





Constituents of the 17th Congressional District of Texas, of which this area is a part, have been lavish in praise of a bill passed by Rep. Omar Burleson of this district, which if eventually enacted into law is expected to save millions in government waste.

The bill cracks down on travel by members of Congress, including a ban on foreign travel by those who will not be back for a succeeding session. It would affect travel by both Representatives and Senators.

The bill imposes the same traveling expense limitations upon legislators that now apply to members of other branches of the government who travel abroad on official business. It also would require the filing of complete expense statements for public inspection, including their use of foreign funds.

Members who for any reason are not returning to the next Congress would be prohibited from arranging trips after Congress adjourns.

The bill was passed in the House by an overwhelming vote, there being only two in opposi-

Burleson was asked what he thought the Senate would do with this bill, and simply said no one could speculate on that point, "but certainly they are going to have an opportunity now, the same as the House had, to support these reforms which correct practices recently under much criticism.
