Bandit Robs Place On 36

John Ray, 16, is a lad with courage. When an armed robber invaded Ray's Station, one mile west of Denton Valley on Highway 36, at 2:30 a.m. Tuesday and demanded that he open the locked cash drawer, the youthful attendant bluntly refused. Although the two were alone in the isolated station, Ray did not intend to surrender the

day's receipts for the business which he operates for his father, C. B. Ray, who also has another place on the same highway nearer Abilene.

The robber, described as a man 28 to 30 years old, around five feet six inches tall, wearing khaki clothes and wielding a pistol, grabbed the cash register and hurried away in a Cadillac sedan, believed to be about a 1953 model.

The register was estimated to have contained about \$100 in currency, possibly \$50 in silver and \$60 or \$70 worth of checks.

No license tag was on front of the get-away car and the rear plate was obscured by a cloth.

Officers from Abilene, Clyde, Baird and Cross Plains were notified and threw up road blocks. The robber, however, is believed to have gone to Abilene by a circuitous route.

Ray said when the intruder first came into the station he asked if the place sold sandwiches.

"Yes," replied the attendant, pointing to a stack of packaged sandwiches on the counter.

The gunman paid little attention to the food, walked to the cash register and attempted to open it.

"Stop that," demanded Ray. With this command the robber whipped out a pistol, thought to have possibly been a .32 calibre, and demanded: "Open it."

Ray refused and the bandit picked up the register with one hand, using the other to level the gun and got in the vehicle and sped west.

'Please Tell Me, Teacher'

(An Editorial)

Public schools will resume classes in Cross Plains in about 67 days from now.

What will be the reply if some child asks: "Teacher, is there a God and, if so, does He love me?"

The Supreme Court of the United States has ruled that the teacher must not offend believers in atheism and to answer that question in the affirmative would be a violation of the constitution.

Devotional services have always been held in Cross Plains schools and local ministers and lay-leaders have frequently led them, reading Scriptures and reciting in unison with students the Lord's Prayer and other well-known passages from the Holy Writ. May such a practice be continued?

Congress itself employs a full-time chaplain and sessions are opened with prayer, beseeching divine guidance in deliberations of that high body. Yet, the Supreme Court says no such right belongs to the little red schoolhouse.

With juvenile crime skyrocketing and teenage gangs running rampant in most every great American city, religion needs emphasizing, not road-blocks from people in high places.

American people have amended their constitution before, to do such things as bar the sale of liquor, then legalize it again. It now appears that the document needs another amendment. A change should be plainly written and passed denying the right of anyone to forbid the reading of the Word of God in schools of this nation, so long as a non-secular approach is maintained.

There is no force as potent in American politics as that of an aroused electorate. Voters have in their grasp the power to correct this ridiculous situation. The question is, do they care enough to deluge congressmen and senators with demands for an immediate, corrective amendment.

A letter-writing campaign begun in Cross Plains could sweep the nation, gaining momentum with every postage stamp invested in such a holy crusade. For every letter to a congressman or senator, another should go to a friend or relative elsewhere, urging the movement be started there.

B. M. Coppinger To Head Eula Schools

Billy Mac Coppinger, Cross Plains High School principal and member of the local faculty the past nine years, was Tuesday night, chosen superintendent of schools at Eula. He will assume

duties of the position Monday, beginning of the new fiscal year.

Coppinger finished Cross Plains High School with the class of 1944 and enrolled that Fall in Tarleton State College at Stephenville. After two years in college, he entered military service and spent 16 months in the Far East.

Upon discharge in September 1948, he enrolled at Abilene Christian College, where he was a member of the varsity basketball team two years. He was graduated with the class of 1952, taking a Bachelor of Science degree.

He took his Master of Education degree from McMurry in 1956. His family consists of his wife, the former Emma Dee Worthy, and their two-year-old son, Paul. They plan to move to Eula some time in July, where a home is provided the superintendent on the school campus.

Eula is a 10-teacher school with about 180 students. There are currently four vacancies in the faculty and one of Coppinger's first duties will be to interview prospective teachers.

Coppinger is a member of the Cross Plains Fire Department, District Deputy Grand Master of the Masonic Lodge, player-coordinator for Little League baseball teams, teacher in the Sunday School of the First Baptist Church, manager of a Pony League baseball team and has many other civic affiliations. In addition to his duties as principal in the local high school he taught government to seniors and physical education.

Changes In Sales Tax Go Into Effect Next Monday

Cross Plains businessmen, like their counterparts throughout Texas, were preparing yesterday for changes in sales tax levies which become effective Monday, July 1.

Three of the major changes involve essential items of food, clothing and automobiles.

All clothing bought after Sunday will cost an extra two percent.

In the past, the tax had to be paid on under-garments and on all outer garments that cost more than \$10. But if the man of the house wants to escape paying 10 cents extra for a \$5 shirt, he'll have to purchase it this week.

There will be no change on food, prepared and eaten at home. On the other hand, meals bought in a restaurant and eaten at home will be subject to the tax. In the past "meals to go" were not taxable.

Now there will be a two percent tax — the same as for all other sales. But the tax will be on the difference between the sales price and the trade-in. In some cases this will run higher than before and in others it will run less; however, if there is no trade-in the tax will naturally be higher.

Meals fed from a catering service are subject to the two percent sales tax in Texas after July 1 also. Grocery stores which sell "meals to go" also must require the sales tax to be paid on those items; however, this does not include items such as frozen dinners which require further preparation at home.

There will be one exemption to the tax on prepared dinners. That is for meals prepared to be served to passengers on board common carriers while traveling, primarily helping airlines. All but one of the airlines operating in Texas buy their meals from caterers; one maintains its own kitchen, using groceries that have been exempt all along.

There has been a sales tax on automobiles all along.

In the past the tax was 1 1/2 per cent of the sales price of the automobile being purchased, without any consideration for the trade-in.
