Cross Plains Voters Set State's Pattern

As Cross Plains went in Saturday's election, so went the state.

Only one of four proposed amendments to Texas' Constitution won approval of local voters. The same results was statewide.

Proposition number two on Saturday's ballot, which concerned welfare payments, gained approval here, 91 for and 64 against. Returns from Texas Election Bureau indicated that

it had won by about the same 3 to 2 margin across the state.

Franzel Odom, who served as election judge in Cross Plains Saturday, reported 160 ballots were polled here. The local vote was:

Poll tax repeal: 36 for and 125 against.

Welfare payments: 91 for and 64 against.

Jefferson County pensions: 35 for and 107 against.

Veterans land fund: 74 for and 77 against.

Livestock Show Set In New Barn Here Jan. 11

Jan. 11 has been designated date for Callahan County Junior Livestock Show to be held in the newly-completed facilities in Cross Plains.

County Agent Pat Garner said Monday that 322 entries are assured.

Competition will be divided into nine classes: fat steers, breeding beef cattle, fat lambs, breeding sheep and goats, market barrows, breeding swine, dairy cattle, poultry and rabbits.

Judges for all divisions except rabbits have been lined up. They will be: C. A. Stone, Gillespie County Agent, beef cattle; T. W. Colby, associate professor of animal husbandry at A.C.C.,

dairy and swine divisions; Wuery Menzies, Concho County Agent, fat lambs; Harold Pittard, vocational agriculture instructor at Novice, breeding sheep and goats, and Marvin Weber, poultry.

Week End Rains Helpful But Stock Water Needed

Rainfall in Cross Plains last week end measured 1.73 inches. Fall was general over much of this section of Texas, however, many nearby localities gauged upward of two inches.

The precipitation brought to 16.33 inches of rain received here during the first 281 days of 1963.

The rain fell gently. Most all soaked in. While it was said to be of great benefit to recently-planted small grains and Winter pastures, it brought little relief to livestockmen in need of additional surface water.

Reports on the rainfall from other points in the Cross Plains area included these: Rowden store 1.90, Cross Cut 2.06, Cottonwood store 2.25, Sabanno 1.90, Pioneer 2.25, Atwell 1.90.

Judge Jack Pope, brother of Bill Pope of Cross Plains, has announced as a candidate for the Supreme Court of Texas, aspiring to the seat being vacated by Judge Frank Cluver, who is retiring.

Judge Pope is a graduate of Abilene High School, took his BA degree from ACC, and is a graduate of the University of Texas Law School. He began practice of law in Corpus Christi, was appointed judge of 94th District Court in 1946 and later elected to a full term. He ran for the Court of Civil Appeals in San Antonio in 1950 and defeated three opponents without a runoff. He has since been reelected twice without opposition.

Clyde Clips Rallying Herd 39 - 22 Friday

Clyde's Bulldogs got 36 points early here Friday and coasted to a 39-22 victory, tacking the 11th straight defeat to Cross Plains' longest losing streak in history.

Although the Bulldogs controlled the game and started fast, the Buffaloes scored more points Friday than in the entire previous season.

Bufs Retaliate
The Herd displayed its most powerful offensive thrust in the losing cause, racking up 14 first downs, 178 yards rushing and 44 in the air.

Trailing 36-0, Buffaloes began a march which covered 66 yards and took five and a half minutes. Left halfback Bobby McMillan capped the 13-play drive with a two-yard slant.

Right halfback Reggie Stover then cracked over the right side for Cross Plains' first successful conversion of the season.

Late in the third period, the Herd began its second TD blitz.

Quarterback Joe Pierce and center Ronnie Rhodes collaborated to recover a Clyde fumble to set the tally in motion. A 31-yard pass and run from Pierce to left end Alvin Parrish was the key play on the 42-yard, 5-play spurt. Two, two-yard blasts by fullback Jim Brown climaxed the thrust, but he was collared on the two point try.

Top Output

Midway of the final quarter Stover exceeded Cross Plains' previous season scoring total. He scampered through a big hole at right tackle from three yards out for locals' 20th point.

Brown then went up the middle for two more points. The march moved 50 yards in 14 plays and resulted after right end Eddie Don Edmondson had jarred the pigskin loose from a Bulldog on a fourth down gamble.

Dennis Romps

Tailback Ricky Dennis sped his way to 16 points in leading the visitors to a 36-8 halftime advantage.

Quarterback Buddy Howe got Clyde started to a 23-point first period with a 13-yard bootleg around right end. Dennis ripped through right tackle for two points. Four minutes later Dennis left Bufs flatfooted on a 75-yard romp, and cracked over the right side for two more points.

Later the speedster ran a punt back 50 yards for a TD, but a penalty nullified it. But

in just three plays he regained the six points on a 32-yard sweep of right end. Fullback Edward Ramos kicked the point.

Tailback Connie Ramos got Clyde's fourth tally with a one-yard plunge after Dennis had set it up with a 33-yard gallop. Howe again split the uprights. Thirty-one seconds later right end George Dyer intercepted an errant Buff aerial and skipped 43 yards down the sideline for Clyde's final touchdown. Howe's kick was wide.

Field Goal

Fans were treated to a feat of growing importance to high school football in the third canto. Clyde's Edward Ramos booted a field goal from the right hash mark from the 10.

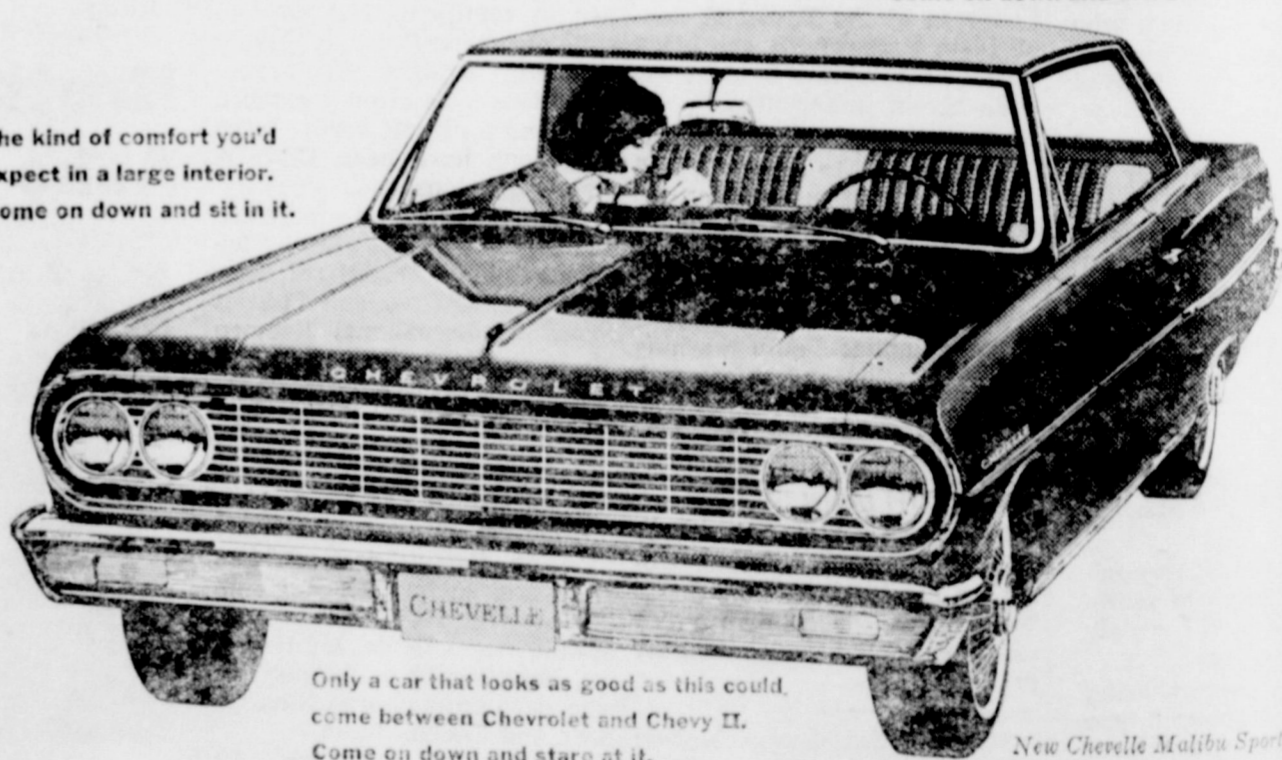

Main Street Cross Plains

Cross Plains Is A City Of Interesting Houses

Old houses like old people are packed with memories.

Cross Plains has many dwellings which have stood for more than half a century and been the focal point of life's most dramatic moments: births, deaths, marriages, family reunions and gay parties.

Complete history of the old houses may never be recorded for those who knew their stories are no longer present to recount them.

Contractor for first dwellings built in the new townsite was W. B. Williams, present owner and operator of a planing mill here.

"I attended the town lot sale the afternoon of Jan. 12, 1911, he said recently, "and when the auction was completed I immediately contracted for six new structures."

He built two at once. Both were three-room, boxed houses. One still stands. The other was destroyed by fire. The dwelling which is yet here is that owned by Mrs. Ben Hargrove at the corner of Main and 12th streets, just north of the Church of Christ. It has since been added to and extensively modernized.

Williams also built houses that year for: Jack Aiken, John Barr, Roy Bond, Gray Powell and possibly others, whose names he fails to recall. Simultaneously he did the wood work for all the brick buildings on the west side of Main, between 8th and 9th streets.

Master carpenters made \$3 per day here 52 years ago and ordinary laborers got one-half that amount. Three of Williams' \$3-a-day-men who still reside here were Berry D. Bell, Chess Barr and John Price.

"They were good carpenters and really gave you a day's work," he says.

There are in Cross Plains, however, many houses older than those built by Williams. The place now owned by Jim Baum was constructed by his grandfather, the late J. M. Coffman, in 1898. Some of the material in that building dates back to another house constructed by Mr. Coffman in the old town in 1882.

The dwelling owned and occupied by Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Butler on West Highway 36 was finished in 1910 and has been occupied by that couple through the intervening 52 years.

The house owned by Mrs. T. C. Weiss and Mrs. Russell Lovelless, at the corner of 9th Street and Avenue D, was built for the late Mr. and Mrs. E. F. Bond in 1911. It originally contained seven rooms and two large porches and cost \$2,200.

C. H. Dawson's home on South Main Street was built in 1911 by the late Mr. and Mrs. E. F. (Frank) Harlow. It was one of the new town's first two-story structures.

One of the few buildings in the present business section

here, to be moved from the old town, near the banks of Turkey Creek, is the feed store on South Main, owned and used by W. T. (Tom) Cox. In the old town the building housed a store first owned by J. A. Summers, who later formed a partnership with Pelic Smith.

Another building here which originally came from the old town is the Cromer Hotel. It was owned and operated as a holstery by S. F. Bond before removal. The hotel in the old town was smaller than the present one. It was two stories, though, and took in most of the present building. Cost of building in the old town was \$2,000. It was enlarged when moved to the present location. First owner and operator in the new town was the late J. H. Kemper and the place was known far and wide as the Kemper Hotel.

The two-story house at the corner of Avenue D and 7th Street, just across the street east of the S. N. Foster place, was once a school building and stood west of the cemetery. When a new school became necessary the building was bought and torn down by Jim and Tom Cross. They rebuilt and modernized the house at its present location. Present owners are Rev. and Mrs. J. E. Robertson.

The Ed Richardson place on East 8th Street has been rebuilt, however, it was originally one of the first houses in the area which presently comprises the new city limits. It was constructed shortly after the turn of the century.

Mrs. Ed Baum's home at the corner of Avenue D and 8th Street was constructed by a retired lumberman in 1913. Early families to reside there were the M. E. Wakefields and the F. M. Gwinns.

The home owned by Mr. and Mrs. Mack Childers at the corner of 8th Street and Avenue B was originally built by Williams in 1911 for Wylie Jones and was at that time one of the town's show places.

Contracting has changed a lot since the present-day planing mill man first plied his trade here. "In those days every job in-

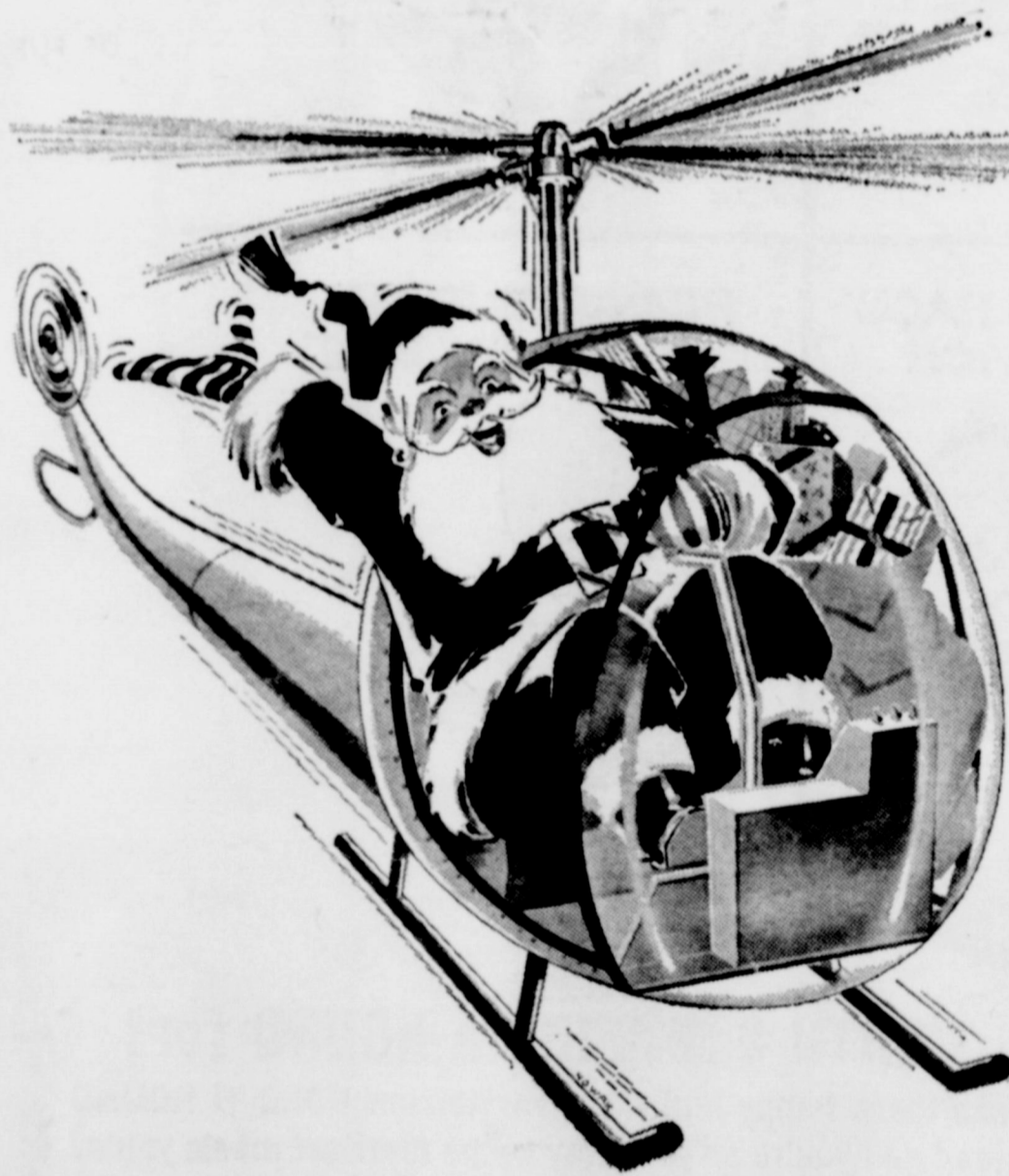

Texas New Hot Check Law Imposes Severe Penalties

Editor's Note: Texas' newly-enacted worthless check law is published here to acquaint the public with its provisions and in the hope of preventing local persons being victimized by swindlers.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. Sections 1, 2, 3, and 4 of Acts 1939, Forty-sixth Legislature, Chapter 17, as amended by Acts 1951, Fifty-second Legislature, Chapter 205, and Section 1a, Acts 1939, Forty-sixth Legislature, Chapter 17, as added by Acts 1957, Fifty-fifth Legislature, Chapter 33 (codified as Article 567b, Vernon's Texas Penal Code are hereby amended to read as follows:

"Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person or firm to make draw, utter, or deliver, or to cause or direct the making, drawing, uttering or delivering with intent to defraud, any check, draft or order for the payment of money on any bank, person, firm or corporation knowing that the maker, drawer or payor does not have sufficient funds in or on deposit with such bank, person, firm or corporation for the payment in full of such check, draft or order, as well as other outstanding checks, drafts or orders upon such funds then outstanding

"Section 2. As against the maker or drawer thereof, or the person causing the making, drawing, uttering or delivering of any check, draft or order, the making, drawing, uttering or delivering, or causing or directing the making, drawing, uttering or delivering of a check, draft or order, payment of which is refused by the drawee, shall be prima facie evidence of intent to defraud and of knowledge of insufficient funds in, or on deposit with, such bank, person, firm or corporation, provided such maker or drawer shall not have paid the holder thereof the amount due thereon, within the (10) days after giving of such notice that such check, draft or order has been paid by the drawee.

Sec. 3. Notice as used herein shall be notice in writing sent by registered or certified mail or telegram addressed to such person and firm at the place listed on the check, draft or order, and proof of compliance with this Section shall constitute prima facie evidence that such notice was given.

"Sec. 4. (a) For the first conviction of a violation of this Act, in the event the amount of the check, draft or order given on any bank, person, firm or corporation is less than Fifty Dollars (\$50), punishment shall be by imprisonment in the county jail for not exceeding two (2) years, and by a fine not exceeding One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000).

"(b) If it be shown on the trial of a case involving a violation of this Act in which the check, draft or order given on any bank, person, firm or corporation is less than Fifty Dollars (\$50), that the defendant has two (2) or more times before been convicted of the same offense, regardless of the amount of the check, draft or order involved in the first two (2) convictions, upon the third or any subsequent conviction, the punishment shall be by confinement in the penitentiary for

not less than two (2) nor more than ten (10) years.

"(d) For a violation of this Act, in the event the amount of the check, draft or order is Fifty Dollars (\$50) or more, punishment shall be by confinement in the penitentiary for not less than two (2) years nor more than ten (10) years.

"Section 5. In all prosecutions under this Act, process shall be issued and served in the county or out of the county where prosecution is pending and have the same binding force and effect as though the offense being prosecuted were a felony; and all officers issuing and serving such process in or out of the county where in the prosecution is pending, and all witnesses from within or without the county wherein the prosecution is pending shall be compensated in like manner as though the offense were a felony in grade.

"Sec. 6. If any person who

has theretofore filed a complaint with any district or county attorney of this State alleging a violation of this Act, or who has furnished information to any such district or county attorney which has resulted in the acceptance by such district or county attorney of such complaint, or who has testified concerning such a violation before a grand jury of this State which has thereafter returned an indictment on such violation, shall suggest to or request the county or district attorney in charge of such prosecution, that such case be dismissed, he shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined not less than One Hundred Dollars (\$100), nor more than Five Hundred Dollars (\$500).

"Sec. 2. If any section, subsection, clause, phrase or sentence of this Act is for any reason held to be unconstitutional or invalid, such decision shall not

affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Act. The Legislature hereby declares that it would have passed this Act and each section, subsection, clause, phrase or sentence thereof, irrespective of the fact that one or more of the sections, subsections, clauses, phrases or sentences be declared unconstitutional.

Sec. 3. The fact that the changes made by this Act are necessary to make the law clear and definite respecting the use of bad checks to defraud, to remove certain specific classifications which are better covered

in general prohibitions, and to make other desirable changes in existing law, and the crowded condition of the Calendars in both Houses create an emergency and an imperative public necessity that the Constitutional Rule requiring bills to be read on three several days in each House be suspended and this Rule is hereby suspended.

Passed the House, May 3, 1963, by a non-record vote; passed the Senate, on May 15, 1963, by a viva-voce vote.

Approved May 30, 1963. Effective 90 days after May 24, 1963, date of adjournment.

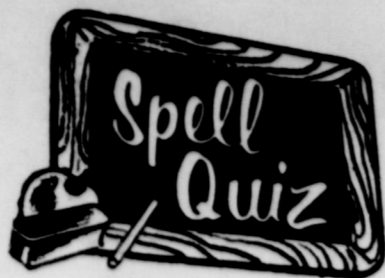

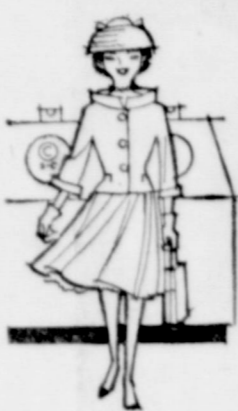
