He said that his firm would buy cucumbers if planted, cultivated and harvested to his firm's specifications and that a price schedule ranging upward to \$7.75 per 100 pounds would be paid.

Farmers present at the meeting indicated about 80 acres of irrigated land and 30 acres of dry land would be planted to

Approximately 500 acres of dry land, or 250 of irrigated land, is neeeded to make a project here practicable. Most of the land offered Monday night was in the Sabanno and Rising Star areas. Others desiring to enter into the project are advised to contact Ted Souder or Wayne Westerman, both of whom are equipped with copies of contracts and price schedules. Another meeting will be held here around Feb. 10 to add additional acreage and sign final contracts.

A meeting of the same general nature will be held the night of Feb. 1 at 7:30 in the Vocational Agriculture building on the school campus at Rising Star. Interested persons are invited to attend.

It is pointed out that if the project materializes the pickle concern will provide growers with free services of an agronomist to advise producers during the crop's growing and harvest season.
