Construction Starts On Livestock Exhibit Barn

Construction began Monday morning on the livestock exhibition building one mile north of Cross Plains on State Highway 206.

Ronnie Jacques, superintendent for McRan, Inc., of San

Angelo, contractors on the job, said yesterday the framework would be completed Friday and that installation of siding would begin immediately thereafter. "We expect to finish the building by Sept. 27," he said.

The McRan contract, which calls for a 60 by 140 feet, colored, all-steel, building, runs \$13,998.

A water well was drilled at the site last week by J. D. (Jake) Dallas and will be equipped to

supply troughs and the sewer system to serve two rest rooms. The McRan contract does not include rest rooms, plumbing, electrical wiring and equipment or many other essentials at the building.

Approaches to the seven acres — a triangular plot with roads on three sides — have been paved by the State Highway Department. The land was donated by Mrs. E. I. Vestal and her three children in memory of the late Mr. Vestal, a long-time member of the board of trustees for Cross Plains schools and a pioneer in the upbreeding of livestock herds.

Money to erect and equip the livestock building was contributed by friends and boosters of F.F.A. and 4-H Club activities. A total of \$15,800 was raised, included in which was about \$750 in labor. Of that amount about \$7,000 was given by persons who reside outside the Cross Plains area.

When completed the facility will become permanent home of Callahan County Junior Livestock Show, staged annually each January. Official designation was made recently by the exposition's executive committee.

Big Gas Well Hit South Of Burkett

A wildcat re-drilled five miles southwest of Burkett was completed as a Gray Sand gas discovery. It is Riley G. Maxwell of Abilene No. 1 M. B. Miller, located in J. D. Davidson Survey 80.

No. 1 Miller had a calculated absolute open flow of 5,050,000 cubic feet of gas daily. It is producing from perforations at 2,568-73 feet with the 4½-inch casing set at 2,610 feet.

It was formerly drilled as Oxford & Stansney Drilling Co. No. 1 Miller in 1955.

Local Boys Sweep Agriculture Show

Cross Plains High School F.F.A. Chapter dominated in the agriculture and horticulture division of the West Texas Fair at Abilene, claiming 56 prizes and winning \$175 in cash awards. The unit took 21 firsts, 16 seconds, 9 thirds and 10 fourths.

In addition to the sweep of the agriculture and horticulture division, the Cross Plains chapter won second place with its educational booth, competing against 18 other entries.

Bangs Hands Buffaloes 18-6 Initial Game Loss

Although Cross Plains stastically outplayed host Bangs last Friday night, the Draons opportunely bested the Buffaloes 18-6.

The Buffs collected more first downs, 10 to six, and netted more yards rushing, 104 to 97, but lost fumbles and defensive lapses cost the local gridders their third straight loss, including 1962 season, and a like number of consecutive opening game defeats.

Bangs, which scored in the first, third and fourth quarters, was an ever-present threat with two solid halfbacks in Jimmy White and Jimmy Rust and a powerful fullback, Ray Findley, who was used sparingly but very effectively around the goal line. The lone Cross Plains tally came with a mere nine seconds remaining on the scoreboard.

Dragons Build Lead

In the initial quarter Bangs took the lead on a six-play drive covering 44 yards. Findley, 180 pound fullback, ripped through a hole at right tackle for 19 yards and the hosts' first touchdown. He tried the same play on the two-point conversion but was stopped short.

Cross Plains' only serious threat of the first half was stopped by the clock with the Buffs in possession on the Dragon 11.

After returning from intermission it took the white-shirted Dragons just 45 seconds to hang up another six points.

On the kickoff Findley fielded the pigskin deep in his own territory. He ran to the right, handed off to White on the reverse at the 25 and White scampered down the left side to the Buffalo 12 before Reggie Stover slipped through interference to stop him.

But in two plays Findley got the dozen yards crashing into paydirt on a five-yard jaunt. Buff Jim Brown nixed the two-point attempt with an intercept of a Dragon aerial.

Three Buffalo fumbles handed Bangs the third tally. Dragon Johnny Snider, who recovered two of the three bobbles, captured the loose ball on the Cross Plains nine yard line. Rust's five yard circle of right end set the stage for White's four-yard blast across the goal line. Again the Buffs defense halted a two-point conversion-try by Rust.

Buff's Score

Left halfback Tommy Purvis crashed over from one yard out for the only Bison tally capping a 61-yard drive.

The halfbacks also carried

the brunt of the attack each carrying the mail four times in the 10-play march. Largest gainer of the drive was a 12-yard pass from quarterback Jack Baum to right half Stover on the Bangs' 20.

A pass from Baum to Stover was incomplete on the two-point conversion-try.

Defensive stand-outs for Bangs were Rust, Findley and Snider. Buffaloes excelling at defense were Baum, Jay Hutchins and Charles Barr, fullback, who was credited with the locals' longest ground gainer of the night, a 14-yard spurt.

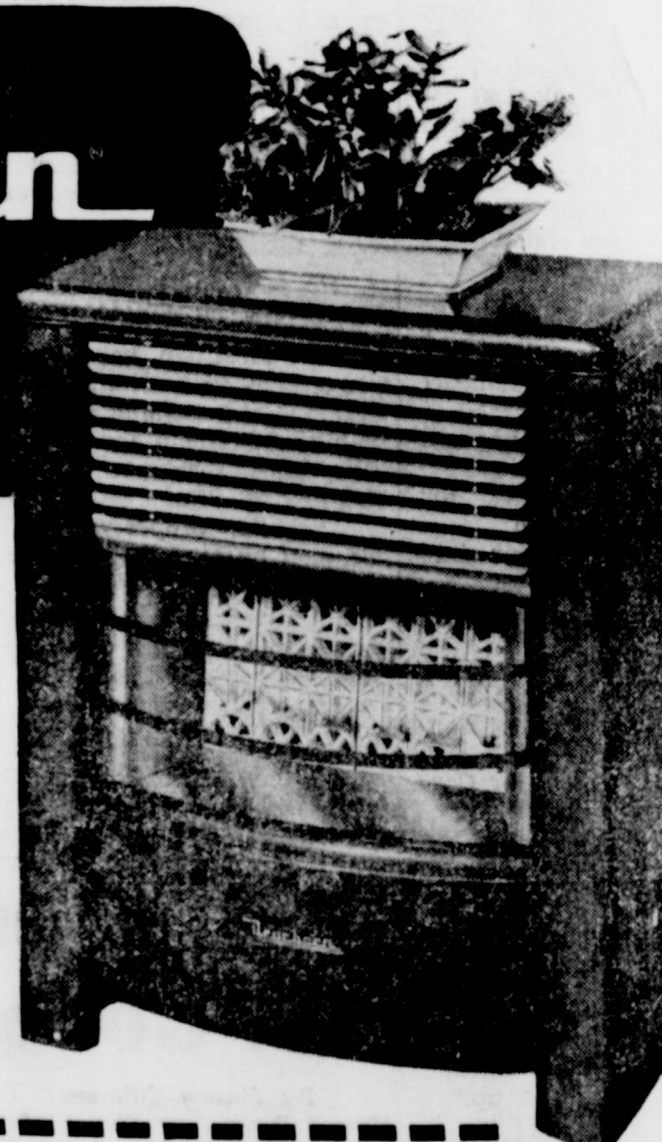

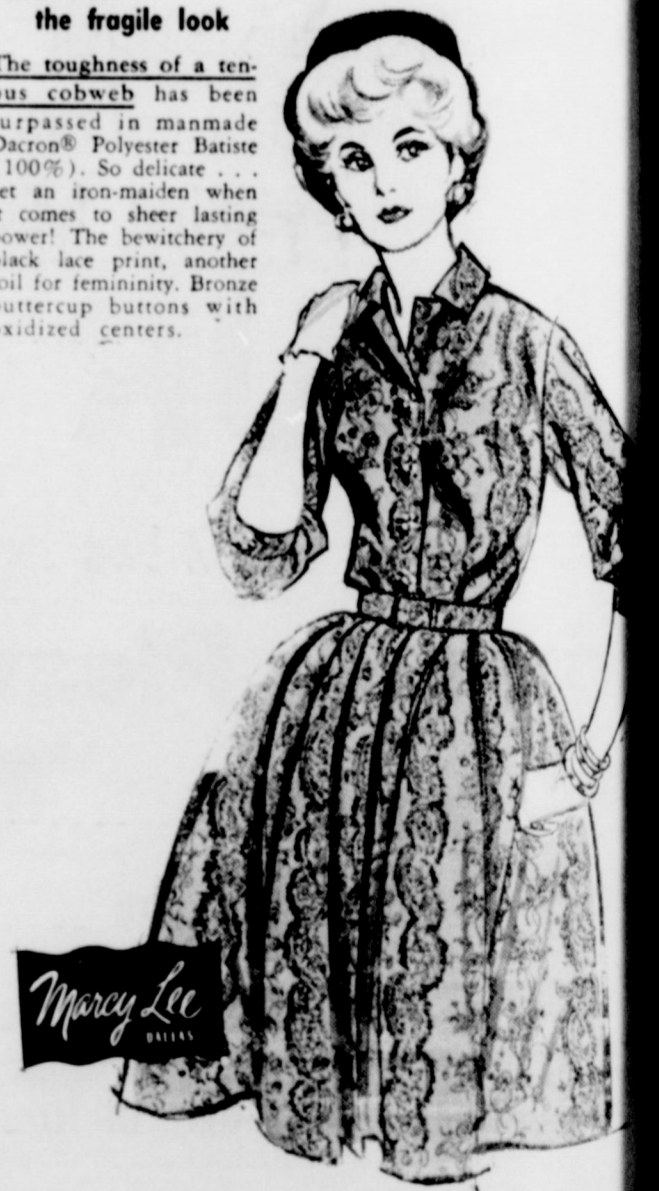

Council Gets Engineer's Data On Water Outlook

Members of the City Council were submitted copies of a preliminary engineering report of the local water situation by National Engineering Company of Austin Tuesday night and are now studying the 30-page report. The firm was retained in March of this year.

One of the report was that existing facilities are presently yielding near their potential and that five other possibilities merit study.

Mentioned as possibilities were: (1) a proposed dam to be built in conjunction with the Soil Conservation Service, eight miles west of here (2) entering into an arrangement with Rising Star to bring water from Brownwood Lake (3) building a new lake, together with the City of Rising Star, near the old Humble Lake, about midway between the two towns (4) utilizing existing Soil Conservation Lakes with increases in sizes, and (5) securing water rights in an area of strong wells about six miles northeast of here.

The engineering report will be summarized by the Review and published in these columns next week.

The couple will make their home in Odessa, where he is employed by El Paso Natural Gas Co.

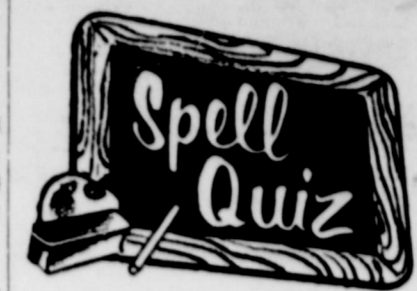
QUARTERBACK FOR '79 BORN TO COACH, WIFE
