



Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF

TEXAS:
Section I. That Sections 2 and 4 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read, respectively, as follows:
"Section 2. Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications who shall have attained the age of twenty-one years and who shall be a citizen of the United States and who shall have resided in this state one year next preceding an election and the last six months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; provided to the county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; provided to at any member of the Armed Forces of the United States, may vote only in the county in which he or she resided at the time of entering such service so long as he or she is a member of the Armed Forces; and provided further, that before offering to vote at an election a voter shall have registered if required by law to do so. The Legislature may authorize absence voting. This Amendment shall take effect on December 1, 1963.




