A change in assignments of Methodist pastors, which became effective this week, sent the Rev. Jimmie Mobley of Mineral Wells to Cross Plains, replacing the Rev. Charles J. McAfee, who goes to Bartlett.

The incoming Cross Plains Pastor is 33 years of age, a graduate of Texas Wesleyan College and the Bright College of Bible at Texas Christian University. He has been at Mineral Wells the past four years as pastor of the Central Methodist Church and a smaller congregation, Brazos Methodists, in the suburbs of that city. He formerly pastored churches at Eureka, Godley, Bethsaida and Zion Hill. He and Mrs. Mobley have three children: Diana, 10, Cynthia 7, and Michael, 3.

The McAfee family had been in Cross Plains nearly three years. Mrs. McAfee was also a teacher in the primary department at the local school system.

Other area changes in Methodist pastors saw the Rev. Jon Hays, who had been at Burkett, going to Valera.

Paul Whitton of Cross Plains was again named Lay Leader for the Cisco District.

Over Million Dollar Road Job Ordered In This Area

A \$1,061,000 improvement project for State Highway 36 from the Callahan County line, 2.7 miles east of Cross Plains, to Abilene has been approved by the Texas Highway Department.

The work is scheduled as a part of the 1965-66 Consolidated Highway program.

Additional surfacing will be applied to both the highway and its shoulders. Forty-two miles of construction will be involved.

Work will be divided into four segments. One is from FM Road 18, near Abilene airport, to the Callahan County line, a distance of 7.2 miles, to cost \$145,000. The work in Callahan County will be in three links. First is from the Taylor County line to the crossroads, west of Rowden, a distance of 16.4 miles, to cost \$430,000. The second is from that point to the intersection with Main Street in Cross Plains, a distance of 16 miles, to cost \$426,000. The third segment is from Main Street in Cross Plains eastward to the Eastland County line, a distance of 2.7 miles, to cost \$60,000.

Completion of a widening and resurfacing project on State Highway 279 from Cross Plains to the Brown County line was also programmed.

Assurance that the Coleman-to-Cross Plains-to-Cisco State Highway 206 will be finished was written into plans for the next two years.

In Eastland County, work is authorized on State 206 from U. S. 80 west of Cisco to the south to FM 569, a distance of 13.9 miles. The base and surfacing are authorized at a cost of \$810,000. The project would complete the highway.

Homer Price Gains 4th Term In Sheriff's Office

Sheriff Homer Price made political history in Callahan County Saturday as he won a fourth term in that office by defeating Deputy Sheriff N. L. Long, Jr. by a spread of 45 votes.

Price, who announced as a candidate and then withdrew, re-entered the race as a write-in aspirant in the first primary. He emerged second high in a five-man contest. Price's name was on the ballot Saturday and he overcame Long's lead of 301 votes in the first election with 45 to spare.

Veteran political observers cannot recall of an office-holder ever before winning re-election as a write-in candidate in Callahan County.

Boxes Split

Of the 12 Callahan County polling places, Long and Price carried six apiece. Long led in absentee tabulations.

Only other contest on which Democrats of this county voted Saturday was the race in which Joe Pool of Dallas County faced Robert W. Baker of Harris County for Congressman-at-Large. Pool, the incumbent and a conservative, carried this county decisively and then went on to win a commanding margin in state returns.

Only 1 GOP Race

Callahan County Republicans had but one contest to vote on in their run-off primary Saturday. It was that in which Jack Cox and George Bush, both of Harris County, strove for Republican nomination for United States Senator and the right to oppose Ralph Yarborough in November. Cox was the favorite in this county but statewide returns gave the nomination to Bush.

Cross Plains Republicans polled 54 votes Saturday as compared with 59 in the first primary. The GOP total here was larger than the rest of the county combined.

Largest Vote Here

Voting totals at the county's three largest boxes were as follows: Cross Plains, 545 Democrats and 54 Republicans for a total of 599; Baird, 569 Democrats and 12 Republicans for a total of 581; Clyde, 412 Democrats and 23 Republicans for a total of 435.

Election returns were complete from all precincts in the county and tabulated for the public at 8:30 Saturday night. In Cross Plains a bulletin board was provided at the newspaper office.

August 15 Target Date On Bank Job

Construction is reported progressing on schedule at the Citizens State Bank Building, now being restored after damages by fire and water in the early morning hours of May 22.

Officers of the financial institution, now in temporary location five doors south, expect to be back in regular quarters by mid August.

Top floor of the building has been knocked off and the remaining one-story structure will receive and exterior cover of face brick and ceramic tile. The interior will be rearranged and modernized. Architect for the project is Richard Buzzard of Abilene and contractor is Bowden Lumber Company.

Federal Trapper Hired In County

A government trapper was employed Monday and began work in Callahan County Tuesday. He is Homer Turner, who has been living on the J. M. Greenwood place, four miles south of Cross Plains, but is moving to Cottonwood.

The trapper will be paid until November by volunteer contributions from farmers and ranchers. Thereafter, plans are for the county to assume the obligation.

A government trapper draws \$200 locally, the remainder of the salary being paid by the state and federal government. Regulations require that his work be done under supervision of the Commissioners Court.

Grain Sales May Reach \$200,000 This Harvest

Grain Sales in Cross Plains during the current harvest season are expected to approximate \$200,000.

Purchases by Callahan County Farmers Cooperative, Inc. here to Monday morning totaled \$95,821.26, exclusive of amounts paid for barley and rye. It was estimated that the crop was one-half marketed at the time.

Wheat sales through Sunday aggregated 3,575,910 pounds — nearly 60,000 bushels — for which \$90,521.51 had been paid. Oats purchased amounted to 260,980 pounds — 8,155 bushels — for \$5,300.75. Prices paid here have been identical to those in Coleman.

Quotations at mid-day Monday were: number 1 oats 65 cents and number 1 wheat \$1.53.

Survivors include her husband, three daughters, three grandchildren, and six great-grandchildren.

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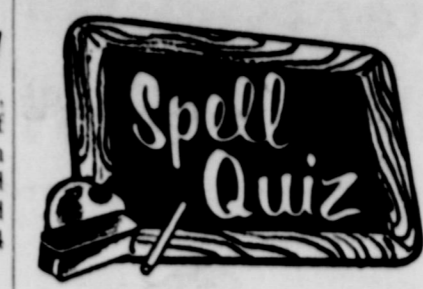
