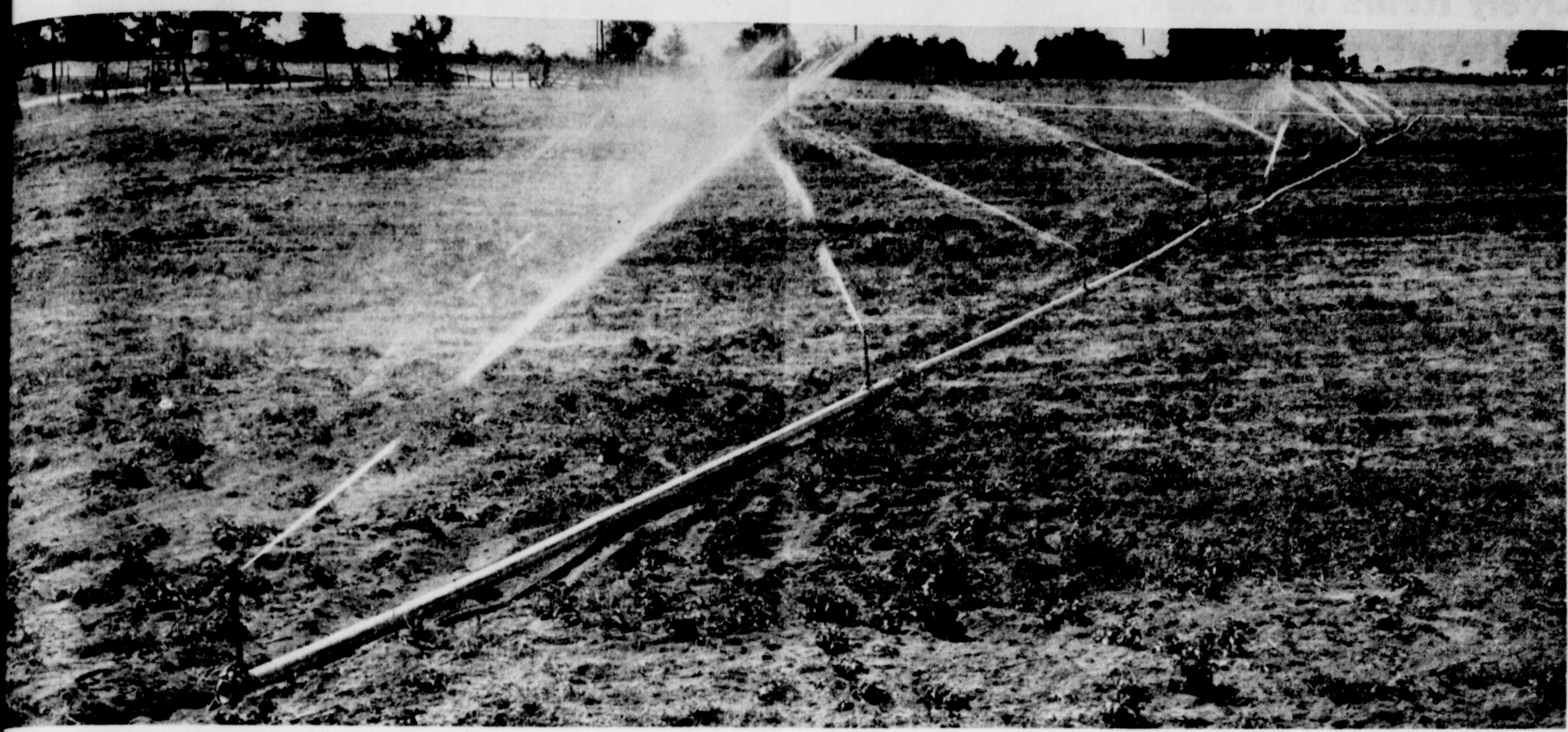

Cisco's Little League All-Stars played catch-up twice last week end to win the championship of the Area III Little League Tournament of District 28 here.
 Cisco's elite prevailed in what possibly was the most exciting area tourney ever held. Three of the four games were decided by a single run and one went an extra inning.
 Defending champion Cross Plains and Clyde began the one-run fad Thursday night in the first game when the locals triumphed 2-1. Friday Cisco nudged Baird 7-6 in a come-from-behind effort. In Saturday's two-night double header, Baird clipped Clyde 8-7 for third place with a four-run uprising in the last frame. Cisco then used the long ball to defeat Cross Plains 6-4 for the area crown in the only extra inning tilt.
 Following the championship game Saturday the local Little League organization presented trophies to winner Cisco and runner-up Cross Plains. Fabulous Bruce Ferguson accepted the diadem for the victors and James McMillan did the hon-

City Is Growing; Limits Extended

Cross Plains is growing. Fifteen acres, including the home of Mrs. Tom Bryant, from State Highway 206 westward to FM Road 880, became a part of the incorporation as a result of annexation proceedings last week.
 Another tract of near similar size, taken off the Bryant property and known as the Tom Bryant Addition No. 2, was incorporated in the city more than a year ago. This tract is that which lies east of State Highway 206 and is bounded on the south and east by county roads. Within this acreage a new home has been added for Mr. and Mrs. H. P. White, one is now being completed for Dr. and Mrs. Carl J. Sohns and children, and three more are in the process of being built. Still another — one for Mr. and Mrs. Ike Neal and family — will start there soon. The six dwellings are estimated to represent costs well above a total of \$100,000.
 One other piece of Bryant property was annexed to the City of Cross Plains during the lifetime of the late Tom Bryant. It is known as the Tom Bryant Addition Number 1 and is that which includes Colonial Oaks Nursing Home and the lots to the north. Dedication papers reveal that tract to have 6.2 acres, making approximately 36.2 acres of Bryant property moved within the city limits in recent years.

RARE REPTILE SLAIN ON ROAD NEAR EULA

A strange reptile, killed on FM Road 603, between Eula and Clyde, was shown in Cross Plains Saturday.
 The lizard-like creature was found by R. G. Morris of this city, who works in Clyde. It measured 46 inches from head to tip of tail and weighed slightly more than two pounds. The body was two hues of green, the under belly being bright and the upper back almost an olive drab. Of the reptile's 46 inches of length, 29 was in tail.
 Persons here who viewed the rarity thought it had body conformation somewhat similar to prehistoric dinosaurs. It had four feet with five toes — or claws — on each. Each toe appeared to have five joints. The creature's back, though, was extremely irregular, something like drawings frequently seen of Chinese dragons.
 The rare reptile was being shown in Cross Plains Saturday by Joe Pierce and Gene Thomas.

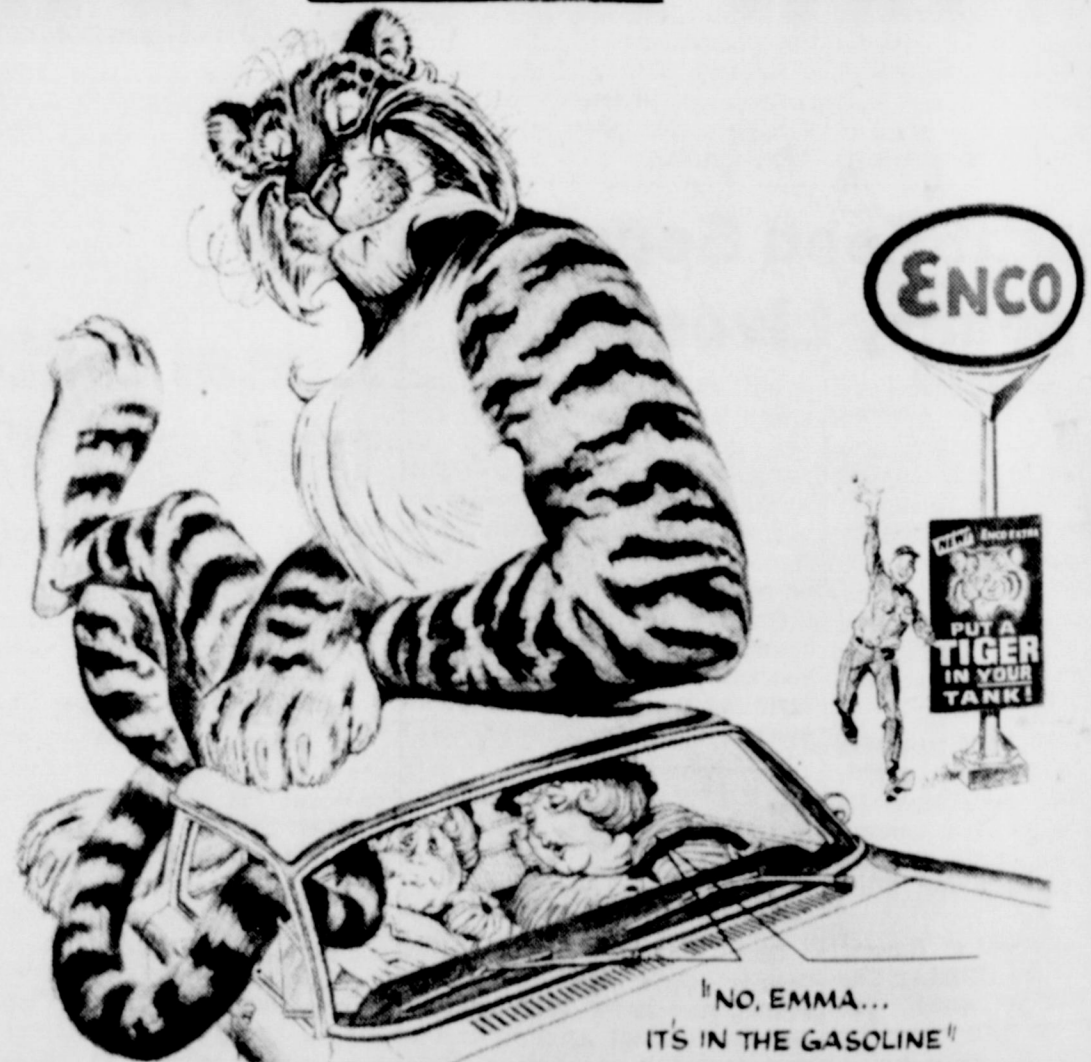

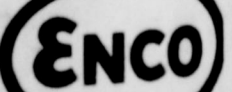

Arthur Erwin, 86, Succumbs In Cisco

Arthur Erwin, 86, of Cisco and a member of one of the earliest-settling families in the Sabano area, died Wednesday night of last week at his home in Cisco.

Mr. Erwin was a pharmacist and received a citation from the Texas State Board upon the completion of 50 years in the profession.

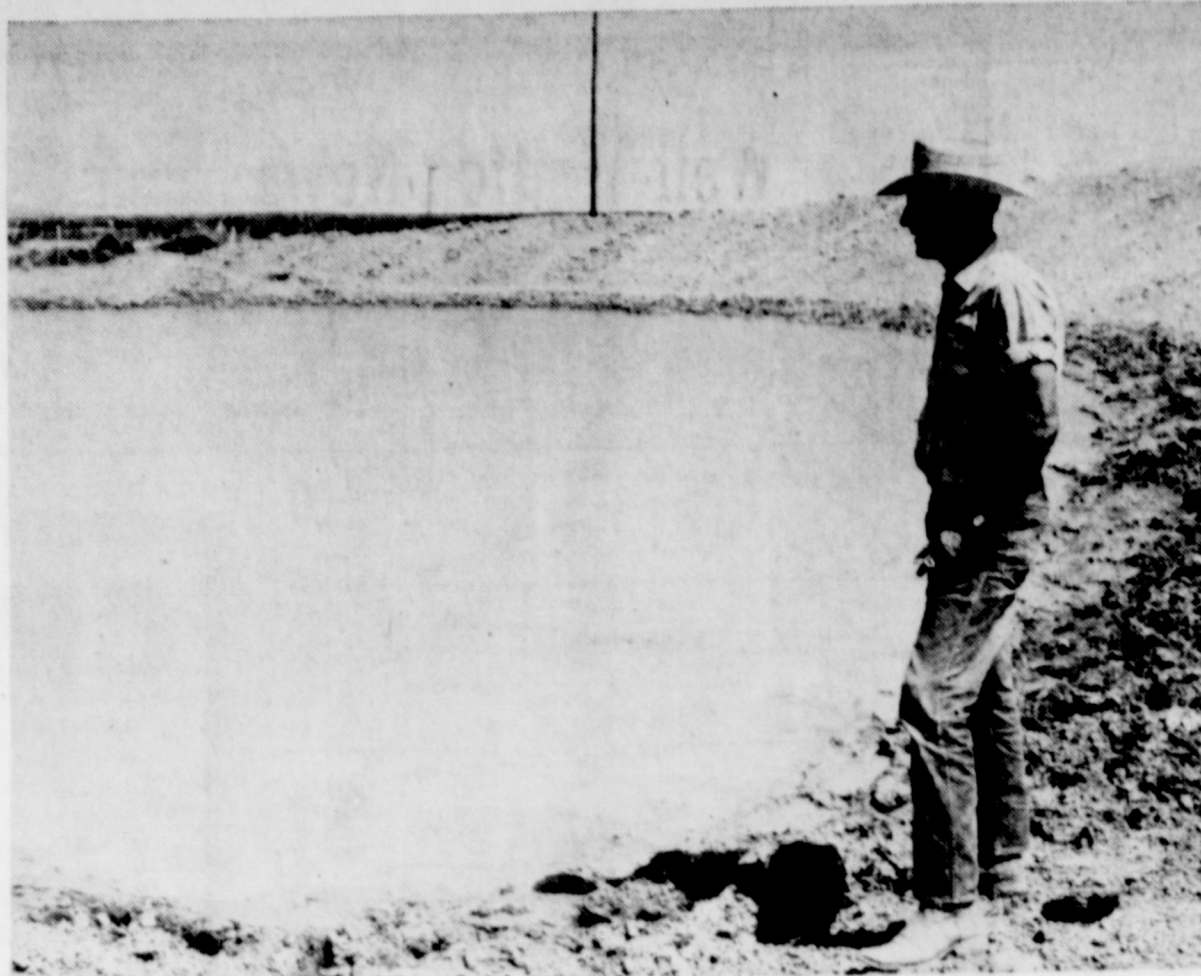
The Erwins received a plaque from the First Presbyterian Church at McLean when they moved to Cisco. The plaque cited them for being faithful members for 51 years.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 3, 1964.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8 proposing an amendment to Section 59 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 59 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Subsection which reads as follows:

"(d) No law creating a conservation and reclamation district shall be passed unless notice of the intention to introduce such a bill setting forth the general substance of the contemplated law shall have been published at least thirty (30) days and not more than ninety (90) days prior to the introduction thereof in a newspaper or newspapers having general circulation in the county or counties in which said district or any part thereof is or will be located and by delivering a copy of such notice and such bill to the Governor who shall submit such notice and bill to the Texas Water Commission, or its successor, which shall file its recommendation as to such bill with the Governor, Lieutenant Governor and Speaker

of the House of Representatives within thirty (30) days from date notice was received by the Texas Water Commission. Such notice and copy of bill shall also be given of the introduction of any bill amending a law creating or governing a particular conservation and reclamation district if such bill (1) adds additional land to the district, (2) alters the taxing authority of the district, (3) alters the authority of the district with respect to the issuance of bonds, or (4) alters the qualifications or terms of office of the members of the governing body of the district."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1964, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts."

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Section 5 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended to read as follows:

"Section 5. The principal of bonds and other funds, and the principal arising from the sale of the lands hereinbefore apart to said school fund, shall be the permanent school fund, and all the interest therefrom and the same herein authorized and shall be the available school fund. The available school fund shall be applied annually to the support of the public free schools. And no law shall ever be enacted appropriating any part of the permanent or available school fund to any other purpose whatever; nor shall the same, in any part thereof ever be

appropriated to or used for the support of any sectarian school; and the available school fund herein provided shall be distributed to the several counties according to their scholastic population and applied in such manner as may be provided by law."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1964, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment to remove the authorization to transfer not exceeding one per cent annually of the total value of the permanent school fund to the available school fund."

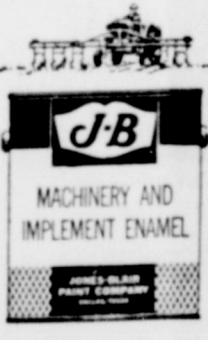
