Mrs. R. Robertson To Be 100 Next Tuesday

Mrs. R. Robertson of Cross Plains, widow of a pioneer Callahan County physician, will reach her 100th birthday Tuesday, Aug. 13.

The beloved senior-citizen makes her home with her daughter, Mrs. Mary Gensley, on North Main Street, directly across the street from the school campus.

"We are asking old friends and neighbors to drop by Sunday afternoon between three and five p.m. and have a piece of birthday cake," Mrs. Gensley said.

Mrs. Robertson, nee Ida Joe Moorman, was born Aug. 13, 1863, in Kentucky and married Dr. R. Robertson. The couple came to Texas 78 years ago, settling at Cottonwood. After a few years there, they moved to Dallas and later to Cross Plains, where he was actively engaged in the practice of medicine until shortly before his death, 20 years ago this month.

Besides Mrs. Gensley, Mrs. Robertson has six other surviving children, five sons and another daughter. They all live in California.

Man Who Left Lawmen Red-Faced, Again Jailed

Lawmen seldom forget.

A 58-year-old man, charged with shoplifting in Cross Plains, who walked away last November while officers pondered his case, is back in custody.

The man, Charlie Skinner, was recently picked up for drunkenness in Brownwood and later released to Deputy Sheriff N. L. Long, Jr., on the eight-month old complaint in this county.

Long held the man in jail here one day and then moved him to Baird Thursday, where he is now confined pending action of the grand jury.

Skinner was arrested in Cross Plains last November by County Judge Byron Richardson, then a deputy sheriff here, and

charged with felony shoplifting after he had allegedly stolen three bottles of vanilla extract at King's Grocery on Highway 36.

Skinner's bond was set in justice court in Cross Plains at \$750 and when he was unable to post it, Richardson took him to Abilene to confer with the district attorney. The prisoner was told to wait in the DA's outer-office while the officer and the attorney discussed his case. He took a seat but when the conference ended the prisoner was missing. No one in the Taylor County courthouse had observed his departure and his whereabouts were unknown to local officers until the recent arrest in Brownwood.

"We intend to watch him carefully this time," said Long.

Arrangements were nearing completion yesterday for annual home-coming of former students

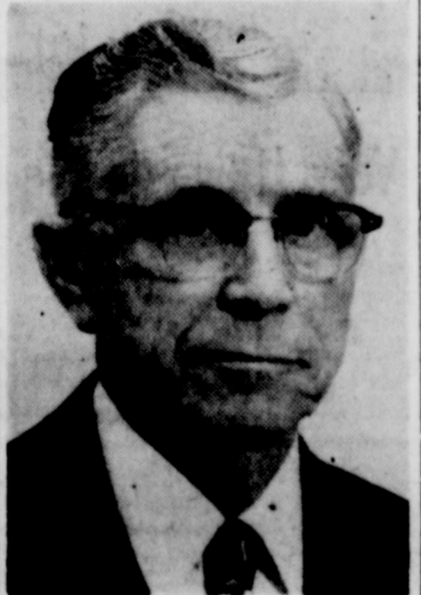
of Pioneer school, to be held in the community tabernacle there Thursday. A crowd of 200 is expected.

Review Publishers Buy Second Paper

Publishers of the Cross Plains Review have bought the Glen Rose Reporter, only newspaper published in Somervell County, and are now operating the two publications.

Mr. and Mrs. D. J. (Jack) McCarty were to leave early Thursday morning to take over the Glen Rose property. Jack Scott has assumed management of the Review.

The McCartys do not plan to sell or rent their home in Cross Plains.

"We hope to one day own several country newspapers," the two local publishers said. "An enlarged operation would permit volume buying and the installation of several innovations in printing machinery not justified by a single isolated plant."

It was explained that the Scott-McCarty partnership was being enlarged not terminated and that plans were to make the Cross Plains Review home office for an expanded newspaper operation.

Rowden's "Suicide Strip" Claims 11th Life Saturday

A short segment of State Highway 36 — between Rowden and the intersection four miles west — is gaining the designation of Suicide Strip.

Another person was killed there early Saturday, bringing to 11 the number to die in traffic mishaps on that short span of pavement.

Latest victim was Weldon Eugene Terrill, 29-year-old Abilene man, who was fatally injured in a one-vehicle accident.

Investigating Patrolman Bill Vineyard of Cross Plains said Terrill was traveling west, alone in a 1955 Ford pickup, toward Abilene, about midnight when the vehicle ran off the highway on the left side and collided with several fence and telephone poles.

Terrill was thrown from his vehicle, he said.

The mishap was observed by a Mexican from Navasota, who was traveling toward Cross Plains. He notified authorities and an ambulance

was called. Terrill died, however, before it arrived.

Five persons were killed at almost the identical spot in March. The four-mile strip of pavement from Rowden west to the intersection of State Highway 36 and 283 possess no exceptional road hazards.

"It just seems to be a jinx," said Roy Thornton, who lives nearby, to a Review reporter at the time the five died there last Spring.

Work Scheduled At Stock Barn Project

A work schedule has been announced by San Angelo contractors for the Callahan County Junior Livestock Exposition Building to be built one mile north of Cross Plains.

The foundation will be started Aug. 26, steel will be shipped Sept. 3 and construction of the structure itself will start Sept. 9. The building is due to be completed before the last of September.

Contract to build the barn ran \$13,998. Plans also call for installing sewer facilities, water well and electrical work, none of which are a part of the contract. Too, it is hoped that the property can be attractively fenced. A total of \$15,800 was raised by public subscription for the project.

The building will become permanent home of Callahan County Junior Livestock Shows.



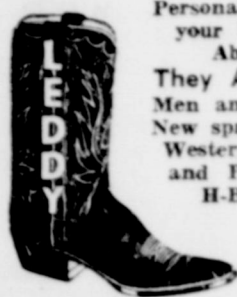

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1968. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1 proposing an amendment to Sections 2 and 4 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to repeal the provision making payment of the poll tax a requirement for voting and so as to authorize the Legislature to provide for the registration of all voters. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Sections 2 and 4 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read, respectively, as follows: "Section 2. Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications who shall have attained the age of twenty-one years and who shall be a citizen of the United States and who shall have resided in this state one year next preceding an election and the last six months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector, provided such person is a member of the Armed Forces of the United States or non-potent branches thereof, or in the military service of the United States, and may vote only in the county in which he or she resided at the time of entering such service so long as he or she is a member of the Armed Forces; and provided further, that before offering to vote at an election a voter shall have registered if required by law to do so. The Legislature may authorize absentee voting. This Amendment shall take effect on December 1, 1968.

Section 4. In all elections by the people the vote shall be by secret ballot. The Legislature shall provide for the numbering of ballots and make such other regulations as may be necessary to detect and punish fraud and preserve the purity of elections, and may provide by law for the registration of all voters. Should the Legislature enact a registration law in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such law shall not be invalid by reason of its anticipatory character.

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held on the first Saturday after the first Monday in November, 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the amendment of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to repeal the provision making payment of the poll tax a requirement for voting and so as to authorize the Legislature to provide for the registration of all voters."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

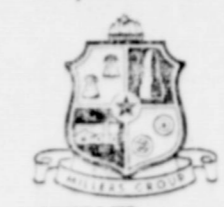

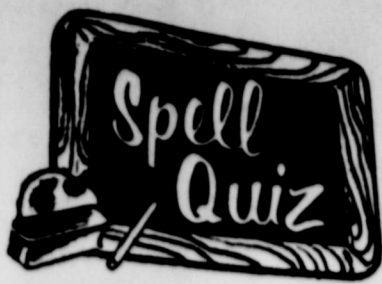
Drug Man Speaks To Lions Monday

Lives of two million Americans have been saved by sulfa and antibiotic drugs in the last 20 years, a spokesman for the pharmaceutical industry told Cross Plains Lions Club members, in regular semi-monthly meeting at the Sisters Cafe Monday night.

The speaker, John G. Richardson of Mineral Wells, said new drugs save both lives and dollars. As an example, he cited present-day treatment of pneumonia.

"Deaths from pneumonia are now rare," he explained, "and average cost of treatment is less than \$100 as compared with about \$1,000 prior to antibiotics."
