## Old Settlers To Be Here Friday

A 9 a.m. street parade through the downtown district of Cross Plains will open the 26th annual reunion of Callahan County Pioneers Friday.

The processional will form on South Main and move northward to the First Baptist Church, then countermarch back down Main and proceed to the City Park, where formal program begins at 10 o'clock.

One of the day's features will be a barbecue luncheon served for old timers and members of visiting riding clubs at noon.

B. C. Chrisman of Baird, president of the Pioneers Association, predicted yesterday that 3,000 people will be here for the annual get-together.

Mrs. B. L. Boydston, secretary-treasurer of the organization, reports an uncommonly large number of recent queries concerning the time and place of this year's reunion.

Hugh McDermott, chairman of the barbecue committee, reports everything in readiness for the noon meal Friday. "I've never seen so many people cooperate in such a satisfactory manner," he said, "everybody seems to be going all out to make this year's gathering the best ever for old timers."

Merlin Garrett, parade marshal, reports five area riding clubs will be on hand for the opening processional. Too, he personally invited business houses to enter floats and commercial exhibits. Mrs. Johnny Adair has organized a bicycle brigade to give representation to the younger set.

Three trophies are to be presented in riding club competition and ribbons will go to prize-winning horsemen.

Principal speaker for the reunion will be Gaston Swofford, Clyde attorney. Complete program for the day appears in a two-column box in this issue of the Review.

Although formal program will be concluded near sunset Friday, a rodeo performance is scheduled on the grounds that night. It will be open to the public and staged by the local riding club. A second show is set for Saturday night, however, it will be open only to contestants from the organization's membership.

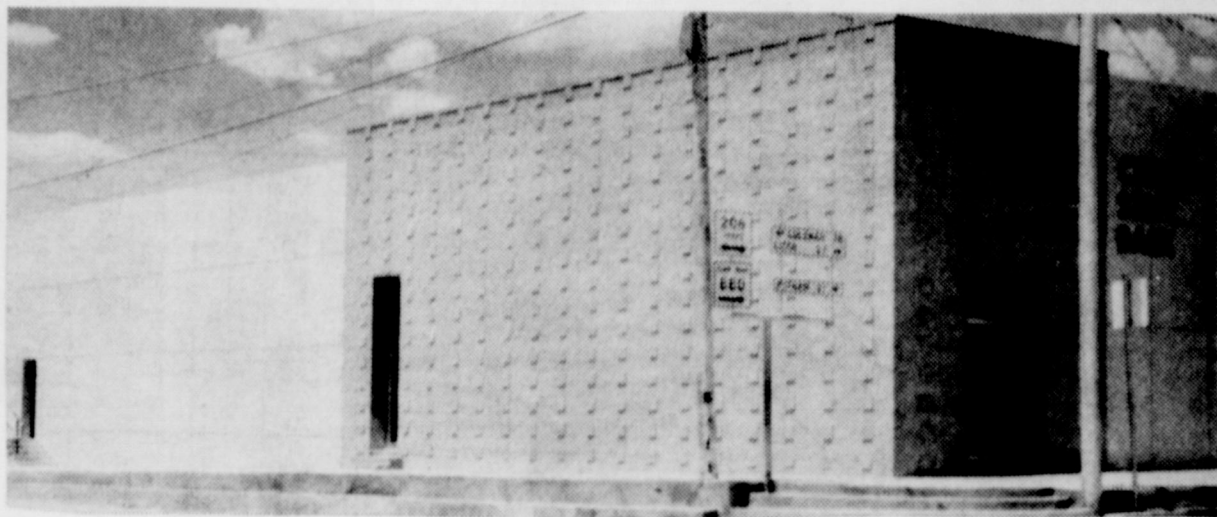
### 10 FRIENDS LAUNCH DRIVE FOR FIREMEN

Ten friends have given a total of \$30 dollars to purchase and install a refrigerated water fountain at the fire station here. Initial donors to the fund were:

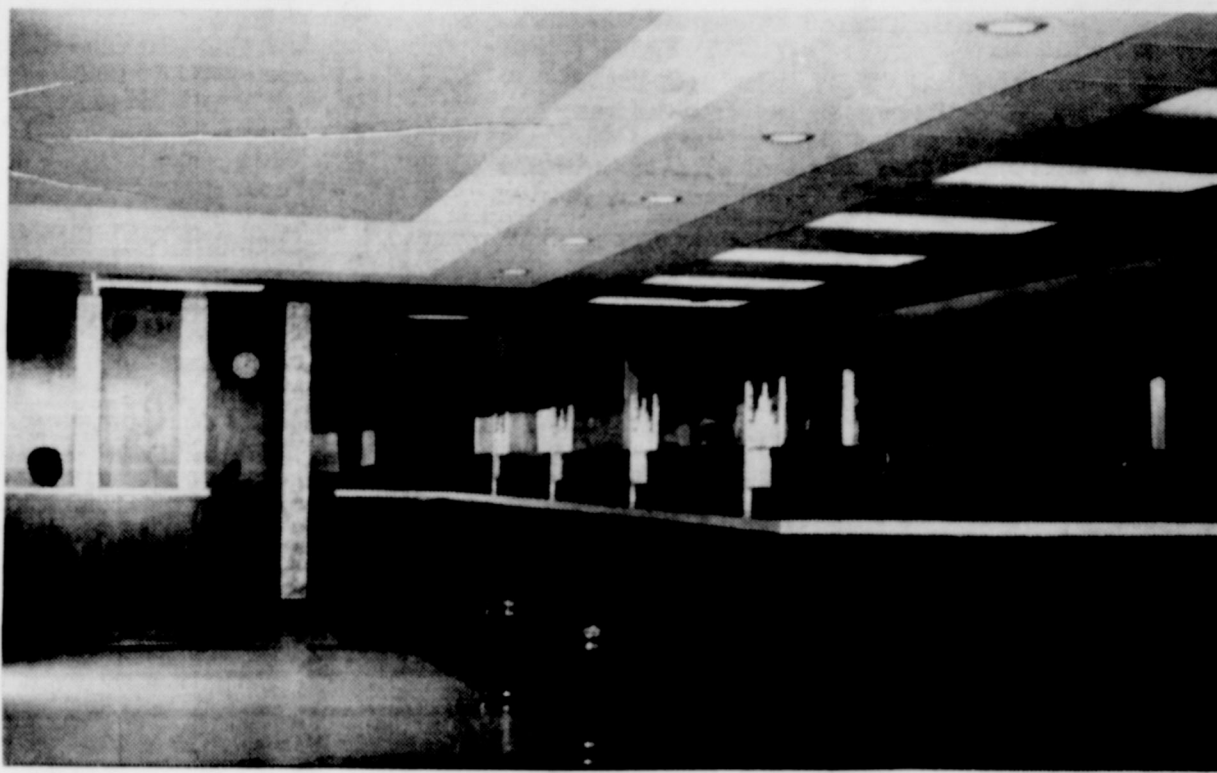

## Open House Set At Local Bank Sunday

Citizens State Bank in Cross Plains will be open Sunday afternoon — but not for business.

Occasion will be the institution's open house observance, from two until five o'clock.

"We're so grateful to friends and customers for their indulgence, following the fire which forced us into temporary quarters," said Fred V. Tunnell, president of the bank, "that we want to thank them individually and at the same time show them our modernized facilities."

He stressed that it was the hope of all people at the bank that every reader of the Review would consider this news story a personal invitation and plan to pay the bank a visit Sunday afternoon. Refreshments will be served and two U. S. Savings Bonds — one for \$50 and one for \$25 — will be given as door prizes.

The bank building was damaged by fire and water during the early morning hours of May 21, necessitating removal of the second story and rebuilding the ground floor. Exterior of the structure was covered with new cream colored brick and ceramic tile of a modernistic design.

Most noticeable changes are possibly inside the building. It has been equipped with a terrazzo floor and irregular type ceiling, offering indirect lighting. Walls along the south side of the lobby are mahogany paneled, interspersed with decorative strips of foiling. The north wall is covered with bright vinyl, a hue known in the builders trade as Tipperary Flame. All fixtures inside the bank have been renewed and arranged to accommodate slightly more working space.

The executive office at the right of the front door now offers additional privacy, yet is easily accessible with an opening into the lobby.

Changes are noticeable toward the back of the building. Bookkeepers quarters have been enlarged, a special room added for filing, photostating and preparing monthly statements. A small amount of space was taken

from the directors' room in the southwest corner of the building. Vaults, which were not damaged by the fire and water, have undergone minor renovations but are substantially unchanged. Complete interior of the building is soundproofed.

A register, which visitors will be asked to sign Sunday afternoon, will become a permanent possession of the bank, filed with its charter and other documents of permanent and historical significance.

General contractor on the building restoration was Bowen Lumber Company of Cross Plains.

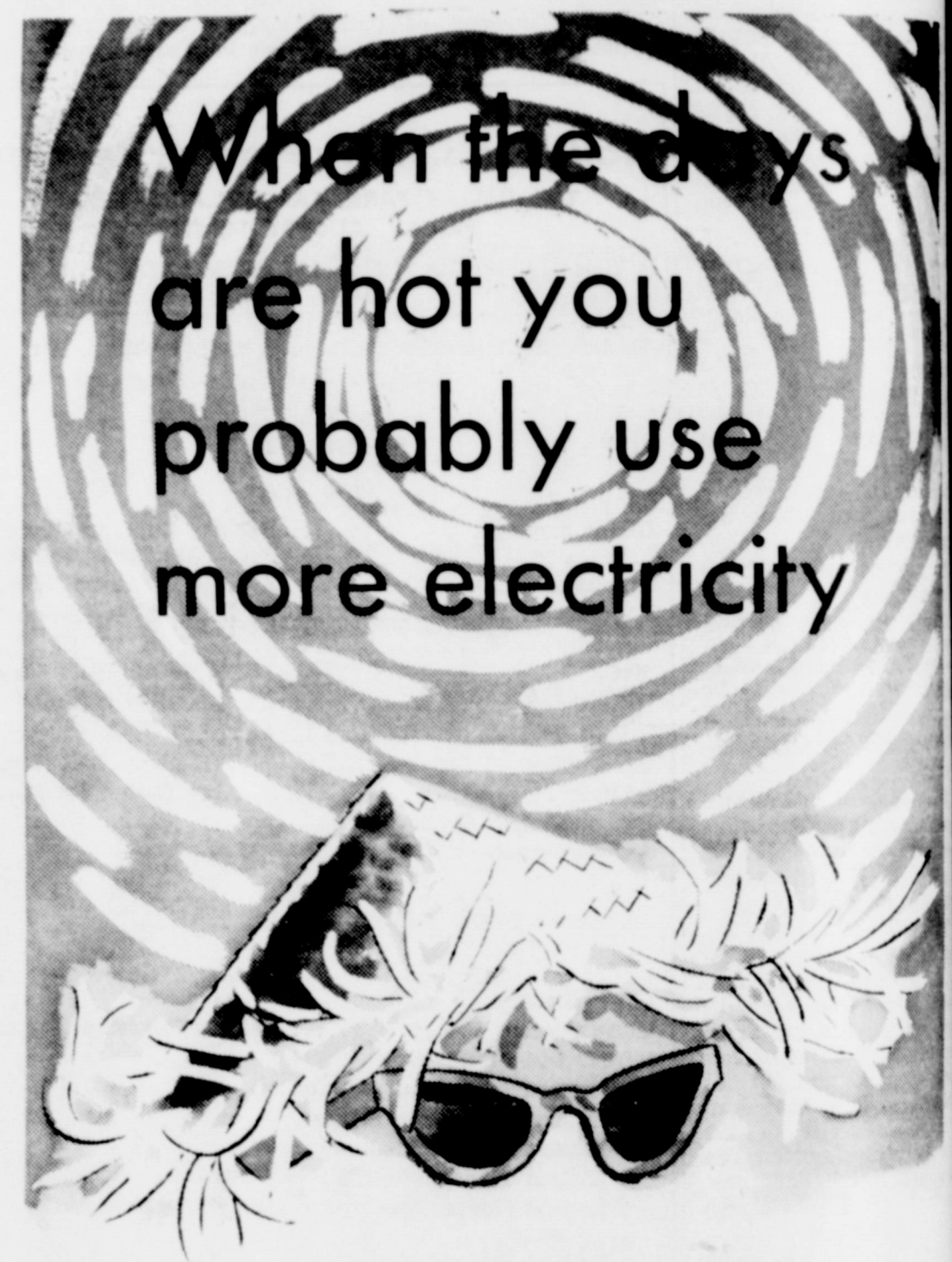

## PUBLIC NOTICE

### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 3, 1964.**

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8** proposing an amendment to Section 59 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Section 59 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Subsection which reads as follows:

"(d) No law creating a conservation and reclamation district shall be passed unless notice of the intention to introduce such a bill setting forth the general substance of the contemplated law shall have been published at least thirty (30) days and not more than ninety (90) days prior to the introduction thereof in a newspaper or newspapers having general circulation in the county or counties in which said district or any part thereof is or will be located and by delivering a copy of such notice and such bill to the Governor who shall submit such notice and bill to the Texas Water Commission, or its successor, which shall file its recommendation as to such bill with the Governor, Lieutenant Governor and Speaker

of the House of Representatives within thirty (30) days from date notice was received by the Texas Water Commission. Such notice and copy of bill shall also be given of the introduction of any bill amending a law creating or governing a particular conservation and reclamation district if such bill (1) adds additional land to the district, (2) alters the taxing authority of the district, (3) alters the authority of the district with respect to the issuance of bonds, or (4) alters the qualifications or terms of office of the members of the governing body of the district."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1964, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts."

Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

He and other FHA officials were reported impressed by the community interest reflected in the large attendance of citizens at the Monday afternoon meeting.

Speakeading the drive to build the bi-county recreational center are R. D. (Bob) Needham of Cross Plains and W. E. (Bill) Tyler of Rising Star.

appropriated to or used for the support of any sectarian school; and the available school fund herein provided shall be distributed to the several counties according to their scholastic population and applied in such manner as may be provided by law.

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1964, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment to remove the authorization to transfer not exceeding one per cent annually of the total value of the permanent school fund to the available school fund."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment to remove the authorization to transfer not exceeding one per cent annually of the total value of the permanent school fund to the available school fund."

Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

**IT IS RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. Section 5 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended to read as follows:

Section 5. The principal of bonds and other funds, and principal arising from the sale of the lands hereinbefore apart to said school fund, shall be the permanent school fund, and all the interest therefrom and the proceeds herein authorized and provided shall be the available school fund. The available school fund shall be applied annually to the support of the public free schools. And no law shall ever be enacted appropriating any part of the permanent or available school fund to any other purpose whatever; nor shall the same, in any part thereof ever be

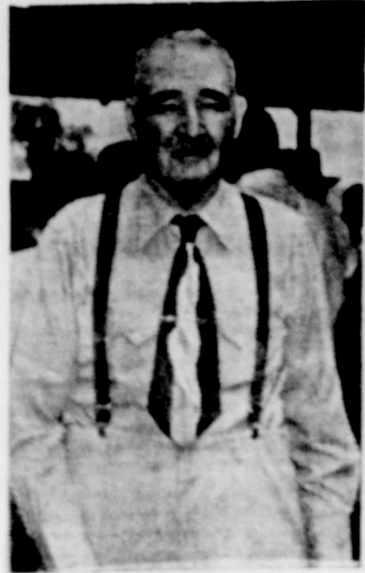
## Reunion Thursday Of Pioneer Ex-Students

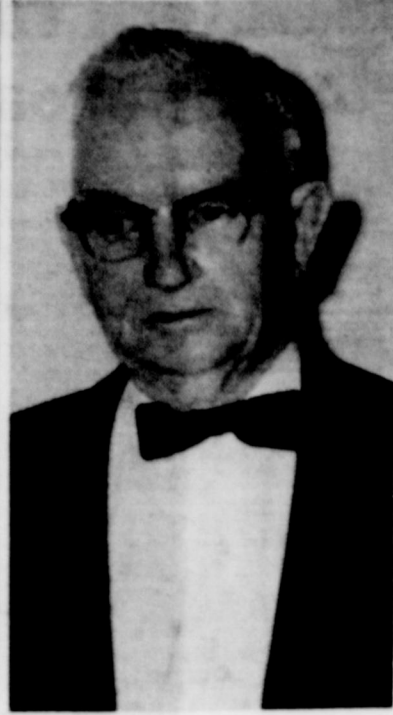
