Auto Crash Fatal to Cecil G. White

Cecil G. White, 22, was killed in a one-car crash, a mile and one-half west of Cross Plains on FM 190, Sunday night at 6:35. Other occupants of the car escaped without serious injuries.

Funeral services were to be held at the First Methodist Church of Cross Plains Wednesday afternoon at two o'clock by the Rev. Charles J. McArthur, officiating. Burial will be in Cross Plains Cemetery under the direction of Higginbotham Funeral Home.

The accident occurred just west of the four other persons had taken J. L. White to his home north of Cross Plains and were enroute back to the right side of the road. The car is said to have rolled over on its side, then traveled back to the pavement and snapped an electric pole on the left side of the road. Four occupants of the 1964 Chevrolet Impala were thrown from the vehicle. The car was destroyed.

The young ladies from Cross Plains who were in the car were: Hanna Sue Lippe, Josephine Crider, 17, Kathleen Holston, also 17, taken to Hendrick Memorial Hospital in Abilene. Her injuries were said to be critical. One, however, had three broken ribs and a bruised and lacerated forehead.

House At Pioneer Leveled By Blaze

A mother arrived home from church Sunday night just in time to see her twin sons escape flames which enveloped their home two miles north of Pioneer.

Mrs. G. R. Pancake attended church services at Pioneer and reached home shortly after 10 o'clock. As she approached the house her sons, Barney and Bonny, who had been asleep, raced outside. Cause of the blaze was not immediately determined.

Mrs. Pancake reached through a window of the burning building to get a telephone and call Cross Plains Fire Department. The local company sped to the scene but walls of the dwelling were collapsing as equipment pulled onto the property.

The house was located just off the Farm to Market Road which runs from Pioneer to Sabanno.

Outstanding Horses Vie For Top Laurels In Show Here Saturday

Two senior horses, King's Lady Ann, owned by Booger Red Nixon of Eastland, and Huitah, a senior horse owned by Mary Lynn Hall of Dyess Air Force Base, battled almost to the final event for over-all championship honors here Saturday.

King's Lady Ann, an eight-year-old mare by King's Buttons, ridden both by owner Nixon and by his two children, Sheri and Bobby, in junior events, emerged with 36 points and the over-all championship trophy.

Huitah, aged gelding owned by Mrs. Hall of Dyess Air Force Base and ridden by Bill Brewer of Abilene, confined all of his winnings to the senior division for 32 points and runner-up spot.

The show, staged in the Cross Plains Riding Club arena just west of the city, was a Paint Quarter Horse event, approved by the American Paint Quarter Horse Association, of which Horace L. King of Cross Plains is president.

City Votes On \$75,000 Water Bond Tomorrow

Property owning voters of the city of Cross Plains will make their second trip to the polls in six weeks Friday to ballot on a \$75,000 bond issue, proposing improvements to the municipal waterworks.

The proposition to be balloted on is the same as that which lost by a count of 171 to 170 in an election held Feb. 13.

The \$75,000 general obligation bond, if passed, would be issued to lay seven miles of six-inch pipeline to the McClure Ranch, where the City Council recently drilled two test holes for water. The supply there, said Tyrus Collins, Austin engineer, is capable of producing more than 150 gallons per minute. That quantity of water is believed abundant for the foreseeable future of Cross Plains, opined Mayor Ted Souder.

'Skeet' Potter Killed As Car Plunges Into Creek

Walter Cleburne (Skeet) Potter, 41, a 20-year-resident of Cross Plains, was killed Friday night in a one-car accident 10 miles east of San Angelo.

Clayton Smart, 18, son of Mr. and Mrs. Coley Smart, also of this city, sustained broken ribs, a fractured knee and internal injuries. He was taken to Shannon Memorial Hospital in San Angelo.

Potter was pronounced dead at the scene. His car missed a bridge and plunged 100 feet into a creekbed.

Funeral services for Potter were held from the First Baptist Church here Sunday at 2:30 p. m. with the Rev. Don Turner, pastor, officiating. Burial was in the Cross Plains Cemetery under the direction of Higginbotham Funeral Home.

field on the McClure Ranch," Souder said.

Water Commissioner Ira H. Hall emphasizes that the water would flow by gravity from a reservoir near the wells to the city's settling basin within the corporate limits here.

Pumping Costs Low
"Pumping cost would be confined only to lifting the water from the bottom of the wells to the top of the ground," he said.

It is estimated that \$114,000 would be required to equip the recently drilled wells, lay the seven miles of pipeline, improve the city pump station — said to be needed for better fire prevention and to equalize pressures over the city — and replace some existing lines and extend service to other areas where it is not presently available. Voters approved issuance of \$39,000 worth of revenue bonds for this purpose at the Feb. 13 referendum by a count of 174 to 167.

Better Quality
When queried as to whether the quality of water from McClure ranch would be of better quality than that now utilized by the city, Collins told councilmen that hardness of the water currently used measures 432, while that seven miles north of town is but 290.

The city's present water supply comes from 22 wells, just east of town. They produce from an average depth of 60 feet. The water strata being proposed on the McClure ranch is bottomed at 286 feet, with 14 feet of gravel said to be immediately above.

The city's contract with W. T. McClure would call for payment of five cents per 1,000 gallons of water for 20 years. The price would be eight cents per 1,000 gallons for the next eight years. After 28 years the city would have the option of renewing the lease at the existing price at that time.

In studying market value of water in this section of Texas, Mayor Souder points out that queries were made of what was being paid by other nearby cities of similar size.

"Barges paid seven cents per thousand, owns its line and pays pumping costs from Brownwood Lake," he said.

Controversial Issue
Seldom in recent years has a more controversial question been submitted to voters of this municipality than that to be balloted on Friday. Heat of the contest is expected to bring out more than 300 voters. At the Feb. 13 referendum 346 polls were tabulated.

C. N. Burt, Dallas bond representative, when asked if he had made a study of the city's financial condition and what he thought of its ability to retire the proposed water bonds, said:

"Your town has averaged \$8,000 per year for the past five years in retiring its obligations. This is over and above interest payments. I see no reason why the proposed issues could not be retired without any increase in either water rates or taxation."

Absentee voting closed Monday. Nine such ballots had been filed shortly before the deadline fell.

Judge for Friday's election will be Alton E. Hornsby. Polls will open at 8 a. m. and close at 7 p. m. Clerks will be Mrs. Chester Glover, Mrs. Elvis B. Scott and Mrs. L. D. Koenig.

More Peanut Allotments May Go To County Farms

What peanut farmer would like to have an additional 100 acre allotment?

J. C. Earp, manager of the Callahan County ASCS office, reports an excess of that amount will be disposed of Monday and that applications must be in his office at the courthouse in Baird by that time.

"If there are several farmers desiring additional allotted acres, we may be able to accommodate them all with this excess," Earp declared.

It was stressed that any Callahan County farmer having a greater allotment than is expected to be planted, should surrender the overage on or before April 6 to protect the allotment for future use.

"Our farmers have been especially cooperative," Earp said, "making it possible for our office to accommodate more producers."

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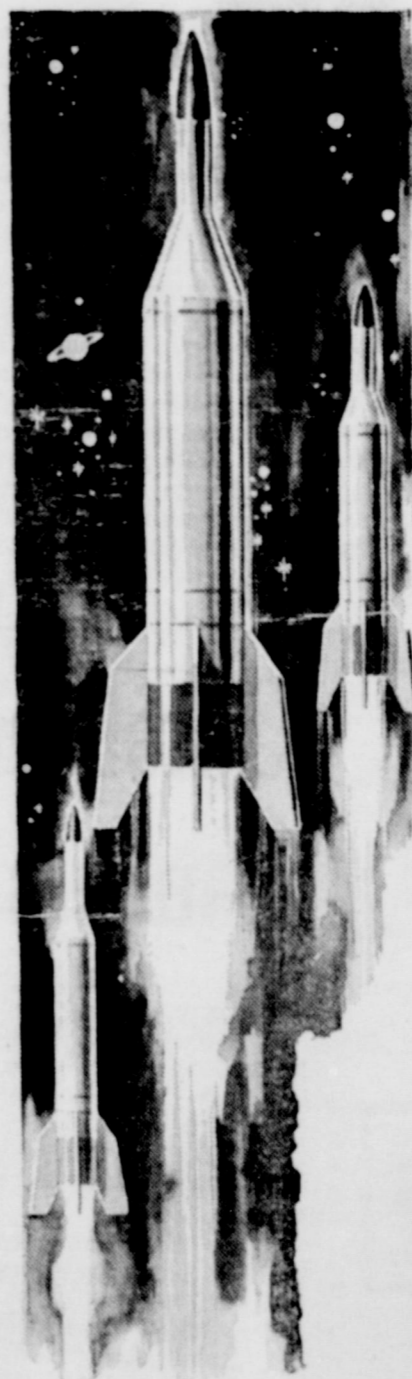

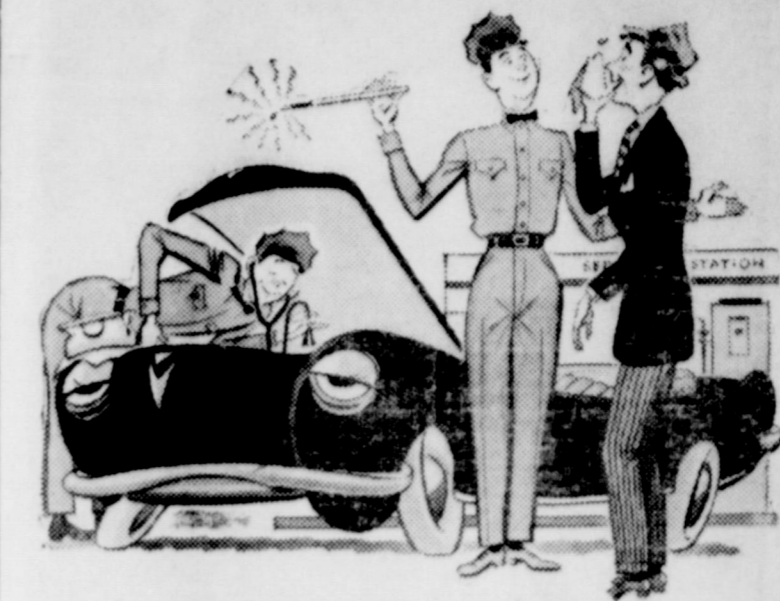

Roger Q. Evans, Says Make Jobs For Unemployed, Aging Citizens

... for State Representative

The president is sponsoring legislation to remove poverty by starting a training and educational program with the youth of our land.

This is a commendable move in the right direction, and may need state legislation to support it.

However from a local, state and national level, there must be drastic steps to remove poverty from the front door steps of veterans and aging citizens who are major problems currently facing the state and nation.

The Government places those with an income of less than \$3,000 annually in the poverty classification, as 81 percent have incomes of less than \$1,200 annually.

Much of this poverty among our retired and aging citizens can be blotted out in such areas as Callahan County by a research program to determine the different types of skills, including handicraft for the women, along with other skills, and setting up part-time, or self employment projects for those able to do part-time work.

The physically handicapped people have projects for employment, which is wonderful, but why cannot the RETIRED AND SENIOR CITIZENS form an industry of their own, and produce certain phases of production that would find a commercial market?

If the laws of our state need amending to permit such employment, such as our welfare groups, social security, and pension recipients, to make supplemental incomes to bridge the soaring cost of living, then they should be amended.

We have too many hardship cases which are able to work part-time, some full time, at trades, that would strengthen the area's economy, and remove them from the list of hardship cases.

Self employment, pooling the commodities through an agency — listed AGING AND RETIRED CITIZENS, INC. — would find a market for some products now grown in your county as manufactured products, plus other items which can be processed with this type of labor and compete with the prices of skilled labor through manufacture of many commodities.

My appeal to voters in Callahan County and the other counties of this district, while you are hiring a legislator on May the 2nd to make or repeal laws, and to appropriate the staggering sum of over five billion dollars of your tax dollars, to the schools, rural roads, agriculture development and many other services — hire a man that has the experience of a taxpayer for 50 years, and has seen the pitfalls of life.

If you are going to pay a State Representative a fixed salary of \$4,800 per year, \$9,600 for a two year period, plus hundreds of dollars of sideline expenses, you need a man who knows the color of the button to push to register his vote to aid our economy.

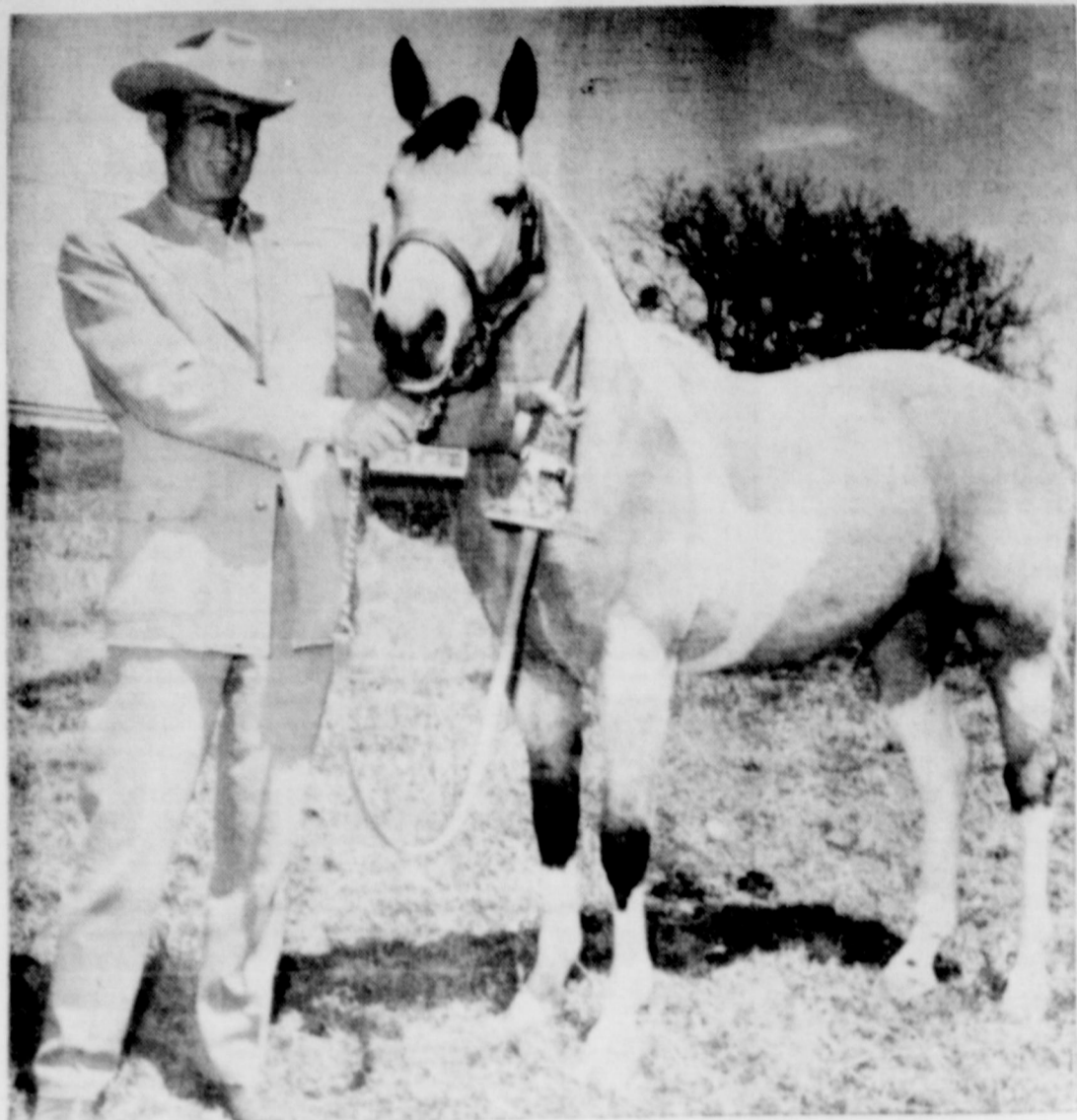
