Baum, Jones, Phillips Elected School Trustees

Newcomers were the choices for trustees of Cross Plains Independent School District in voting here Saturday.

The three vacancies were filled by Edwin Baum, D. C. Jones and Vernon Phillips.

The voter turnout was about 50 percent, but the 405 polls were counted in recent years. It is a record for the district.

Just slightly more than 50 percent of the voters in the district the past year.

Judge Alton Hornsby presided over the following results after the polls closed Saturday.

Dale Bishop received one write-in vote.

Walker and Sowell were seeking reelection to another three-year term, whereas all other aspirants were looking for a first tenure.

T. O. Dulaney of Clyde received 381 votes in the Cross Plains box for trustee-at-large to the County School Board. He was unopposed. One write-in ballot was counted for Alton Hornsby and Howard Cox each for the county post.

Settlement Nixed In Boundary Fuss

A proposed out-of-court settlement of a boundary dispute in which Coleman County contests its northern limits with Callahan and Taylor Counties has been rejected by Coleman officials and is slated to be tried in 52nd District Court at Comanche either the last of April or early in May.

Estimates are that Callahan County would lose less than \$100 in annual taxation by adoption of lines as being sought by Coleman County. On the other hand, future difficulties might arise in abstracts of property owners in the affected area. It is mainly for this reason that local officials are strongly contending for continuance of the boundary as it is now to be recognized by the General Land Office of Texas.

Horse Show Here Saturday

Four local men appeared on Harry Holt's television show Tuesday night to advertise the Appaloosa Horse Show to be held in Cross Plains Saturday.

Seen were L. D. Koenig, Horace King, Alex Shocklee and Bill Brewer, all members of Cross Plains Riding Club.

Between 75 and 100 Appaloosa horses are expected here for the April 10 show, coming from all sections of the state.

Program calls for full classes in halter and performance events.

Judge for the show will be Alton Thornton of Clyde, who is an approved Appaloosa judge and well-known Callahan County breeder and businessman.

An added attraction to Saturday's show will be four classes for riders of any color horse. This specialty is for children. There will be barrel racing for youths of 12 years and under and also another for youths from 13 to 19 inclusive. Also Western pleasure classes will be open to youngsters of the same age brackets.

It is planned for all other shows to be held by Cross Plains Riding Club to include these events for young riders.

"It has been found that the participation of youngsters adds

much to the interest and enthusiasm of local horse shows," said Alex Shocklee, president of the club.

At the present time the club has an approved quarter horse show set for July 23 and is working

on an open show to be scheduled later in the Summer.

"We have never heard of a small town supporting a horse show as enthusiastically as Cross Plains has repeatedly done," said members of the pro-

motion committee, Shocklee, Koenig and King. "They have backed us 100 percent."

Trophies for Saturday's show are now on exhibit in the display windows at Lane's Variety Store on North Main Street.

Lack Of Funds Imperiling New Baseball Park Here

"Do people of the Cross Plains area really want teenage baseball here?"

That was the question being asked by many local teenage baseball officials here yesterday when it was reported that not a single donation had been deposited toward the building of a new park here. The proposed baseball field, an enlarged version of the present Little League Park, is to be constructed immediately south of the present facility if funds are forthcoming.

It was estimated by finance committee that it would take approximately \$2,000 to construct, properly light and equip the new field. Officials of the

project estimated that lighting alone will cost \$1,500, and they are hoping that an additional \$500 will cover wire for backstop, fencing and incidental expenses.

Donations may be handed to any teenage official or mailed in care of Edwin Baum to the Citizens State Bank in Cross Plains. Checks should be made payable to Cross Plains Teenage Baseball Fund.

"Interest in baseball by local youths has out-grown present facilities," said Bill Pope, local teenage league president, "and in order to continue to offer summer recreation to the maximum number of area youths a new field is badly needed."

Alert Officer Averts Danger City In Wee Hours Sunday

Stillness of the hour was broken by a loud report at 3:33 a.m. Police Chief Edgar Heard, who was patrolling streets and alleys at the time, hurried to the area from which the sound emanated. He immediately discovered a major break at an

office meter in the main line of the municipally-owned gas system. Gas was contaminating a wide area and imperiled nearby homes and traffic moving down the highway.

Heard summoned Gas Commissioner Roy Cox who quickly began immediate repairs assisted by others of the city staff.

In the meantime Chief Heard had enlisted aid of Highway Patrolman Bill Vineyard and Deputy Sheriff Howard Cox. The trio assumed responsibility of the traffic movement around the contaminated area and averted accident.

Commissioner Cox said Sunday he felt that the alertness of Heard and his prompt discovery of the threat possibly prevented serious damage and perhaps loss of life.

"It's nice to retire at night knowing an alert officer is protecting our well-being," Cox said.

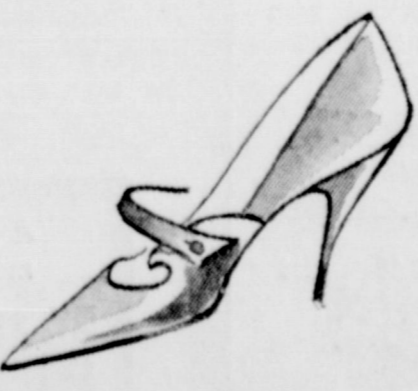

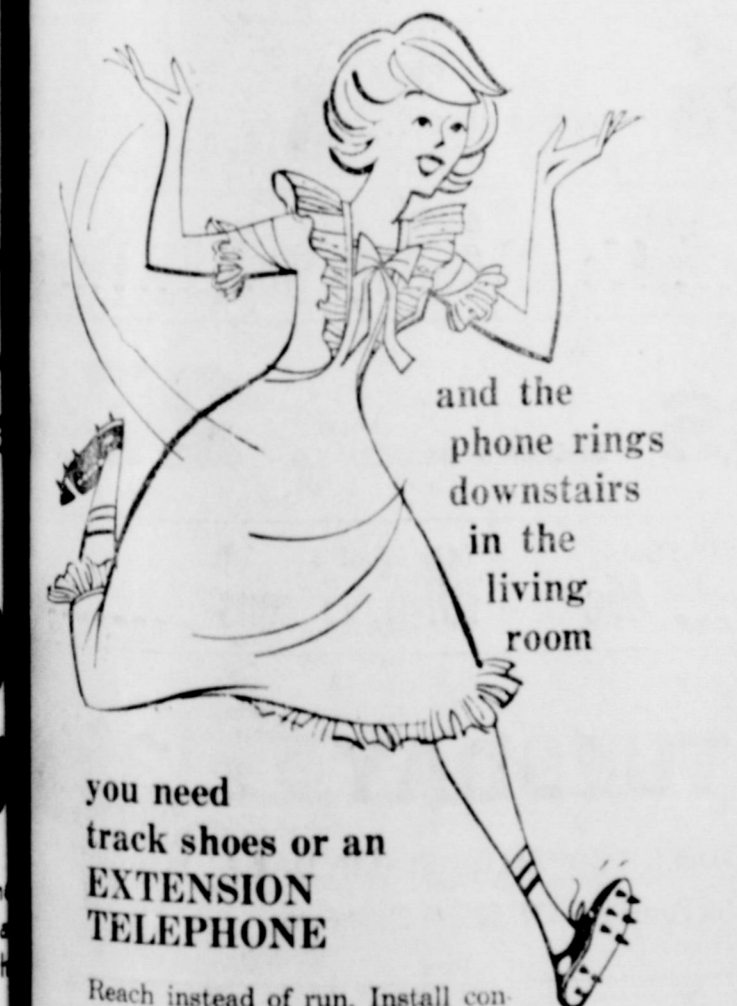

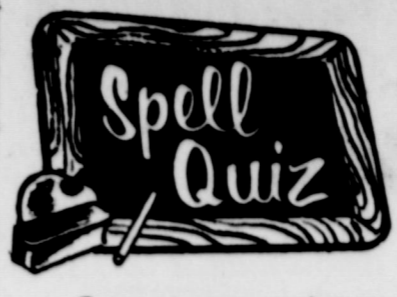
4 Local FFA Teams At Area Judging Tests

Contributions are now being sought for maintenance of Belle Plain Cemetery, one of Callahan County's oldest burial plots.

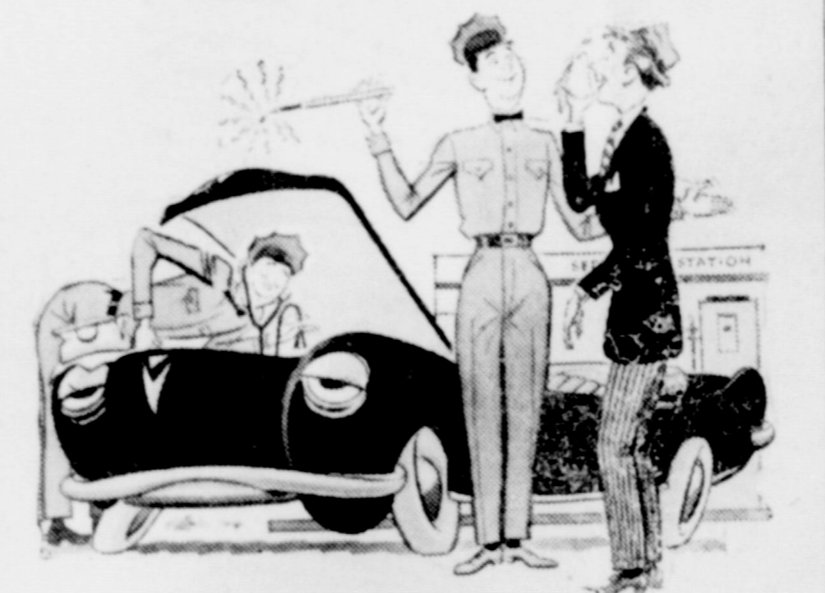
