Pat McNeel Succumbs In Brownwood Tuesday

C. F. (Pat) McNeel, Sr., 68, died shortly after 5 p.m. Tuesday in Brownwood Memorial Hospital.

Mr. McNeel had been in declining health for more than a year. He underwent major surgery last April 21. His condition worsened just before Christmas and he was returned to the hospital. Members of the family had been in constant attendance at the bedside.

Funeral arrangements were incomplete Tuesday night, however, tentative plans called for the services to be held from the First Baptist Church here Thursday afternoon with burial in Cross Plains Cemetery. The body is at Higginbotham Funeral Home.

Mr. McNeel was born in Charleston, Ill., Dec. 14, 1896. He was married to Miss Juanita Harpole May 7, 1925. He was a veteran of World War I, a Shriner and 32nd degree Mason. He served for a number of years as a member of the Cross Plains school board and was widely regarded as an authority on matters pertaining to the petroleum business in this section of Texas.

He had played a vital role in the development of major oil deposits in this area, having been an active oil operator at Pioneer and all other nearby strikes since. With his associates he discovered and developed the Amerada pool between here and Burkett, once described as the greatest shallow oil field on earth. It produces at an approximate depth of 400 feet and has yielded millions of barrels of crude.

Mr. McNeel is survived by his wife; two sons C. F. (Pat) Jr., with whom he was a partner in the oil field supply business here, and Joe, who is stationed at Fort Hood; one brother Craig McNeel of Cross Plains; a sister Mrs. Earl Garner of Indiana and two grandchildren.

Additional details were not available as the Review hurried to press. A more complete account will appear in next week's edition.

Joe Hanke Named Rural Mail Carrier

Joe Hanke, Jr., 35-year-old postal clerk, has been appointed carrier on rural route two out of the Cross Plains post office and will assume the new duties Saturday of this week, Jan. 2.

Hanke was born and reared on route two and knows each of its 513 patrons. He is rounding out seven years service in the local post office. He is an honorably discharged veteran of the Korean War.

Hanke's appointment fills a vacancy created by the retirement of O. M. Bailey a year ago. In the interim the route has been served by L. D. Koenig, who will continue to be Hanke's substitute during vacations and in case of illness.

Route two is 55 and one

tenth miles long, has 168 boxes for 202 families, in which there is a total of 513 individual patrons. Route one out of the Cross Plains office is four miles longer but has 28 less patrons.

Postmaster Lloyd Bryan said yesterday that Hanke's place as clerk at the post office here will be filled by Exal D. McMillan, substitute clerk.

San Angelo Leader, Reared Here, Dies

Porter W. Henderson, 63, who was born at Burkett and reared in Cross Plains, died Saturday morning in San Angelo, where he had resided the past 28 years.

His death came two years and 20 days after that of his wife, the former Faustine Butler, whom he married April 21, 1925, in Cross Plains.

Funeral was held Monday afternoon from the First Christian Church in San Angelo, of which he was a deacon and an elder and chairman of the official board. Burial was in Fairmount Cemetery in San Angelo.

Born June 29, 1901, in Burkett, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. J. P. Henderson, he attended school in Cross Plains. He and his family moved to San Angelo in 1936, where he became manager and later owner of a large farm implement concern. He was an outstanding civic leader in San Angelo, serving for 20 years as a trustee for San Angelo College, being president of the board at the time of his death.

Mr. Henderson served as agriculture chairman of San Angelo's Board of City Development, as a Director of the Upper Colorado River Authority from 1948 to 1956, as president of the West Texas Game & Fish Association, as chairman of the old Tom Green County Ration Board, as chairman of the Tom Green County Fall Fair and Race Meet, and as public services chairman of the San Angelo Community Chest. He was a former president of the Rotary Club in his city.

Mr. Henderson was a member of Cross Plains' first municipal band and a member of the old Gray Mare Band at Brownwood, a famed musical organization that was official band for West Texas Chamber of Commerce for years. He played the bass horn.

Surviving are two sons, Porter, Jr., of Denton and Joe of San Angelo; two sisters Mrs. Ralph Buckingham of Gainesville and Mrs. J. T. Lawrence of Baird; and four grandchildren.

Homer P. Moon, 64, Buried Here Monday

Homer P. Moon, 64, Rowden rancher and long-time resident of Callahan County, died at 10:10 Sunday morning in Callahan County Hospital, where he had been a patient since suffering a heart attack two weeks ago.

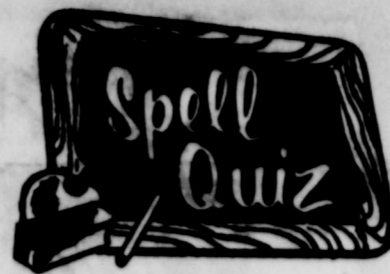

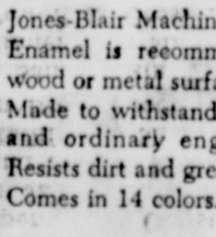
