



Service Station Attendant, 23, Slain By Armed Robber Early Wednesday

Johnny Charles Maner, 23, died shortly before two o'clock Wednesday morning after having been attacked and robbed at the service station at the highway crossroads four miles west of Rowden.

Found Alive

He was found in a puddle of blood and barely alive by M. L. Beasley of Bryan, a truck

driver, who pulled into the station about 1:30 a.m. Beasley telephoned Baird officers and Highway Patrolman Bob Favor sped to the scene. Maner died, however, before the officer arrived.

Autopsy Ordered

It was believed that Maner, who was alone at the station at the time, was shot. Only

mark on the body was a cut, or hole, in his eyebrow. The wound had bled profusely but it could not be definitely labeled a bullet penetration. Justice of the Peace Garvin Jones of Baird ordered an autopsy and post mortem surgery was being performed at mid-morning Wednesday.

The victim lived with his

mother at Clyde and had been employed at the station since December. Mrs. E. D. Roberson of Baird is a sister.

\$85 Stolen

Jimmy Roy Higgins of Baird, operator of the station and employer of the murder victim, said that an estimated \$85 had been stolen from the cash register. Maner's billfold was found

on the floor near his body. It too, had been looted.

Deputy Sheriff N. L. Long, Jr. of Cross Plains, who with other Callahan County officers hurried to the scene as news of the crime broke, said that finger-prints were being taken. The station was in charge of officers at mid-morning Wednesday and nothing was being

allowed touched or moved until finger-printing and photographing were complete.

In addition to Favor and Long, other officers working on the case were: Sheriff Homer Price, Deputy Sheriff Tod Newton, Texas Ranger Earl Stewart of Brownwood and Callahan County Attorney James Paul Shanks.

49 Jurors Summoned For Goat Theft Case

Forty-nine persons have been summoned to appear in Baird Monday morning at nine o'clock for possible jury service. A case charging livestock theft is due to be heard by District Judge J. R. Black at that time.

Case to be tried is that in which Loyd Gary of near Cottonwood is charged with theft of goats from Claude Joy last November. Indictment was returned by grand jurors in January after having heard testimony from Deputy Sheriff N. L. Long, Jr., Special Ranger H. F. Fenton, Jr. of Coleman and Joy.

The jury panel is composed of 23 from Baird, 12 from Clyde, 10 from Cross Plains, three who live on Cisco routes and one from Putnam. Of the 49 summoned, 17 are women.

3rd Oldest Citizen Of City Dies At 94

J. W. (Pappy) Cox, 94, Cross Plains' third oldest citizen, died at his home in the west part of town Tuesday morning after an illness of three months. He was a retired pipeline and farmer and had resided here 38 years.

Funeral services were scheduled for Thursday at 4 p.m. from Higginbotham's Chapel in Cross Plains with Elder C. V. Landers, a Primitive Baptist minister, officiating. Burial was to be in Cross Plains Cemetery.

Born in Marshall County, Miss., Oct. 17, 1869, just after the Civil War, Mr. Cox came to Texas when he was six years of age, settling first in Dallas County and later moving to Denton. He married Texana Elizabeth McKeown at Sulphur Springs in 1891 and with his bride moved to Indian Territory, what is now Oklahoma. The Coxes farmed there and came to know the Chickashas well. "They were peaceful people and good neighbors," he used to tell local friends in describing those years.

From Oklahoma the Coxes moved to New Mexico and Mrs. Cox died there in 1924. The following year "Pappy," as the deceased was widely known, brought his family to Cross Plains.

Survivors include five children: John Calvin Cox of Copperas Cove, M. Cox of Mesa, Ariz., and Mrs. Georgia Graham, Shirley and Jo Ben of Cross Plains; one brother, R. B. Cox of Los Angeles; two sisters, Mrs. George Adkins of Exter, Calif., and Mrs. W. H. Moore of Clovis, N. M.; 10 grandchildren and 15 great-grandchildren.

Marshal Ordered To Halt Beer Bottle Litter At Park

Cross Plains City Park, which was beginning to look more like a dump ground than a place of recreation, is getting remedial attention.

The grounds have been almost covered in recent weeks with beer cans, broken bottles and assorted litter. Garbage receptacles are available but seldom used.

City Councilmen have ordered a bullwire fence built along the west side of the park, which will be locked each afternoon at sunset by the city marshal. Persons wishing to use the grounds after dark must henceforth make arrangements with the officer and see that the fence is locked upon departure.

In addition the city marshal is being instructed to patrol the park area regularly and

file charges against any found guilty of littering or creating a public nuisance.

Councilmen point out that efforts to keep the park clean and useful for family and group picnics has been almost impossible. The broken glass is reported to be so bad now that it presents a hazard to children playing as well as being completely unsightly.

Lights installed at the park have been knocked out. They are to be placed back in operation and more closely watched, councilmen say.

The veteran Callahan County lawman filed as a candidate for reelection as sheriff in December, then in January withdrew with the intention of retiring at the end of the present term.

When he filed for reelection, Price said "I feel that experience gained in the sheriff's office now renders me capable of serving you completely and more efficiently during the four years ahead."

Price's filing fee was paid before he withdrew from the race. Filing fees are not refunded.

Names to appear on the ballot are W. C. Edwards, James Day, A. H. Turner and N. L. Long. Tod Newton also filed for the office, but withdrew on his doctor's orders.

Screwworms Gone But Stockmen Can't Relax

Not a single case of screwworms in Texas livestock herds has been reported in 12 consecutive weeks, announced Callahan County Agent Pat C. Garner Monday.

"Producers must be alert for the next few weeks," he cautioned, "as the time of year for infestation is at hand."

Screwworm flies usually begin northward migration from Mexico late in March. They are known to travel as far as 180 miles. The eradication program extends 200 miles into Mexico at some points, aimed at preventing a penetration of the screwworm barrier. At other places, though, the barrier is only 100 miles wide and

lack of funds prevents a broadening.

"A fertile fly could slip through," Garner warns, "bringing contamination which could spread rapidly."

Remedy is for farmers and ranchers to maintain a close vigil, watching their herds carefully and reporting first outbreak of infestation believed to be screwworms, he explains. Samples will be checked at Mission and if screwworms are detected, infertile flies will be flown to the contaminated ranch or farm.

"The screwworm program is not over," Garner emphasizes, "we must keep up our guard."

Writing a newspaper column is something like looking for a big family. The one must be constantly engaged and garnished. Otherwise regulars tire of the same old diet.

There's a switch in today's diet. This column is an assortment of reminiscences on a lazy Spring afternoon, some seen, some heard, but local in origin.

This town was once a hotbed for professional gambling. An arena just north of the water tower was used to stage a big billiard tournament every Saturday night. Billy Brown was the promoter and home town favorite.

W. H. McCarty, who built the world-famous Brook Hotel and who is reported to have made \$1,000,000 before he was 21, was a "home town" at Putnam back in the early 1920's, when the town teemed with oil ac-

Cross Plains once had a soda water bottling plant.

One of America's best combat aviators of World War I — they were called Air Aces then — was Sabanno lad, Bill Erwin. He lost his life attempting to be the first to fly from the mainland to Hawaii.

Cross Plains schools had 10 grades until 1924.

A Rising Star boy once strung a high wire strung between the tops of the two-story buildings at the corner of Main and 8th Streets here. He performed the feat for a bill.

Two men who shot it out with a pistol duel at Cottonwood are buried in the same grave there.

Probably the world's only train school on rails was which used to be held regularly on the train which ran from Cross Plains to Denton. The conductor, "Skip" Wright, would herd passengers and crewmen in the baggage car for a Bible lesson each Sabbath morning.

Largest deposit ever made at a Cross Plains bank was one for \$200,000, cashed through a teller's window by the late Tom Bryant.

Five books have been published dealing with the life and works of Robert E. Howard, Cross Plains writer, who died June 11, 1936. He was both a poet and a novelist and was about the only local man who made enough money to pay income tax during the depression days of the early 1930's.

No woman ever served on the Cross Plains City Council, however, two were once on the school board here.

M. (Jim) McMillan was a Marshal here long before the town had a fire department. When a blaze broke out at night he roused volunteer firemen with rapid-fire shots.

Today's issue of the Review rounds out 55 years of publication for the home town paper.

Back when radio was as popular as television is now, Worth's largest station broadcast an hour-long program from a Chamber of Commerce banquet held in Cross Plains Presbyterian Church basement.

Natives Of India Congratulate Local Farmers On Soil Saving

"America is a rich and interesting nation; you are so fortunate," said A. M. T. Devar, 39-year-old native of India to a Review writer Tuesday morning, while sipping coffee in a local restaurant.

Devar with a fellow countryman, S. C. Gupte, 30, is here spending two weeks with D. C. Cox, studying soil conservation practices.

Both Indians hold the equivalent of an M.A. degree from leading universities in their country. In addition each has spent two years in graduate study in forestry.

Devar and Gupte speak English fluently. They point out that the language was taught each year of their public school careers. Too, they studied the subject in college.

"In India, English is the semi-official language," explained Gupte. "We are in a transition period, switching from English to Hindi."

It was explained that India has had 14 different languages and hundreds of dialects. Devar and Gupte are unable to communicate in their native tongues. They resort to English.

The visitors possess a far better knowledge of the history, customs and economy of America than do most people of this country about India.

Before coming to Callahan County for two weeks, the visitors were at Plains, Tex., for 14 days observing wind erosion preventatives.

"Your farmers are to be complimented for their erosion control efforts," emphasized Devar.

"We appreciate their leaving sufficient crop residue on the soil, cover-crop planting and tillage practices aimed at conserving fertility of the soil."

It was pointed out that India grows some of the same crops as are to be found in Texas. Wheat and rice are the principal grains and sugar cane is a major farm commodity. Principal fruits are mangoes, bananas and dates. Cotton is grown in much of India. The country also produces tea, some coffee and tobacco.

An average Indian farm is said to be about five acres. Farmers join together to buy tractors and other necessary machinery.

Devar and Gupte will spend six months in this country, visiting Oklahoma, Colorado, New Mexico and California before going to Washington, D. C., July 18 to emplane for home.

Both men appeared to be enjoying the sojourn in America but with the mention of home each spoke of his family.

"I have five sons," declared Devar.

"And I a fine little daughter," countered Gupte.

Like parents everywhere both the men seemed to express without saying: the finest thing about foreign travel is the joy of returning home and reunion with family and friends.

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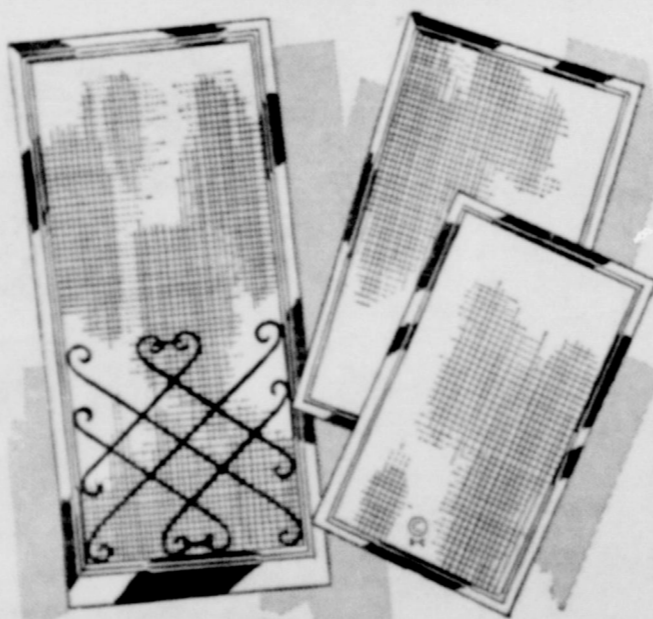

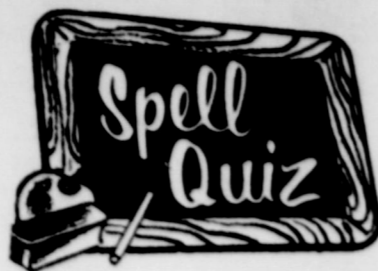

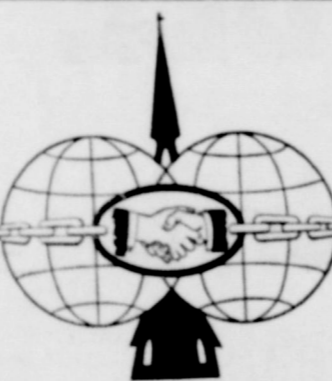
