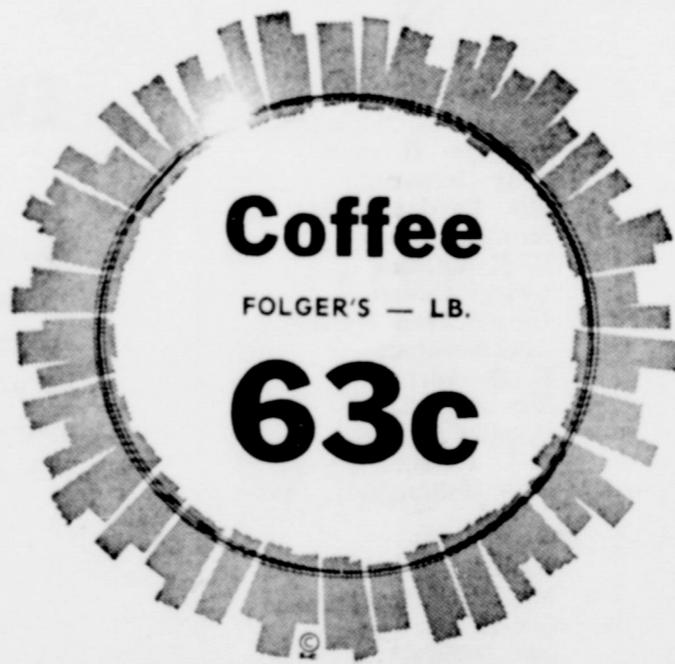
