## Single Accident Here Over Holiday Period

While traffic fatalities were rising to a new high over the nation during the Labor Day

week end, only one minor accident was reported by the Highway Patrol in the Cross Plains area.

### Local FFA Youths Competing At Fair

Cross Plains F. F. A. Chapter will enter an educational booth at the West Texas Fair in Abilene, opening Monday. Plans were also being made yesterday to send about 50 entries in the field crop and horticulture divisions of the show.

Livestock will be entered by at least two local youths. Among them will be Joe Pope, who will have eight sheep in competition. Tommy Garrett will have eight head of dairy cattle in the show.

The single mishap occurred Saturday night at 11 o'clock, when a small foreign-made car driven by a Fort Hood soldier hit a culvert just east of town. Driver of the car, Pfc. Robert Thomas Callahan, was uninjured, however, his wife was taken to Hendrick Memorial Hospital in Abilene. She was not believed critically hurt. Other occupants of the vehicle, Mr. and Mrs. Cecil Rich and child, escaped injury.

Damage was estimated at \$310.

Investigating officer was Patrolman Bill Vineyard of Cross Plains.

## Pasture Fire Destroys 1,500 Acres Of Grass

Six units of fire-fighting equipment from five near-by towns fought a raging pasture fire, south and east of Baird, Thursday finally bringing it under control after an estimated 1,500 acres had been seared.

Flames leaped to 15 and 20 feet high on the Dyer ranch and challenged skill of firemen from Baird, Cisco, Cross Plains, Clyde, Albany and scores of vol-

unteers. Burning was brought under control about 9:30 Thursday night.

No injuries or damages to buildings were reported on the ranch, which encompasses Lake Baird, about two miles south of there. The fire stretched northward to the Highway 80 right-of-way.

Area men used cattle spray-ers on pick-up trucks to help control the fire.

## Buffaloes Open Football Season At Bangs Friday

Cross Plains Buffaloes, under the guidance of new coaches Jim Farmer and Lee King, open the 1963 football campaign at Bangs Friday at 8 p.m.

An even dozen Buff lettermen and 19 more hopefuls will take on what informative Bangs sources call a "somewhat weaker team than last year" in the grid curtain-raiser.

The Dragons lost nine lettermen by graduation last year from the squad that defeated the locals 8-0 in miserably wet playing conditions. Bangs' Coach Julley reported 34 candidates last week, and listed six returning senior, two junior and three sophomore lettermen as possible starters.

### Buff Starters

Coaches Farmer and King said early in the week that were to play a game tomorrow the following might possibly be on the starting eleven:

At ends were: freshman Joe Pierce and junior Tommy Purvis; tackles, senior Kenneth Sowell and sophomore Donnie Rhodes; guards, senior James Goble and senior Jay Hutchins; center, sophomore Ronnie Rhodes; halfbacks, juniors Reggie Stover and Bobby McMillan; quarterback, junior Jack Baum and fullback, senior Charles Barr.

Both coaches stated that starting berths were not definite and positions and personnel would be decided as time elapsed.

Injuries have already slowed the Bison. Two-year letterman Mike Montgomery suffered recurrence of an old head injury and was forced to retire from active participation, but stayed on as manager. Lettermen Eddy Don Edmondson and James Switzer missed several workouts last week because of sickness and injury and were slowed this week to the extent that they might not see action Friday.

### Win Scrimmage

Wednesday of last week the Buffs nipped class B May in a pre-season scrimmage 1-0.

Cross Plains' winning margin came on a pass from halfback Bobby McMillan to end Joe Pierce.

In commenting about the scrimmage both mentors agreed that the squad still needed much work. They continued that the spirit at drills was good, and the players cooperation was favorable.

Naturally Farmer and King hope for a victory Friday, but predicted a hard-fought game.

### 45 Mighty Mites

Forty five gridders reported for practice sessions in junior high last week.

Suits were issued Saturday morning and actual drills were to have begun Monday. Of the 45 gridders 14 were eighth graders, 16 were seventh graders and 15 were sixth graders.

The Mighty Mites will begin the season Tuesday, Sept. 10, at Baird with the Cubs. All games will start at 7:30 p.m.

The same district set-up as last year will prevail in the '63 season, and eight tilts are scheduled, the first a non-conference clash. The loop is composed of Cross Plains, Rising Star, May, Santa Anna, Goldthwaite, Early, Bangs and Blanket.

Coaches were not decided upon whether a "B" team schedule would be followed or not.

### Junior High Schedule

Following is the schedule the Mighty Mites will follow: Sept. 10, Baird, there; Sept. 17, Goldthwaite, here; Sept. 24, Bangs there; Oct. 1, Santa Anna, here; Oct. 8, Rising Star, here; Oct. 15, May, there; Oct. 22, Blanket, here; and Oct. 29, Early, there.

The Mighty Mites will also be under direction of Farmer and King.

## 549 Attend Classes First Day Of New School Term

Cross Plains schools jumped off to a fast and business-like start Thursday with opening-day enrollment the highest in 11 years.

Superintendent Paul Whitton reported 549 students answered initial roll calls.

"We expect a few more within a week or 10 days," he said.

This year's faculty of 27

teachers, one more than last year, permits two sections of every elementary grade and better balancing of instructional functions.

Largest grade in school is the third with 59 pupils. Miss Betty Browning's section has 30 and Miss Billie Frances Carroll's 29. In high school the largest class is the freshmen group with 54.

A record for opening day was set at the lunchroom Thursday, when 526 students took the noon meal there.

The 549 students are divided as follows: first grade 41, second 46, third 59, fourth 46, fifth 43, sixth 39, seventh 47, eighth 51, freshmen 54, sophomores 51, juniors 27 and seniors 45.

"The term is off to a good beginning and we're looking forward to a most successful session," Whitton said yesterday.

**Sept. 6, 1940:** First bale of new cotton for the Cross Plains trade territory was brought in Wednesday by Porter Lee. A premium of \$20 was awarded by local merchants and professional men.

**Sept. 13, 1940:** A local chapter of the Texas Congress of Parents and Teachers was organized Tuesday night. Primary purpose of this group's formation is to obtain a lunchroom for the local school system.

**Sept. 5, 1941:** Two school consolidation elections are pending in the near future. Voters will decide the future of Caddo Peak and Dressy schools.

**Sept. 12, 1941:** Enrollment at Cross Plains schools passed the 600 mark this week according to Leo Varner, superintendent.

**Sept. 4, 1942:** A giant junk rally is scheduled for Cross Plains Saturday. Every person is urged to give some metal to help this nation in the battle for victory.

**Sept. 11, 1942:** Mr. and Mrs. W. J. (Son) Sipes are the parents of a baby girl born Thursday afternoon. The little girl was named Rita Gay.

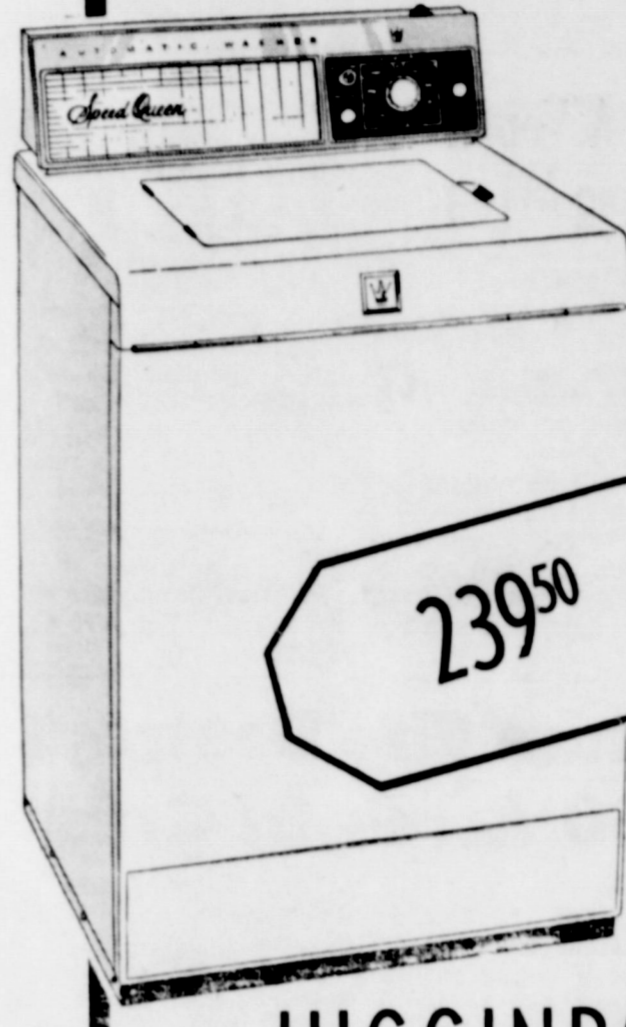

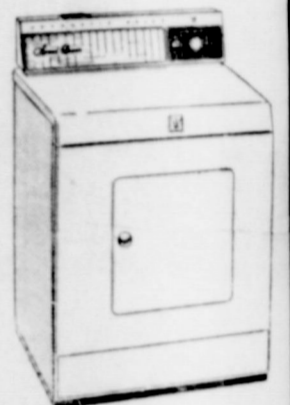

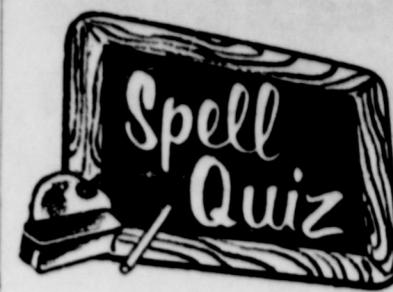
