City Spends \$5,000 To Serve 15 More Homes

Fifteen additional homes and Little League Baseball Park will be connected for city sewer service by Sept. 10, predicted Freddy Tatom, the city's sanitation commissioner, yesterday.

Total cost of adding Bryant and Edgewood Additions and installation of a pump station

for lifting, is expected to run \$5,000.

Bore Below Highway

The city is paying 35 cents per linear foot for ditching up to five feet in depth, with the exception of a 1000 foot secondary trench from the pump station to existing mains, which requires only a two foot depth,

is being done for 20 cents. Deep ditching, that from five to nine feet in depth, is being done for 60 cents. A total of 1,100 feet of deep ditching will be required. Boring under State FM Road 880 will cost \$600.

Six inch sewer tile, of which 5,900 feet will be used, is being laid in the site for 49 cents per foot. A pump to lift sewage high enough for it to connect with existing mains and flow by gravity costs \$845.

Tatom said Tuesday that he is opposed, as are other councilmen, to a proposal to assess Edgewood houses \$150 each for connection to the city sewer system.

Financing Arranged

"Other home owners were not required to pay such a bonus, why should they?" he said.

It is expected that the mu-

nicipality will absorb about \$4,000 of the cost of the project from money which will be returned to the general fund by the sale of bonds voted in February for water and gas system improvements. Attorneys advise that funds used by the city in those two undertakings may be restored.

Homes in the Bryant Addition being connected to the sewer system are that of H. P. White, Dr. Carl J. Sohns, C. B. Shelton and two other dwellings now nearing completion.

The homes of Mrs. Tom Bryant and R. Elliott Bryant, as well as that of D. J. Perkins, who lives near by, will also be added. Edgewood Addition homes to get the service are those of: Morris Odom, Dale Bishop, John Pruet, Bill Pope, L. D. Koenig, Forrest Walker and L. W. Pancake.

Plans Laid For New Baseball Park Here

Cross Plains will have another baseball field.

Local Little League officials and interested persons gathered at Odom's Restaurant Monday night and voted to launch a drive to build the new park for the expanding baseball program in this city.

League president, Mayor M. E. Roth, stated Tuesday that a new diamond would be built, but the exact site had not been settled upon. "Preferred location is immediately south of Little League Park," Roth stated, "and negotiations have been entered into with the owner of the land adjoining city holdings there."

Although no approximate cost of the new park has been figured, Roth estimated \$1,500 to \$2,000 would build the additional recreation site.

Sixty lights, mounted on seven, 55-foot poles, would cost \$1,080 according to Bill Button, local West Texas Utilities manager.

Five persons were sentenced to prison terms in 42nd District Court at Baird Thursday. Each pleaded guilty.

was given two years for car theft following his break from Callahan County jail June 28.

Week End Rains Wet Area's Fallow Fields

Week end rains here gauged 1.60 inches, bringing the total moisture received in Cross Plains this year to 10.73 inches.

Parched pastures and fallowed fields soaked in the rainfall hungrily. In some areas, though, the precipitation was heavier and streams ran. Many stock ponds were replenished.

Homer Norris, who lives three miles west of Cross Cut, gauged 2.50 inches at his place. Within the village of Cross Cut, though, the fall was lighter, measuring only 1.25 inches.

Putnam Peppered

Hard showers at Putnam, sufficient to put out stock water, were said to have totaled from about two inches to much heavier in varying degrees. Mrs. Naomi Heyser's place, six miles south of Putnam, is said to have caught water in all stock tanks, filling some to capacity.

Only 40 of an inch was gauged at Sabanno. To the north, though, about twice that amount was reported.

Norman Coffee at Cottonwood said the total precipitation there measured .90.

Mrs. Alton Tatom reports 1.10 inches fell over most of the Atwell area and that it was very beneficial.

One and one-half inches was reported at the Sterling Odom farm, one mile south of Rowden.

Measurements around Pioneer averaged about two inches.

Although it came too late to aid most peanut crops, it was said to be a boon to pasturage.

Burkett Blessed

Just east of Burkett J. C. Bowden and E. W. Brown report rainfall there measured between two and one-half and three inches. North of Burkett, at the Deel Edington place, it was lighter, gauging barely one inch.

Outlook Brightens For Big Recreation Center

A vast recreational center for Cross Plains, Rising Star and surrounding communities moved a step nearer reality this week.

The project, proposed at Lakewood Country Club, midway between Cross Plains and Rising Star, gained approval of district Farm Home Administration officials and Soil Conservation Service executives after an on-the-ground inspection over the week end.

Oscar Schaefer, one of three members of the Eastland County FHA executive committee, escorted Elmer L. Foster, area FHA supervisor, Homer P. Cole, county FHA head, and E. J. Hughes, Brownwood SCS director, over the country club premises Friday and reported the trio "deeply impressed and

completely sold on the idea." Total cash outlay, for which an FHA loan will be negotiated, is expected to run between \$60,000 and \$100,000.

Abstract to the Lakewood property is now in the hands of FHA attorneys at Temple. When title is approved, a blueprint of the master plan will be called for showing the improvements to be made and the estimated cost. The complete specifications will then be referred again to the Eastland County committee, composed of Schaefer, Olen Rone of Gorman and Frank H. Parks of Carbon. That committee is said to have funds available and ready to grant the loan.

"No one can be certain at this stage of the planning," said Schaefer Tuesday, "but my guess is that the recreational facilities will be built and ready for use and enjoyment of our people next summer."

FHA executives from six counties met at Comanche last Wednesday and discussed various phases of the recently-broadened FHA objectives for battling the problems of stagnation and deterioration of rural areas. When the Lakewood proposal was explained, it is said to have gained enthusiastic endorsement of the group.

Improvements being planned, all of which would be available to the public, include: a rebuilt golf course, a swimming pool of championship specifications, wading pool for children, convention facilities for family reunions and similar events, boat docks, bath houses, picnic areas and water and sewer facilities for house trailers of vacationers and outdoor playgrounds.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 3, 1964.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8 proposing an amendment to Section 59 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 59 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Subsection which reads as follows:

"(d) No law creating a conservation and reclamation district shall be passed unless notice of the intention to introduce such a bill setting forth the general substance of the contemplated law shall have been published at least thirty (30) days and not more than ninety (90) days prior to the introduction thereof in a newspaper or newspapers having general circulation in the county or counties in which said district or any part thereof is or will be located and by delivering a copy of such notice and such bill to the Governor who shall submit such notice and bill to the Texas Water Commission, or its successor, which shall file its recommendation as to such bill with the Governor, Lieutenant Governor and Speaker

of the House of Representatives within thirty (30) days from date notice was received by the Texas Water Commission. Such notice and copy of bill shall also be given of the introduction of any bill amending a law creating or governing a particular conservation and reclamation district if such bill (1) adds additional land to the district, (2) alters the taxing authority of the district, (3) alters the authority of the district with respect to the issuance of bonds, or (4) alters the qualifications or terms of office of the members of the governing body of the district."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1964, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

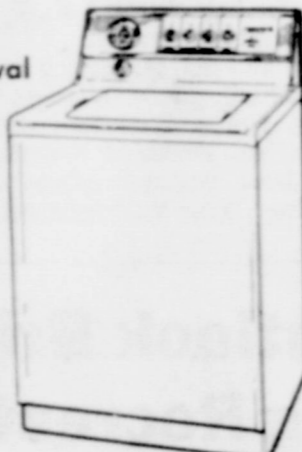

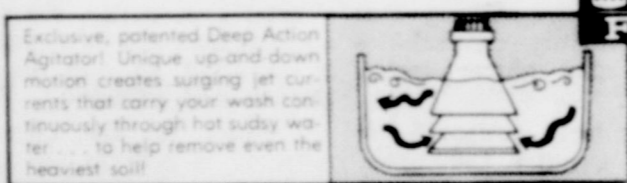
Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

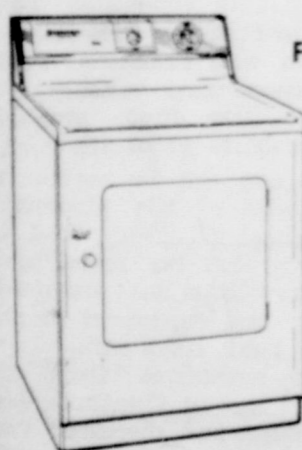

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 3, 1964. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 6 proposing an amendment to Section 5 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to remove the authorization to transfer not exceeding one per cent annually of the total value of the permanent school fund to the available school fund.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. Section 5 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended to read as follows:

"Section 5. The principal of all bonds and other funds, and the principal arising from the sale of the lands hereinbefore set apart to said school fund, shall be the permanent school fund, and all the interest derivable therefrom and the taxes herein authorized and levied shall be the available school fund. The available school fund shall be applied annually to the support of the public free schools. And no law shall ever be enacted appropriating any part of the permanent or available school fund to any other purpose whatever; nor shall the same, or any part thereof ever be

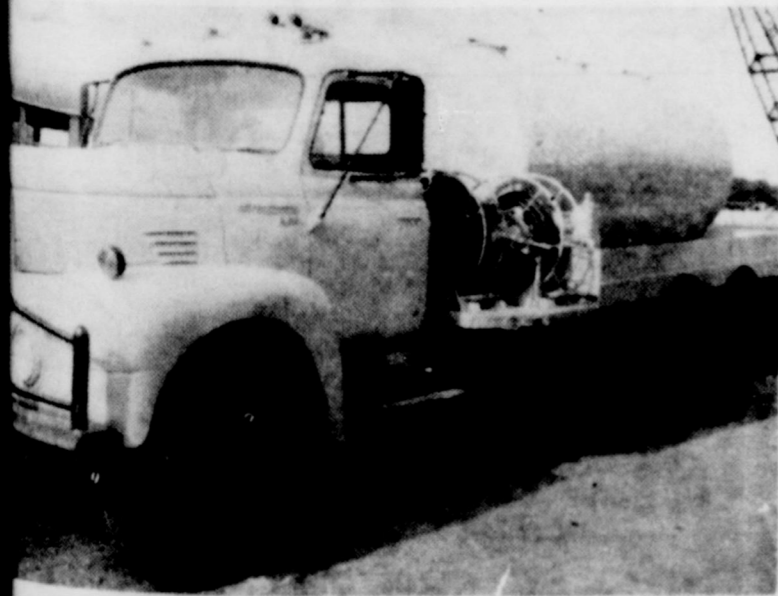

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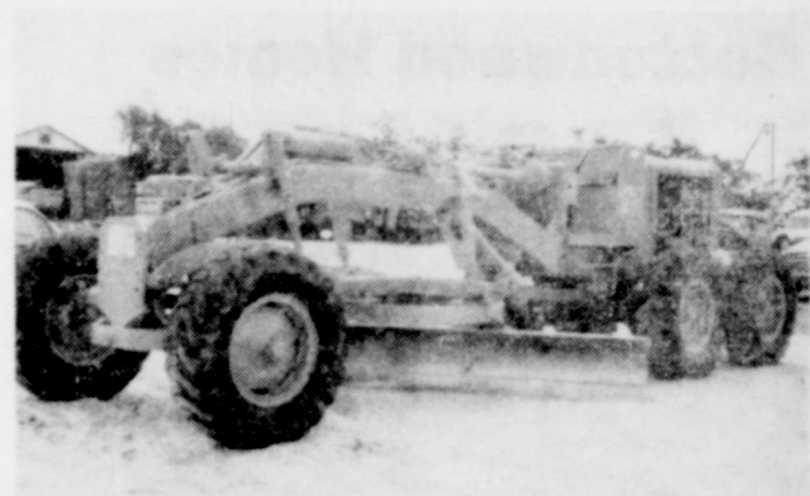
