Judge Jack Pope, brother of Bill Pope of Cross Plains, has announced as a candidate for the Supreme Court of Texas, aspiring to the seat being vacated by Judge Frank Cluver, who is retiring.

Judge Pope is a graduate of Abilene High School, took his BA degree from ACC, and is a graduate of the University of Texas Law School. He began practice of law in Corpus Christi, was appointed judge of 94th District Court in 1946 and later elected to a full term. He ran for the Court of Civil Appeals in San Antonio in 1950 and defeated three opponents without a runoff. He has since beeen reelected twice without opposition.

The water strata was topped at 270 feet. It is believed softer virgin water field, was topped than water presently being used here. City officials plan, however, to have chemical and hardness analyses made in Austin.

If the first well proves as abundant as is currently believed, plans are to drill at least two more holes to that depth in the general vicinity of the discovery well to check the size of the water deposit.

Water commissioner Ira Hall and Mayor Ted Souder say there would be little pumping cost in getting the water to town. Location of the new strike is believed to be more than 100 feet above that of the town. They opined that it would flow into settling basins here by gravity.

Approximately seven miles of pipeline - either six or eight inches in diameter - will probably be laid if the new wells are placed in production.
