2 Drilling Projects Slated Near Here

Two drilling projects have been announced for Callahan County.

L. A. Warren, et al., of Abilene No. 3 Burl Clinton was staked three miles west of Scranton in the Scranton Field. It is slated for 1,750 feet with rotary to test the Palo Pinto Sand.

Drillsite is 2,645 feet south and 150 feet east of the northeast corner of Section 21, but located in Matilda Cherry Survey 4.

It spots 2,645 feet from the north and 150 feet from the west lines of a 66.3-acre lease.

The lease was purchased from Bennett and Little of Abilene.

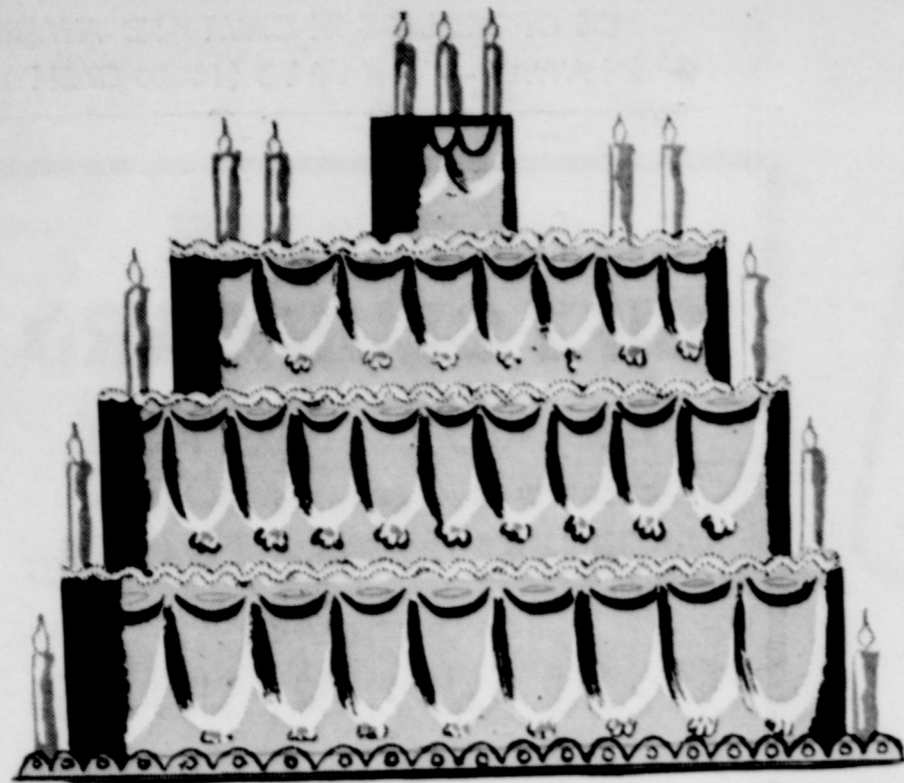

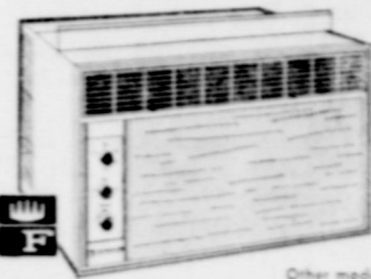

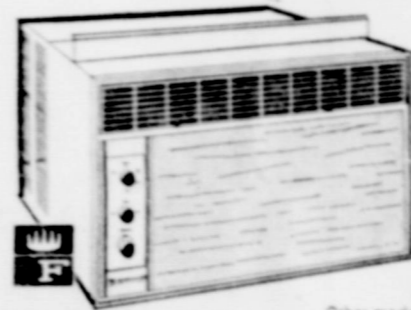

Buff Dave Merryman fanned 14 Cats in the second game but the Cats won 6-3. Pope and Bishop together whiffed 13.

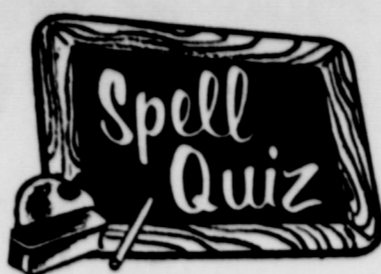
