Cross Plains' Best

Cross Plains banners will be carried by fourteen Little Leaguers into the first area title defense in history. Last years stars were the first locals to win the area meet with victories over Baird and Cisco. They also took runnerup honors in the district playoffs.

Dale Bishop and Bill Dillard, local loop title club directors, will guide the fortunes of this year's group.

Local Persons Officiate

Cross Plains will be well represented in tourney official ranks. Dr. M. E. Roth is tournament director, Bill Pope is official scorer, Bob Jackson is announcer, and James Hickman and Bill Button will help umpire the four contests.

Improvements Completed

All but a few last-minute improvements planned to the local park have been completed by volunteer labor and donations.

Some of the recent innovations to Cross Plains' diamond are: flag pole erection, operational electronic scoreboard, revamped infield, partially new outfield fence and extra screening at the dugouts. Roth stated yesterday that two new tiers of bleachers also have been built and that all the seating accommodations will be painted. He estimated that 300 to 400 persons can be comfortably seated.

Auto parking space has also been enlarged and according to Roth, City Marshall Eddie Heard will supervise parking of vehicles all three night of the meet.

Trophies Awarded

Winning and runnerup teams will be given trophies by the local organization at the close of the tournament Saturday night. Each player of each team will receive the customary Little League pin for all-star selection.

Bob Latson, official announcer of the affair, will introduce each team member and managers immediately preceding play each evening.

All-Colored Rodeo At Baird This Week End

Bucking stock, said to be the wildest ever brought to Callahan County, was being unloaded at Baird yesterday for the All-colored Rodeo scheduled in the Sheriff's Posse arena there Friday and Saturday nights. Performances are to begin each evening at eight.

The all-Negro show is an RCA sponsored event and will feature the top colored and clowns of the nation. Competition will be offered in: bareback bronc riding, saddle bronc riding, calf roping, steer wrestling,

and Brahma bull riding. Alex Alexander, the nationally-famous rodeo clown, who formerly traveled with Gene Autry, will appear in comedy and bullfighting roles.

All-colored rodeos have proved especially popular with Callahan County audiences in years past and directors of the Sheriff's Posse are said to have lined up for the forthcoming week end the strongest array of contesting cowboys and wildest bucking stock ever offered locally.

Bids Sought On Last Leg Of 206

Bids will be opened by Texas Highway Department Aug. 18 for a project to build the final 14-mile section of Highway 206, from Coleman to Cross Plains to Cisco.

Contract specifies for work to begin at the Interstate 20 (U. S. Highway 80) interchange, one mile west of Cisco, and to end 14 miles south, near the Sabanno Church. The road has been completed from Coleman through Callahan County to Sabanno.

The job calls for grading, structures, base and two course surface treatments. Approximately a year would be needed for the work.

The route will follow closely to FM 569 part of the way. Most of the right of way buying has been completed. It is understood that several condemnation suits will be required to complete the right of way.

Highway Department people say that the project would be speeded if fence building along the route could be completed in the near future. They add that the contractor will have to get underway soon after Aug. 18 in order to meet his time requirements.

Highway 206 was started three years ago after civic leaders in Coleman, Cross Plains and Cisco began working on it as a new route for traffic to and from southwest Texas.

Steps Outlined For Holding Allotments

Peanut farmers who did not plant allotted acres this year because of the existing drought are advised by the County ASC office the steps to be taken to protect allotments.

It is pointed out: "In order to prevent a reduction in next year's peanut allotment a producer must harvest at least 75 per cent of the allotment this year or have harvested 75 per cent in either one of the two preceding years. If the farm history acreage is not already preserved because of harvests in 1962 or 1963, and less than 75 per cent will be harvested this year, a request may be made for no allotment reduction because of abnormal conditions involving either planting or harvesting. Farm operators must make such requests in writing to the County ASC office on or before Nov. 1, 1964."

 the Cross Plains Chiefs 21-0.

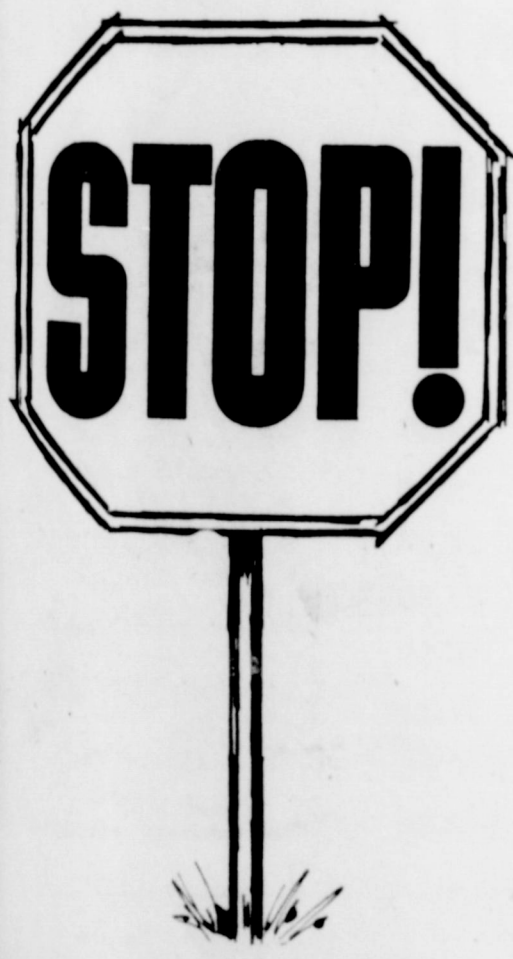
Baird has gone undefeated

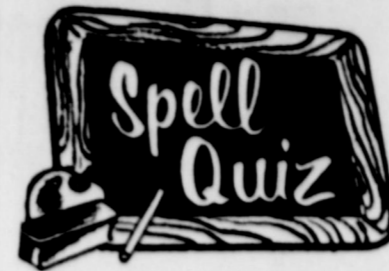
