News Of Former Residents

Man Known Here **Buried Last Week**

William Newton Burks, 79, a former resident of the Atwell area, died last week in a nursing home at Merkel. He was a retired construction worker and had been ill several years.

He was born Nov. 4, 1883, in Comanche and had made his home in Abilene since 1914. He was a Baptist with membership at Rowden until abandonment of that congregation several Gibbs. She died in 1942. Survivors include five sons,
