Ex-Local Man Dies In .5-Story Plunge

A 41-year-old former Cross Plains man plunged to his death Wednesday morning of last week while working on an of fice building under construction at Houston. He was a carpenter

M. C. Green died at 11:30 a.m. when he fell from the fifth story of the structure. Witnesses said he was working on a concrete form at the edge of the building. He had told co-workers that he was going to get some nails. He walked about 15 feet before he lost his footing and tumbled over the side.

His body smashed against reinforcing structures and the concrete of the building before falling into a basement, witnesses reported.

Funeral was held from Higginbotham chapel in Cross Plains Friday afternoon at three o'clock with Minister Dewey Meek of Rising Star officiating. Burial was in Cross Plains Cemetery.
