Pat McNeel Laid To Rest Thursday

Last rites were held Thursday afternoon for C. F. (Pat) McNeel, Sr., 68, who died two days before in a Brownwood hospital after about a year of declining health.

Services were conducted from the First Baptist Church with the Rev. Don Turner, pastor, officiating. Burial was in Cross Plains Cemetery under direction of Higginbotham Funeral Home.

Mr. McNeel, an aggressive, early-day oil operator in this area underwent major surgery last April 21. His condition worsened just before Christmas and he was returned to the hospital. He died shortly after five o'clock Tuesday afternoon.

Born Dec. 14, 1896, in Charleston, Ill., Mr. McNeel came to this area in the early 1920's and was married to Miss Juanita Harpole May 7, 1925. He was an active operator at Pioneer and all other nearby fields since that time. He was a 32nd degree Mason, a Shriner and formerly served as a member of the board of trustees for Cross Plains Independent School District. He was a veteran of World War I.

Mr. McNeel is survived by his wife; two sons C. F. (Pat) Jr., with whom he was a partner in the oil field supply business here, and Joe, who is stationed at Fort Hood; one brother, Craig McNeel of Cross Plains; a sister Mrs. Earl Garner of Indiana and two grandchildren.

Tilton Oil Co., Brownwood, staked No. 1 A. L. Conlee three miles south of Cross Plains in Brown County Regular Field. The planned 1,750-foot rotary Cross Cut Sand test in on a 400 acre lease.

Drillsite is 1,400 feet from the south and 2,640 feet from the west lines of J. Simmons Survey 779.

Tilton Oil Co. staked No. 2 A. L. Conlee as another 1,750-foot rotary venture. Drillsite is 3,150 feet from the south and 2,640 feet from the west lines of J. Simmons Survey 779.

The firm filed application to re-enter to 999 feet to test the Tannehill Sand at No. 3 A. L. Conlee. Site is 3,550 feet from the south and 3,330 feet from the east lines of J. Simmons Survey 779.

It was originally drilled as Ne-Tex Oil Corp. No. 2 A. L. Conlee.

Across the line in Callahan County Regular, Tilton Oil Co. filed application to re-enter No. 2 Tom Conlee. It will go to 999 feet with rotary.

Location is 990 feet from the north and 2,640 feet from the west lines of J. Simmons Survey 779. The venture was originally drilled as Ne-Tex Oil Corp. No. 1 A. L. Conlee.

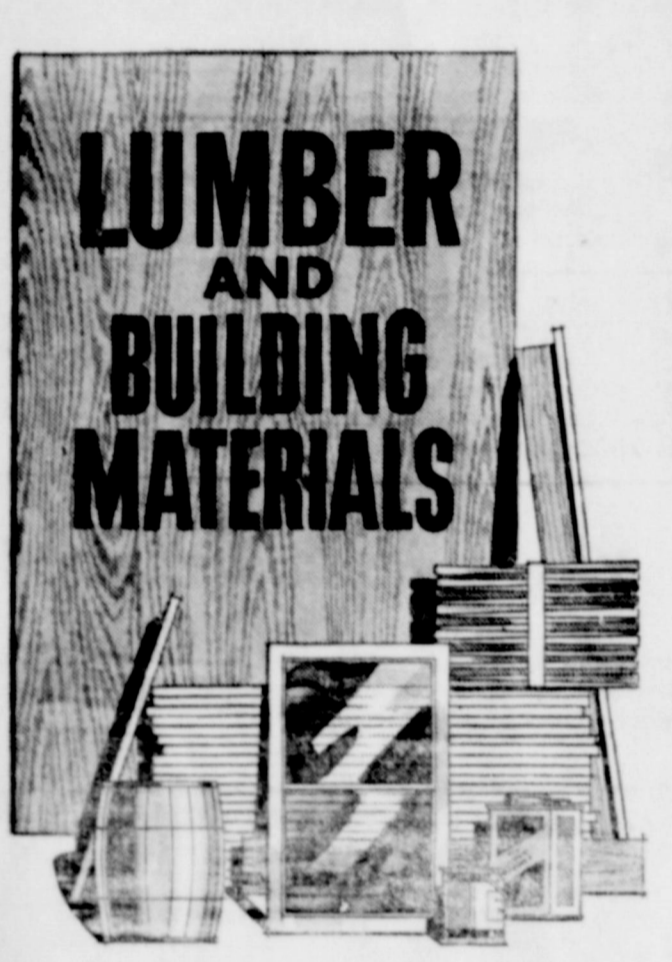

Pilot Project Planned For Pickle Production

Ted Souder, member of the Chamber of Commerce's industrial expansion committee, reports that Dalton Best Maid Products, Inc., a Fort Worth food packing concern, is interested in having as much as 500 acres in the Cross Plains area planted to cucumbers.

In an interview here over the week end the firm is reported to have told Souder it would guarantee purchases from that amount of planting.

Cucumbers are graded in four classes. Number one, those 7/8 inch in diameter, are currently priced by the Fort Worth packer at \$7.75 per 100 pounds. Number two grade, those 1 1/4 inch in diameter, are priced at \$3.50 per 100. Number three, cucumbers, 1 3/4 inches in diameter bring \$1.60 per hundred

and number fours, those two inches in diameter, 60 cents per 100.

"The firm agrees to comply with major companies on an up-and-down price scale when the market is open," Souder said.

Later this month an effort will be made to have a number of prospective growers meet with representatives of the Fort Worth concern in an effort to see if sufficient acreage can be obtained here to justify local production. Time and place of the meeting will be announced by Souder.

It is reported that cucumbers, grown under such arrangements, customarily yield a minimum of \$175 per acre. Best planting time is said to be from April 10 to 15.

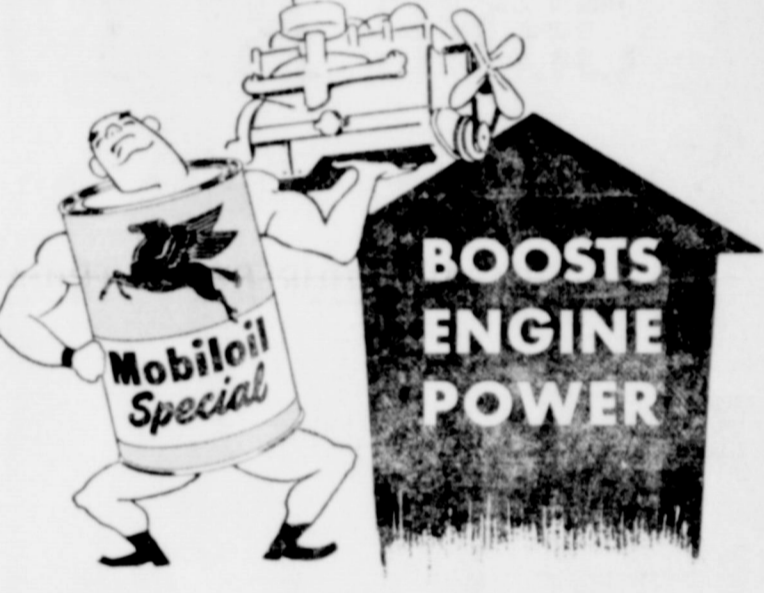

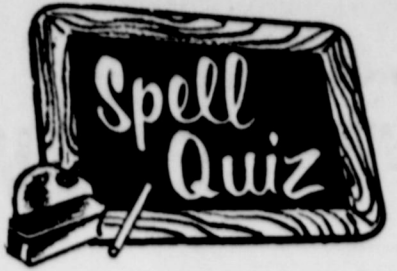
