1,000 To See Lions Two-Night Minstrel

Rumbling sounds heard in the north end of town Friday and Saturday nights may not necessarily be thunder. The uncommon noise may be laughter emanating from Cross Plains school auditorium.

Cross Plains Lions Club will present its second annual Negro Minstrel, featuring an original comedy skit written and produced by Bob Latson and Wayne McDonald. Sixty local persons appear in the cast.

Decision to hold the show two nights instead of only one was made after the school auditorium was crowded beyond capacity for the one-night stand a year ago.

Persons who have peeped in on dress rehearsals say this year's production will far outstrip last year's effort, and consensus here is that the first show was the most entertaining home-talent affair ever offered on a local stage.

Cross Plains High School stage band will provide orchestral accompaniment.

Beginning time for both Friday and Saturday night performances will be 8 o'clock.

\$8,025 Raised On Stock Barn

A drive for funds to construct a county exhibit building in Cross Plains, to house the annual Callahan Junior Livestock Show and other functions, passed the halfway point yesterday.

A minimum of \$12,500 will be required to build the facility on

seven acres of ideally-suited property one mile north of town, recently donated by the family of Mrs. E. I. Vestal.

Edwin Baum, chairman of the financial campaign, said yesterday: "We're half-way home and going strong, however, it's going to take an almost unanimous response from potential donors to reach the objective."

Contributions this week amounted to \$2,725, bringing the total money raised to \$8,025 and leaving \$4,475 yet to be raised.

Plans are to build an exhibition barn 80 by 100 feet with construction to be of colored sheet-metal, the same type as may be seen on the West Texas Fair Grounds in Abilene. Required at the property will also be a water well from the 65 foot proven strata, septic tank and sanitation facilities, graveled parking area, 2,500 feet of fencing, plumbing and electrical installations and gates and pens inside the building. The present campaign was aimed at collecting \$10,000 to be added to \$2,500 which had been raised several years ago by a former Baird restaurant owner and was made available for the project here.

County Agent Pat Garner of Baird was in Cross Plains Monday and is said to have inspected the site and declared it "perfect" both for exhibition purposes and as a project feeding facility for 4-H Club and FFA boys.

"I'll help every way I can to see the barn successfully completed," he said and opined that 4-H Clubs and FFA Chapters from all sections of the county would make financial contributions.

No concentrated canvass for funds has yet been made. Most donors have responded with little or no contact.

"We'll get around too a person-to-person and door-to-door basis a little later," Baum declared.

Since the exhibition building is to be located at Cross Plains, this immediate vicinity will be expected to raise a majority of the necessary funds. Help has already come in, however, from several other sections of the county and proponents of the project aver more will be received shortly.

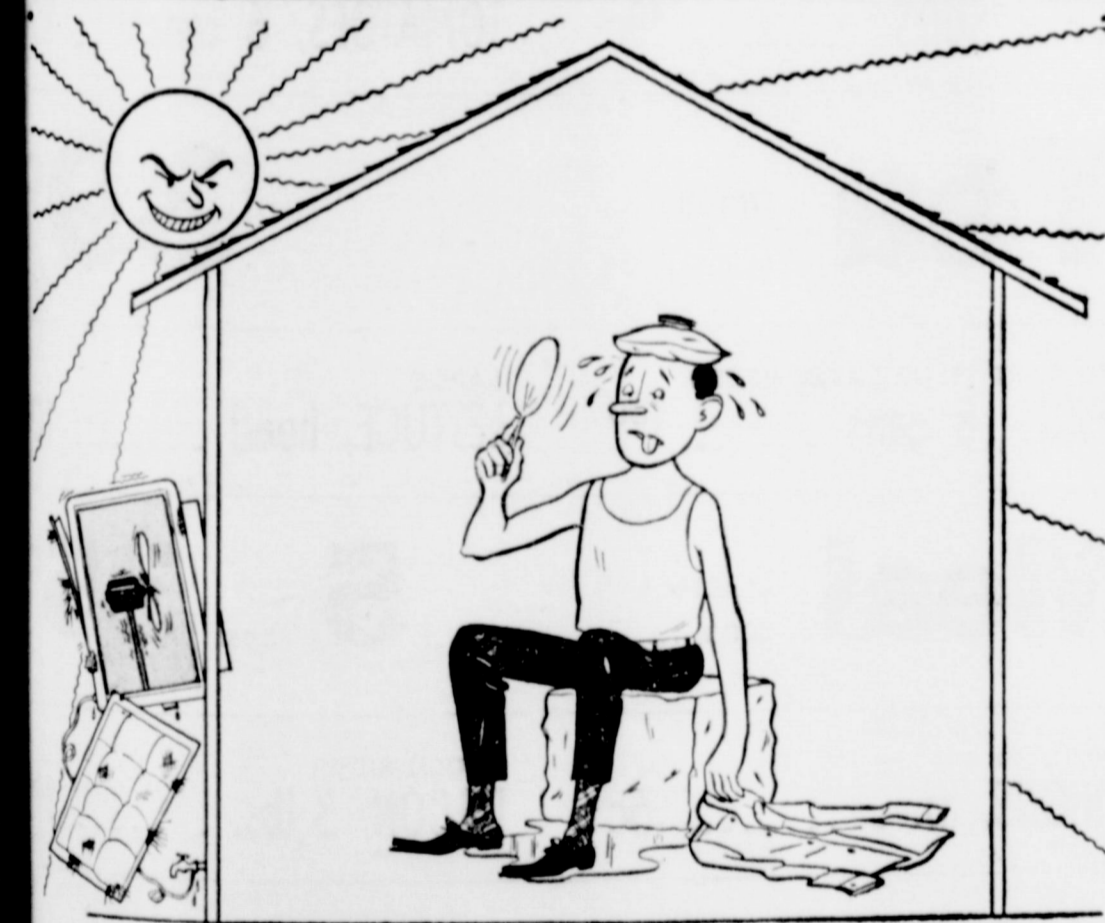

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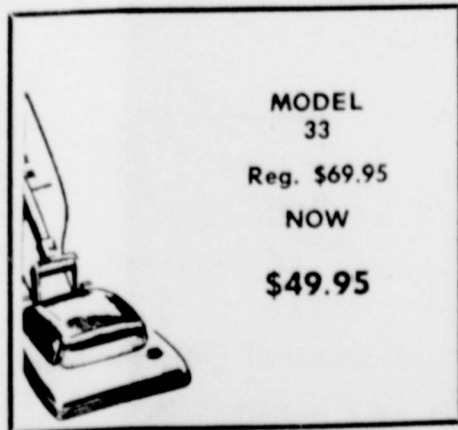

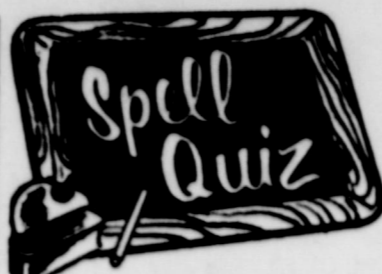
