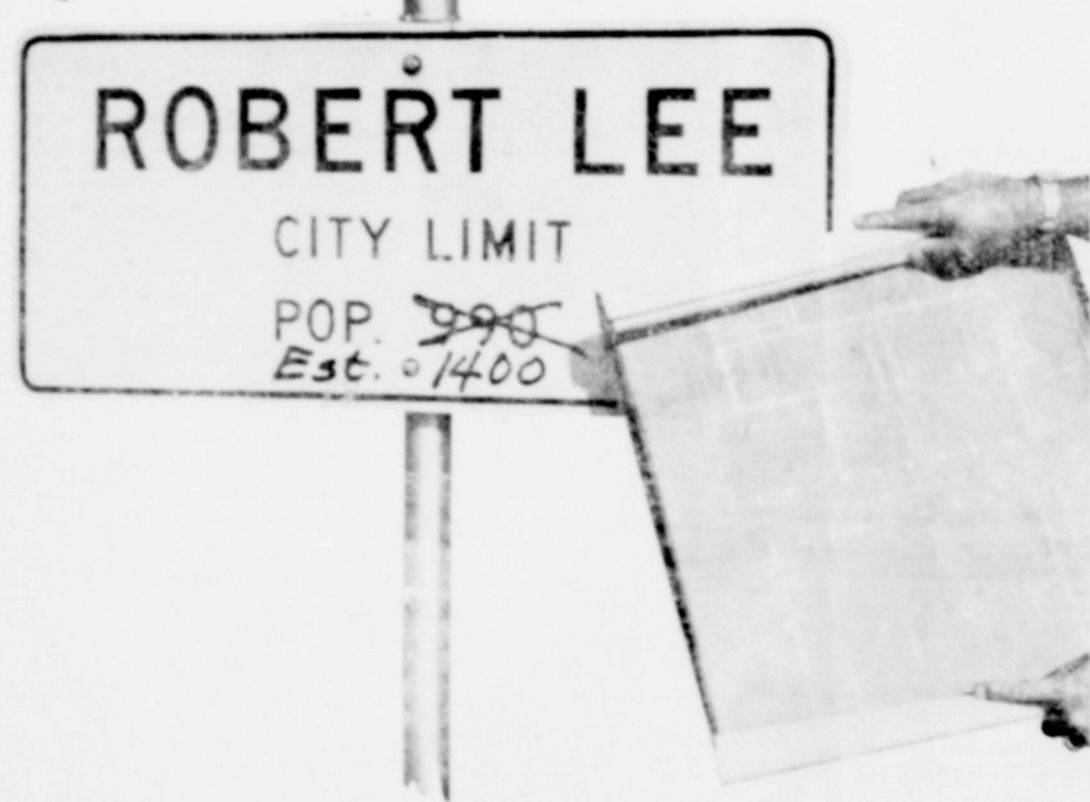

All Callahan County schools have complied with a federal regulation requiring that reports be filed by Feb. 22, explaining how mixing of the races is planned in local classrooms.

No Negro children attend school in this county. Superintendents of schools at Cross Plains, Putnam, Eula, Baird and Clyde have notified that their schools are "in full compliance with the law."

Schools failing to meet government standards are subject to loss of funds now being received for: counseling and guidance work, vocational and technical training, library assistance, school lunchrooms, adult education and education of the handicapped.

Eula Cagers Claim 17-B Crown With 28th Consecutive Victory

Eula High School Pirates won 28 consecutive basketball games, two tournament titles, and the largest prize of all, the District 17-B cage crown, last week.

The 15-member Pirate crew lost only one game during the 1964-65 season, then retaliated with 28 straight triumphs. The lone smudge on the county's Class B crown wearers' record was an opening game loss to the Abilene Christian High School, a blot which the Callahan team wiped out later in the season.

Pirates grabbed top diadems in both tournneys entered. Cross Plains cage fans saw the cross-countians coast to the Cross Plains title, and Eula also claimed the top position in the Trent High School invitational.

Eula iced the 17-B championship away last week with an 82-67 lacing of loop foe Noodle, former charges of the present Pirate coach, and closed a perfect 8-0 conference slate.

Gerald Jennings masterminded Eula's success. He guided the Buccaneers to second place in 1963-64, and compiled a 16-16 mark in his initial season at Eula. In his two years as basketball mentor there he has notched 44 victories against 17 losses.

Charles Wright, senior center, paced the Eula attack all season long and led in scoring with an 18 point average per game. Also counting in the double figures averagewise were: Sammy Owens, junior guard, with 15; David Black, junior forward, with 12; and David Steele, senior forward, with 10. Other Pirate scorers and averages were Melvin Martin 9, Bob Chittum 6, William Lackey 4.5, Joe McKee and J. W. Gray 4, Bobby Varner 3.4 and Eldridge Mitchell 2.

Recreational Project Awaits Final Approval

Approval and contract by Farm Home Administration of a planned vast family recreational center on Lake Country Club property here and Rising Star is expected within four to six weeks.

(Bob) Needham of Cross Plains, member of the sponsoring committee, said yesterday plans and specifications presented to the government agency had been returned by the FHA with suggested minor changes. Redrawing of plans is expected to be ready for submission to the FHA in the next couple of weeks.

It is believed by those connected with the project that the center will be ready for construction by the end of the year and that only about \$100,000 is believed to be needed for the project.

agency for the center under its recently broadened objectives. One of these is "to aid small towns and rural areas in battling problems of stagnation and deterioration."

To assure financial solvency during the first year of operation, 214 families signed to pay fees of \$5 monthly during the initial 12 months of operation of the recreational center. Thereafter, there will be no regular monthly charges and support will come from usage fees.

Among improvements to be incorporated in the recreational project are a concrete swimming pool to Olympic specifications, boat docks, picnic area, playground equipment, clubhouse encompassing 2,500 square feet, rebuilding of nine-hole golf course with new greens and irrigation of greens and fairways, facilities erected for reunions and family gatherings. Too, utility outlets will be available for house trailers and campers including electricity, gas and sewer.

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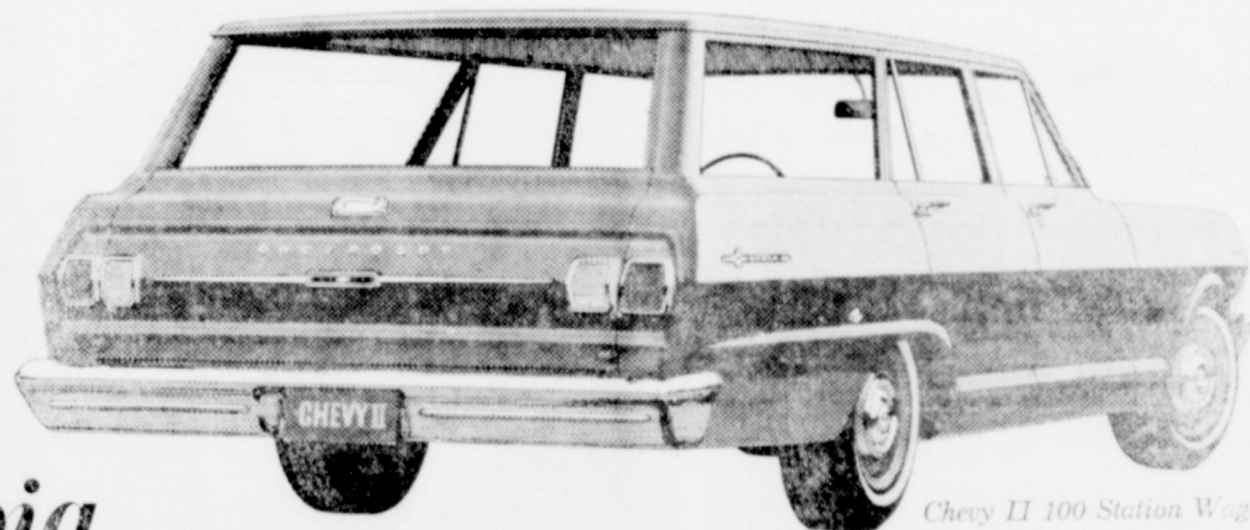

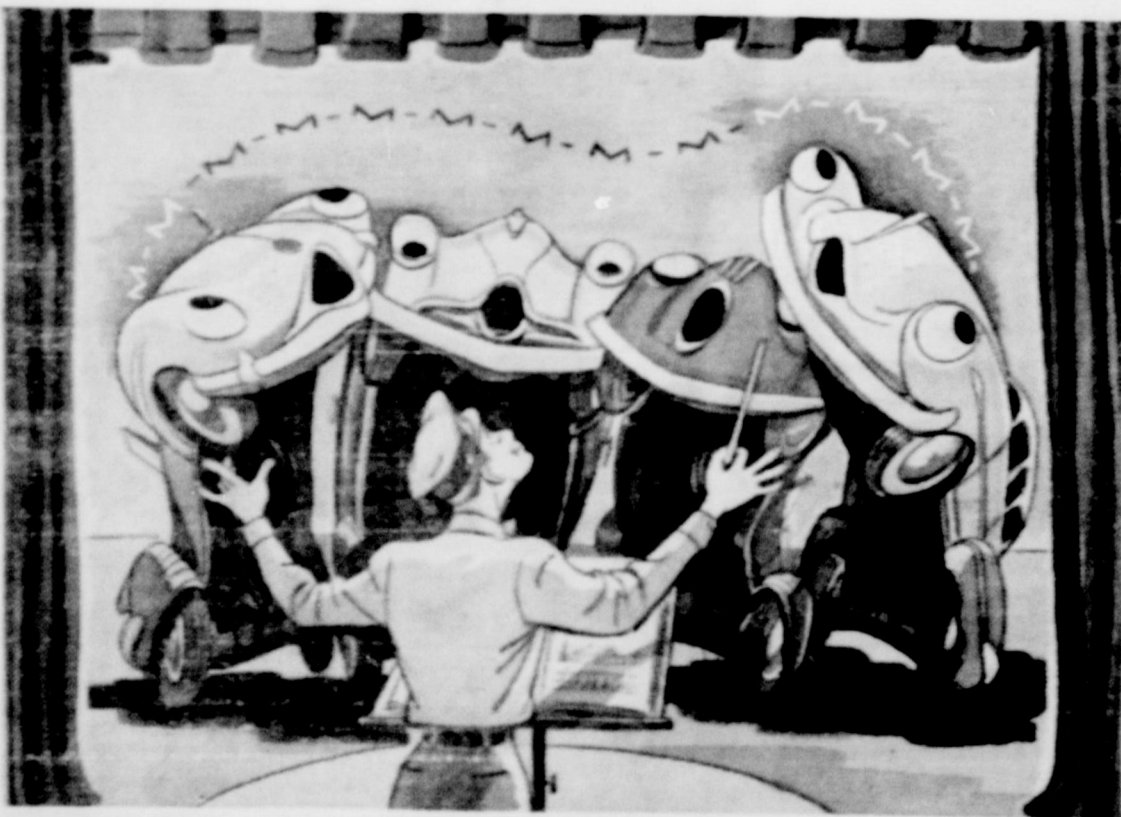

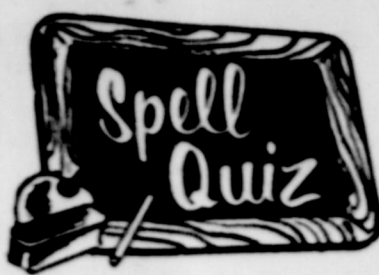
