Thieves Use Keys To Rob 4 Soft Drink Boxes Here

A modern technique was employed by thieves Sunday night to loot vending machines in Cross Plains.

Falkner Service Station and at the Perry Jennings Humble Station were robbed of an estimated \$70. Four machines — a Coca Cola and a Dr. Pepper box

at each place — were robbed. Investigating officers found that the machines were opened by use of keys. The machines were not damaged and nothing

was apparently taken but cash. The same technique was used in robbing a soft drink box at a Humble station in Rising Star, operated by Elgie Crisp. The loss there was said to be around \$15.

Exact time of any of the robberies remains an enigma, however, officers fixed the time after 10 p.m. Sunday night. None of the stations closed before that time.

Deputy Sheriff N. L. Long, Jr., who was investigating the theft Monday and Tuesday, opined that it was the work of professionals. All stations hit were on a highway, believed most likely to attract attention of thieves.

"It may develop," Long said, "that other places were robbed; owners might not be aware of the loss until the cash boxes are opened on the machines. Sometimes this is not done until they are serviced."

Jack Peters, 81, Succumbs Sunday

Walter Jackson Peters, 81, long-time resident of the Cross Plains area, died early Sunday morning in the Blackwell Hospital in Gorman. He had been in declining health several years.

Funeral was held at 2:30 p.m. Monday in the Church of Christ here with the minister of the Rising Star Church of Christ, H. McDonald, officiating. Burial was in the Cross Plains Cemetery, with Higginbotham Funeral Home in charge.

He was born Aug. 28, 1882, in Alabama, and married Perla Mae Bell in Cottonwood in 1903. They lived in the Sabanno community before moving to Cross Plains 12 years ago. Mr. Peters was a retired farmer and construction worker.

Survivors are his wife; two brothers, Claude of Pomona, Calif., and Joe of Upton, Calif.; four grandchildren, Tommie D. Hinkle, Harold D. Hinkle, Betty J. Hollingshead and Mildred G. Roberts; and 12 great-grandchildren.

Pallbearers were Oscar Schaefer, Truitt Dawkins, Dan Notgrass, C. W. Richter, Kermit Pierce and Bud Galson.

Welfare Programs Face Voters Preference In Nov. 9th Election

Editor's Note: This is the second of a series of four articles dealing with proposed amendments to the state constitution to be balloted upon by Texans Nov. 9.

Proposition number two on ballot would bring together under one amendment four public welfare programs: old age assistance, aid of the blind, aid to dependent children and aid to individuals who are permanently and totally disabled.

The major results of the proposed amendment are (1) to eliminate any constitutional requirements of residence in the state in order to be eligible for state assistance, leaving to the Legislature the decision as to what residence requirements should be; (2) to eliminate dollar restrictions on the amount of assistance which may be given to individuals, and on the total amount which may be spent

for any one program and (3) to set an over-all limit of \$60,000,000 per year on State funds which may be used for all four programs.

The Constitution now provides that needy citizens of Texas, in order to qualify for old age assistance, aid to the blind or aid to disabled persons, must have resided in the state five out of the last nine years including continuous residence for the one year immediately preceding application. Needy children who are citizens of Texas must have continuously resided in the state for one year preceding application. If the child is less than one year old, its mother must have continuously resided in the state for one year preceding application.

The proposed amendment would rescind these requirements and in their place provide

that the Legislature prescribe residence requirements for eligibility. Present laws contain residence requirements stipulated in the Constitution. If this amendment carries, the Legislature could, of course, change these laws to increase or decrease or eliminate entirely residence requirements.

Presently the maximum amount which can be paid from the State to needy aged persons is \$25 per month, the maximum to disabled persons is \$20 monthly. The proposed amendment would strike out both of these limitations. A proposed limit of \$60,000,000 annually for these four programs would be a five and one-half million increase over present authorization.

Last year the Constitution was amended to increase state aid for the needy aged, needy blind

and needy children by \$5,000,000, and to increase aid to permanently and totally disabled persons by \$1,000,000. The Legislature has not yet appropriated any of the additional money, except that it increased the amount for disabled persons by \$83,000 for the first year and \$190,000 for the second year.

Residence requirements and dollar limitations were written into the Constitution in recognition of pressures on the Legislature and executive agencies in the administration of public welfare programs.

Proponents of the amendment have pointed out that present residence requirements are the maximum which the federal government will allow and continue matching state funds. They feel that, as a result of continued pressures at the national level, federal legislation

may be adopted which would require lower residence requirements and Texas might get caught without time left to go through the detailed process of submitting a constitutional amendment. There are others who argue that the federal government would have to recognize the time needed by the states to adjust their laws and that Texas would have plenty of time to meet the situation when it arrived.

In the fiscal year ending August 1, 1962, \$171,500,000 was spent on these four programs in Texas, not including administrative costs or medical care. Of this amount, \$48,500,000 came from state funds and \$123,000,000 from the federal treasury.

In accepting or rejecting this amendment, voters will be saying whether or not they approve

elimination of these basic residence standards for eligibility and elimination of controls over expenditures for individual programs which they have heretofore considered desirable. In 1951 a proposed constitutional amendment to eliminate residence requirements failed to carry by a vote of 132,440 to 105,024.

The idea of allowing the Legislature to reduce or eliminate residence requirements disturbs some, who say that people from other states would be allowed to move into Texas and claim aid which should go only to persons who have roots here. Citizens most disturbed by this proposal insist, however, that there is no purpose in making the constitutional change unless it is feared that some future Legislature may want to reduce or repeal existing standards.
