Poll Tax Receipts Are Issued To 474

Poll tax payments in Callahan County continue to run below the normal pace for an election year.

Tax Assessor-Collector Albert Lovell reported Monday at noon that 474 voting certificates had been issued to that time, as compared with 624 to the same period two years ago. In 1963 — not an election year — 541 poll tax receipts had been issued to this date.

Deadline for paying poll taxes in time to acquire voting privilege is January 31. Voters may pay the \$1.75 stipend at the Citizens State Bank in Cross Plains or at the courthouse in Baird.

BAND BOOSTERS WILL OPERATE CONCESSION

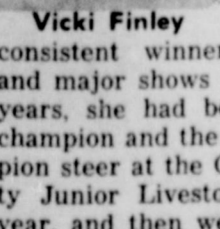
Cross Plains Band Boosters Club will operate a concession stand at the County Junior Livestock Show here Saturday.

Her middle-weight steer, Richard, sold for \$3,000, bringing to about \$10,000 the amount won by the Callahan County girl during her career as a live stock exhibitor. All animals will be in place by Saturday at 9 a.m., when judging begins in three divisions of the show, dairy cattle, poultry and rabbits. Byron Wilson of Abilene will judge rabbits. Marvin Weber, also of Abilene, will be the poultry judge. T. W. Colby, professor of agriculture at Abilene Christian College, will judge dairy cattle and swine.

Judging will begin of entries in the swine division at 9:30 Saturday morning. Beef cattle judging is scheduled to start at noon with Dub Sims of Eastland as judge, and fat lambs and breeding sheep and goats will be judged simultaneously starting at 3 p.m. Fat lambs will be judged by Duery Mendies of Concho County. Harold Pittard of Novice will judge the goats and breeding sheep. Announcement of winners in all division as well as victors in individual contests will be revealed at five o'clock.

James Snyder of Baird, president of the Callahan show, will serve as master of ceremonies throughout the day and present winning exhibitors and donors of three showmanship awards. A showmanship trophy in the beef cattle division will be given by Mr. and Mrs. Frank Windham, prominent Callahan County ranchers. Showmanship award in the sheep division will be donated by Bill Pope of Cross Plains, well-known breeder of outstanding Rambouillets. The swine division trophy has been provided by the Peoples State Bank of Clyde, of which Weldon Edwards, chairman of the board, is a long-time director in the local show.

Superintendents of various divisions of the show will be: dairy cattle, Hilton Tarrant, assisted by C. Lee Smith; breeding sheep, James Herring, assisted by Glen Wooten; fat lambs, Charley Straley, assisted by Tommy Johnson; goats, Nathan Foster; beef cattle, D. C. Cox, assisted by N. L. Long, Jr.; swine, L. M. (Mel) Green, assisted by Tommy Spears; poultry and rabbits, Lee Abernathy, assisted by Clarence Millorn.

Grand champions in all divisions of the Callahan County Show will be entered in the Abilene Livestock Exhibition, beginning one week later. Several reserve champions and outstanding individual animals from the show here will also go to Abilene.

After Abilene, Callahan F.F.A. and 4-H exhibitors will compete in five major Texas shows. They are Fort Worth, El Paso, San Antonio, Houston and San Angelo.

Jan. 7, 1949: Voters of this commissioners precinct approved a \$75,000 bond issue Friday for the improvement of Lateral roads by a majority of more than 10 to one. The count was 239 for and 23 against.

Jan. 6, 1950: Politicians making announcement in Review are: J. Lester Farmer and M. W. (Dickie) Huntington, County Judge; L. C. Cash, Ed Sunderman, and B. C.
