# Chief J. T. Foster Battles Most

Of 49 Fires Here During 1964

NUMBER FORTY-ONE

Travis Foster, Cross Plains Volunteer Fire Department Chief, responded to more of the 49 calls for help last year than any other of the company's 25 members. Foster participated in 42 pleas, and Jack Tunnell, Chief of the country crew, was second to Foster with 41.

During the past 12 months 32 fewer alarms were sounded than in 1963 when local firemen answered 81 calls. Twenty-six runs were made into the surrounding countryside, and 23 calls were heeded within the city limits. Nine fires were reported in the months of June and August and eight in March. There were none in







Rainfall by months was as follows: January 2.40, February 1.67 March 1.47, April 2.69, May .30, June .55, July .10, August 3.02, September 8.95, October 1.45, November 1.68 and December .35.
