## Council Expands Water Use; Irrigating Allowed

A ban imposed last week by the city council on outside watering was lifted Tuesday and consumers are now permitted to irrigate lawns, gardens, trees and shrubs on a restricted basis.

Estimates made by Water Commissioner Ira H. Hall revealed that 205,000 gallons of storage had been gained by cooperation of local people in conservative use.

Mayor M. E. Roth told this

newspaper Tuesday that work will begin in the next few days laying a new six-inch line to the water field and that three additional wells would be drilled. Contract has been awarded to J. D. Dallas to drill the wells and he is expected to begin Friday or Saturday. Two wells will be drilled on Jones acreage and one on the Smith tract.

Ditch-digging equipment was being brought here from Cisco to bury the new six-inch line. It will parallel the present

four-inch main coming into town. Plans are to use both lines, to ease pressures and hasten the flow from wells to the city settling basin.

"Our situation is much improved," said Hall Tuesday morning, "much credit belongs to the people who cooperated so loyally."

Roth joined Hall in expressing appreciation for the near-unanimous compliance with the recent ban on outside watering.

Both Roth and Hall pointed out that unlimited use of water would again necessitate restriction, however, if used sparingly until new wells and new lines are operative, each opined that no further hardships would be experienced this summer.

Hall said Tuesday morning that 65,000 gallons storage had been gained in the tower near the fire station and that a total of 140,000 gallons was being held in reserve at the settling basin.

## Former Resident Recalls Lively Local Occurrence

Editor's Note: Chas. F. Hemphill of Abilene, widely known public accountant, recalls an interesting occurrence during his residence here in the long ago.

"In 1925 an oil boom was on in Cross Plains. Town was full of newcomers and oil field workers. Floyd Gwin was mayor. We hired a new city marshal; his name was Hamilton.

"One night about 9 o'clock two of the newcomer ladies went into the City Drug Store for refreshments. Neither was wearing hose. The new city marshal promptly arrested both ladies and telephoned the mayor. The mayor heard the case immediately, and while he did not assess a fine, he reprimanded both ladies severely and ordered them to never again appear on the streets or in any public gathering place in Cross Plains without being

to secure a cross section of opinion.

There are presently no counties in Texas designated as disaster stricken and consequently no emergency feed program is operating in the state. It normally takes from two to three weeks for a county to gain drought or disaster designation. Another four weeks are usually required to begin shipments of feed grains.

If Callahan County is designated as a disaster area, grain sorghums will be available at \$1.51½ per hundred weight for foundation herds and at \$2.02 for other livestock.

## New Well Making 76 Barrels Per Day

A discovery oil strike, 11 miles west of Cross Plains, has been gauged and rated at 76 barrels a day.

The new strike is the John W. Barbee No. 1 Fred Cutbirth, 1,787 feet from the south and east lines of Bartola Garcia Survey 204.

Calculated daily potential was 76.23 barrels of 39.4 gravity oil, based on a 10-hour flow of 32.96 barrels of oil and two per cent water.

Flow was through an 8-64-inch choke with a packer on the casing and 75 pounds on the tubing. Production was through six perforations at 2,200-03 feet, with pay topped at 2,198 feet.

A 4½-inch casing was set at 2,256 feet, with total depth of 2,262 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 653-1.

## Eddie Heard Made City Marshal Here

Bob Patterson, who became city marshal here last October, has resigned and accepted the place of chief of police at Monahan.

Eddie Heard, who has served as substitute for Patterson on numerous occasions, has been named to fill the vacancy.

During the time of Patterson's resignation and Heard's appointment, Jim Farmer, Cross Plains High School football coach, served on a temporary basis.

The city marshal's salary here in recent years has varied from \$275 to \$325 monthly.

Local horsemen took second place in parade laurels at the Coleman rodeo and also received a trail ride trophy.

Thirty-five horsemen left here for the 30 mile ride to Coleman last Wednesday morning and additional riders joined in along the route.
