Total tax evaluation for Callahan County in 1962 amounted to \$11,906,876.93. That figure is a decrease from the year before; 1961 renditions aggregated \$12,039,843.83. The 1963 tax roll will not be prepared for another several weeks. It is not expected to be far different, however, from that for 1962.

## Teen-Aged Trio Fails To Outrun 3 Local Officers

Three Cross Plains officers were challenged in a contest of speed Tuesday night of last week, when three Albany teenagers endeavored to elude them on Highway 36 west of town.

City Marshal Bart Thomas was first to enter the chase, when the speeding car came down Main Street and ran a stop light at the highway intersection. Unable to overtake the youths, Thomas radioed Highway Patrolman Jerry Mathews and Deputy Sheriff N. L. Long, Jr. Both were soon in pursuit. Mathews overtook the boys

about 10 miles west of town. They were brought back and charged in corporation court with speeding within the city limits and running a stop sign. They were booked in county court with stealing hubcaps from a local car. The hubcaps, said to have come from a car owned by Ronnie Edgington, local youth whose car was parked at the school gymnasium, were found and returned to the owner. One other charge, speeding on a state highway, was lodged in justice court and two more warning tickets were issued.

## Rest Home Is To Open On Schedule

The rest home now being built in Cross Plains will be completed "right on schedule," declared Doyle Karnes, contractor, Friday.

"We have a crew laying tile on the project at Rising Star now," he said, "and the same workmen will be moved to Cross Plains in about 10 days."

Reports had previously circulated here that work might be delayed 30 days.

"We only stopped because of the inclement weather," Karnes emphasized. "You can't pour concrete successfully in freezing weather."

When completed the rest home here will accommodate 30 permanent residents and be one of the most modern institutions of its kind in this area. It is expected to be ready for occupancy by early summer.

## Less Than Third Vehicles Checked

Less than one-third the vehicles operating in Callahan, Coleman, Eastland and Brown Counties have been safety checked, the deadline of which is April 1.

## Stage Band Enters Week End Festival

Cross Plains High School stage band will enter the stage band festival in Brownwood Friday and Saturday.

The Brownwood event is the oldest stage band festival in the nation and rated the equivalent to a state contest.

Judges will be Buddy De Franco of Beverly Hills, Calif., nationally-known recording star and said to be one of the world's greatest clarinetists; Dr. W. F. Lee, Sam Houston State College, Leon Breeden, North Texas State University, and Phil Manning of the University of Texas. Three judges will rate the stage band and the fourth will select outstanding musicians.

Director Wayne McDonald of the CPHS band said yesterday

that all playing would be in the new high school auditorium at Brownwood, however, winners are to be announced at 7:50 Friday night in the old high school auditorium. Awards will be presented at that time. This will be followed by a concert by the North Texas State University lab band. Music and entertainment will be on the night's program for all participating students at the roof garden of the Brownwood Hotel.

Cross Plains will compete with these bands: Holliday, Santa Anna, Rising Star, Gorman, Menard, Clifton, Munday, Archer City and Crowell. The Cross Plains band will play Friday morning at 10:40. Awards will be given first and second place and show bands.

Born in Allegheny, N. Y., March 30, 1875, he had lived here for 30 years.

He married his wife, Mrs. Bertha Odom, in 1942 in Eastland.

Survivors include his wife; two brothers, Joe of Cross Plains and George of Huntington, Va.

## Dependent Children Get New Supervisor

Aid to dependent children which has been handled in Callahan County by Jimmy Dennis of the Department of Public Welfare with offices in the courthouse at Baird, will be taken over March 1 by specialized case workers. Callahan County will be served by a representative from Coleman.

At present 24 children receive financial assistance in this county, six of whom reside in Cross Plains. Payments to the six total \$228 monthly.

## 50 Expected At Swr Price Rules

Persons who take part in the 1963 feed grain program will receive payments for diverting acreage from the production of corn, grain sorghum and barley, Tommie Harris, chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee, said Monday. Part of the estimated payment to be earned for such diversion may be paid in advance when the producer signs up to participate. The rest of the diversion payment and all of the price-support payment will be made next summer.

In general, the chairman explained, this program provision should be of substantial benefit to growers who can use extra ready cash during the spring planting season. Sign-up for the program runs through March 22.

Besides the payment for diversion of eligible cropland to approved conserving uses, the feed grain program for 1963 offers program participants a price-support payment on the normal production of the acreage planted to feed grains in 1963. They will also qualify for price-support loans or purchase agreements on their entire production from the feed grain acreage.

The minimum diversion for participation is 20 per cent of the farm's 1963 feed grain base. The acreage of corn, grain sorghum, and barley (1959-60 average acreage, as adjusted) will be combined into one total feed grain base for each farm, and a farmer may divert one or more of the feed grains in the total base. His payment will be made at the per-acre rate

for the grain diverted. Farmers who planted their 1963 barley crop last fall will be able to participate in the 1963 program by reducing the total acreage planted to the three feed grains by at least the minimum amount.

Payment on the first 20 per cent of acreage diversion will be made at 20 percent of the county support rate on the normal production of the diverted acres. On diversion above the minimum amount, payment will be at 50 per cent of the county support rate. The diversion payment plus the price-support payment will give farmers approximately the same payment they received for participating in the 1961 and 1962 programs.

While participation in the 1963 feed grain diversion program is voluntary, the price-support payments and loans — as well as the diversion payments — will be available only to feed grain growers who carry out the program's provisions.

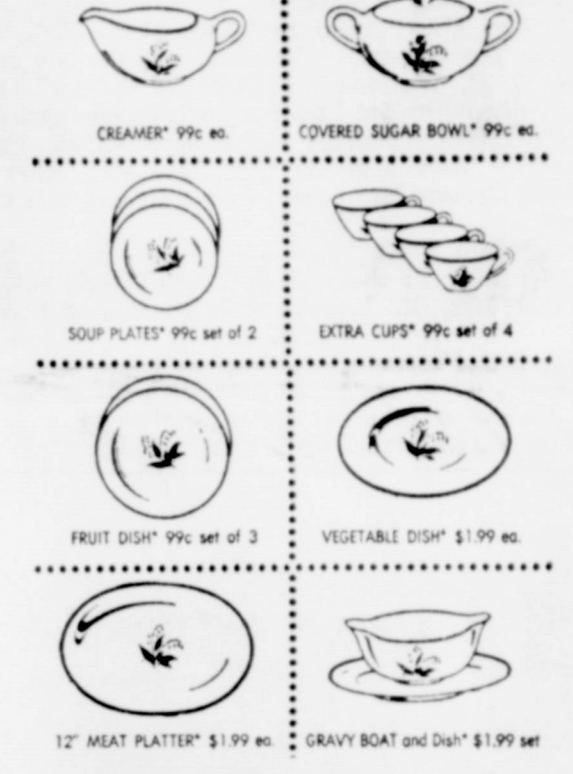

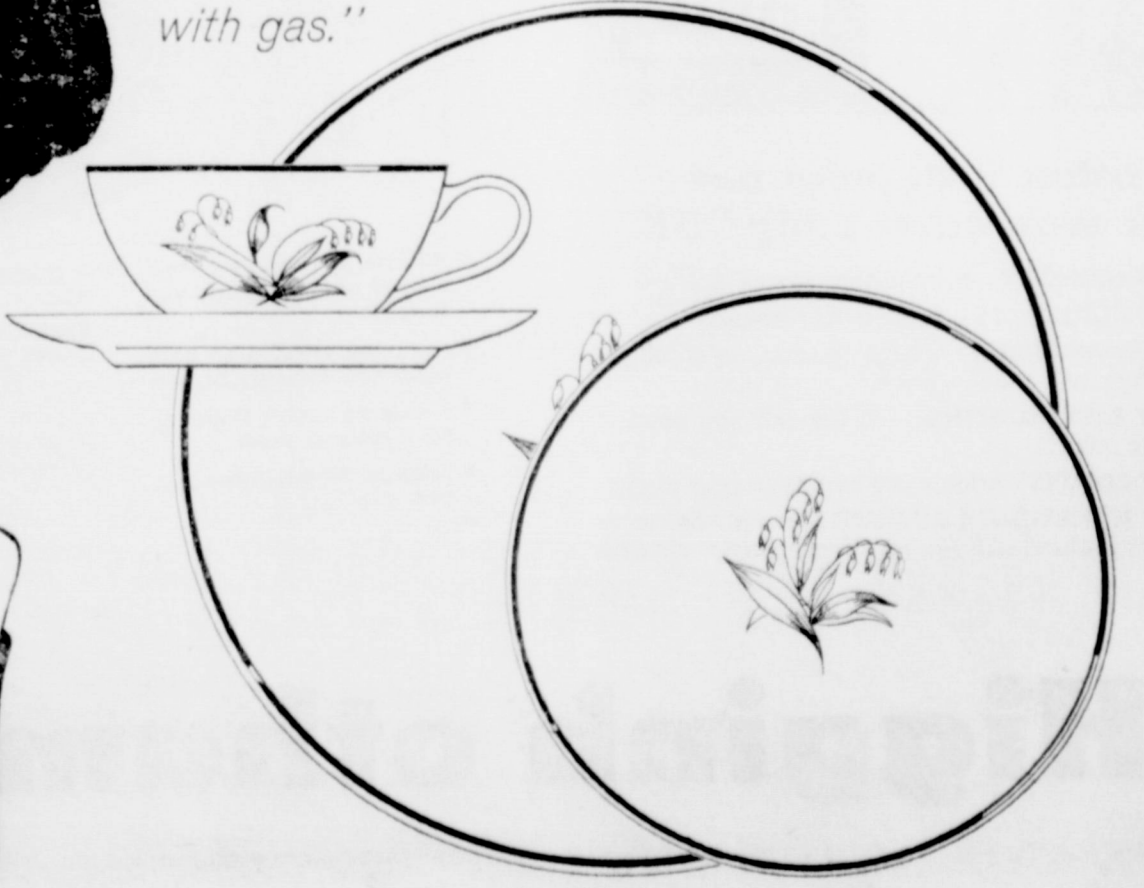

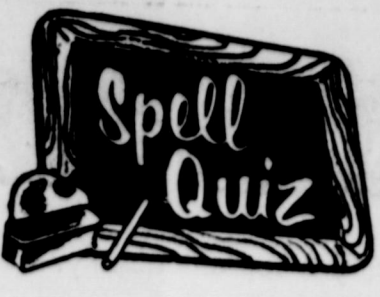
