The Lure Of Gold

(An Editorial)

Many public school administrators have joined politicians in advocating increased federal aid to education. The prospect of additional millions for new buildings, improved facilities and possible pay increases presented an almost irresistible attraction.

Opponents of the proposal have contended that with grants from Washington would come controls and restraints, ultimately making local school boards nothing but figureheads. They have steadfastly held that individual states and communities were completely qualified to supervise and finance their schools and that more economy and greater value could be obtained by keeping jurisdiction close to home.

With another ruling by the U. S. Supreme Court Monday that Bible readings and recitation of the Lord's Prayer in public schools is in violation of a constitutional provision, one which prevents government from establishing or aiding religion, it appears that the foes of federal aid to education have had the picture in accurate focus.

If it is in violation of law to teach children to read and recite the Lord's Prayer, then perhaps a nation professing to be Christian, should either re-vamp its laws or its public schools.

Shakespeare's plays, which speak of harlots, glorify a dictator and detail gruesome crimes, are required reading, but the Holy Writ is now forbidden.

God help a nation unable to see for itself.

Cougar Kills 150-Pound Pig; Reward Suggested

A 150-pound hog was killed and partially consumed by a predatory animal at the E. B. Hindman home — the old T. B. McCracken place — two and one-half miles east of Cross Plains on FM Road 374 last Thursday night.

A large cougar, or panther, was recently seen in that same general vicinity by Bob Turner of Pioneer.

Hindman suggested starting a reward for hunters to capture and destroy the predator which has reportedly been preying on livestock in southwestern Eastland County. If property owners wish to build a reward fund for the slaying of a cougar, panther or predatory animal near here, this newspaper has agreed to receive the contributions and publicize the conditions under which the grant would be made. As yet, however, such a movement has only been suggested.

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Local Man Building Half Acre Hothouse

Wayne Westerman is assembling materials preparatory to building a hothouse to cover a half acre. It will be built on land two miles north of Pioneer on FM Road 569, where he has had a pilot project under test the past year.

The hothouse space will be devoted to the growing of vine-ripened tomatoes the year around. It will be completed Aug. 1 and set to tomatoes, scheduled to be ready for mar-

ket by Thanksgiving.

Westerman sold more than \$1,000 worth of tomatoes the first year from his pilot house, said to cover about 1/30th of an acre.

"It takes a sizeable investment and a great deal of work," he said yesterday, "but I believe it possible to harvest as much as \$30,000 worth of vine-ripened tomatoes off one acre."

Demand for the locally grown tomatoes has thus far exceeded supply.
