Jimmielee Payne Heads Housing Authority Here

Appointment is made by E. Roth of the appointment of Jimmielee Payne to head the Cross Plains Housing Authority to fill a recently-created vacancy. Payne was named to succeed J. H. Dillard, who resigned after being elected to the City Council and thereby became ineligible for the former office. Payne was chosen to replace T. (Tom) Cox, who was relieved because of the illness of other business. Payne is a member of the Cross Plains Chamber of Commerce and is the wife of Dale Bishop, Jimmy Dillard and Cliff Gilmore. She succeeded McCord as executive director of the Housing Authority and maintains an office on Main Street, just north of the City Hall.

A loan for \$256,605 was granted last October by the Housing and Home Finance Agency in Washington, D. C., for the construction of 20 low-rent housing units in Cross Plains.

Previously announced plans call for 14 of the units to be situated near the downtown district, within easy walking distance of the post office, stores and shops and for the six others to be in the proximity of the school campus. It is presumed that the units nearer the business section will be for elderly people, whereas the others will be more specifically for younger families, those with children.

Rodeo Trippers Pay Call Here Saturday

A motorcade boosting the upcoming Callahan County Sheriff's Posse Rodeo, to be held in Baird April 29, 30 and May 1, roared into Cross Plains loud and enthusiastic shortly after 4 p.m. Saturday.

Despite the stop here being last on an itinerary for the day which saw visits at Coleman, Winters, Ballinger, Bangs, Santa Anna, Brownwood, May and Rising Star, the trippers were in high spirits and announced a similar excursion would be repeated this week end, paying calls to cities north and west of Baird.

B. H. Freeland, member of the publicity and promotional committee handling this year's rodeo celebration, said yesterday that plans are being laid to accommodate largest crowds ever to view a wild west show in Callahan County.

"This year we have the nation's top cowboys — the men who are to that sport what Mickey Mantle is to baseball and Jack Nicholas is to golf — together with the wildest string of bucking stock ever corralled in this county; this will be a show to remember," he said.

Researcher Learns Rare About Ex-Local Man

Bledsoe of Lubbock, Mrs. Jack Tunnell of Cross Plains, is compiling a genealogy of his family. Recently took him to the home of Jacob Collins, a kinsman once lived at La Grove.

Further research developed that Mr. Collins had been a knife maker of renown and that he and Bryant became acquainted when the latter lived at Moody while Collins was at La Grove.

Bryant became a regular purchaser of Collins-made knives, often giving them to friends at Christmas time. In later years, after Mr. Collins returned to Mississippi to ply his trade, the commerce between the two men continued.

Old papers uncovered by Mr. Bledsoe produced a poem written by the former Cross Plains man, heralding the character of Collins and the high quality of his knives.

Mrs. Tom Bryant has known for years of her late husband's admiration for the Collins type knife but never realized that the cutter had a kinsman in the very town where she resides. It was all revealed one day recently when Mr. Bledsoe and his daughter called on Mrs. Bryant to discuss the rarity.

"Oh, yes, I know about Jacob Collins, the knife maker," Mrs. Bryant said, "my husband thought they were the world's finest; we still have a few among his keepsakes."
And she gave Mrs. Tunnell one of the knives in remembrance of the master craftsman in her family.

Callahan County Collects \$2,700 Daily In Social Security Benefits

Monthly old-age, survivors, and disability insurance benefits in Callahan County now top \$81,000, R. R. Tuley, Jr., District Manager of Social Security in Abilene, said Tuesday on releasing his annual benefit data report.

Checks coming to Callahan approximate \$2,700 daily. The new monthly figure represents an increase of four per cent over the corresponding period last year.

"This increase can be attributed to the changes in the law in recent years, as well as to the growth of our aged population," Tuley said. This money stimulates county business; most of it is spent for food, clothing and shelter.

"There is no longer any doubt that social security benefits are helping to stabilize the income and spending power of many residents in this county," Tuley pointed out. He noted that as of December 31, 1964, some 1,485 countians were collecting over \$981,660 annually from social security.

More people in Callahan County, he said, could draw social security benefits if they knew more about the law, and for that reason they are urged to visit or call the local social security office whenever they have a question concerning their benefits or responsibilities.

Retired workers comprise the largest beneficiary group with 841 receiving \$53,177 monthly. Two hundred seventy-two wives or husbands claim \$8,413 in payments each month, and in the group of widow, widower or parent, 160 beneficiaries get \$9,235. One hundred thirty-three county mothers and children receive \$6,230 while 79 disabled workers and dependents receive checks totaling \$4,750 per month.

Auto Wreck Is Fatal To Bowden Freeman

Burkett Writer Relates History Of Community

Editors Note: This history is condensed from a story written by Mrs. Merrel Burkett in July, 1958.

The story of Burkett is one of prosperity and progress in its time. Its history goes back almost a hundred years when a few farmers and ranchers, with their covered wagons, settled on the Pecan Bayou.

This little town is located on Highway 206 between Coleman and Cross Plains and is one of the beauty spots in Coleman County, lying on the Pecan Bayou surrounded by a beautiful grove of native Pecan trees. This grove, which has been the scene of picnics and gatherings during the past three decades is unsurpassed in its loveliness during the hot summer months.

Farmers and ranchers were settling this area as early as the 1850's. One of these families was that of John Burkett who came here from Lavaca County in 1852. Others include the pioneer families of Bibb Babb, Tom Young, Greer Gray, Latt Edmondson and others.

One of the earliest merchants in Burkett was J. L. (Uncle Jim) Allen who came to this section in the early 1870's and settled about a half-mile south of the present townsite. He operated a 40-acre farm until 1897. Then one James Golsen arrived to take possession of the farm, which he had inherited from his half brother. Mr. Allen entered the grocery and dry-goods business. His store was a covered passage between two log cabins. Two large bulldozers guarded the vulnerable structure.

During the next five years other businesses sprang up. Will Burkett built a building which later housed the first Burkett post office, and he was its first postmaster.

J. W. Golsen and E. C. Hankins operated one of the early grocery stores in Burkett. Their building was erected in 1890 where the tabernacle now stands.

Willie and Johnny Audas came to Burkett from Brown County and in 1895 established a business there which continued to be family operated for more than half a century.

Henry Sackett and I. L. Wright were other pioneer businessmen who played important roles in the history of Burkett.

Among the lodges organized in early-day Burkett were Odd Fellows, Modern Woodmen, IOOF and Woodmen of the World, with charter members such as Will Burns, W. C. Thames, W. C. Henderson, John Gaines, Dr. John Cochran, Jim and Calvin Baker, J. W. Golsen

and Dr. M. Mannering.

The first church in Burkett was built by a Presbyterian congregation in 1900, and one of its early pastors was Dr. B. T. McClellan, founder of Daniel Baker College. The Burkett Baptist Church was pastored by the Rev. Dan Matthews and D. C. Stark served as pastor for the Pecan Grove Methodist Church.

Burkett Church of Christ purchased the Presbyterian building and used it until their present house of worship was erected about 1935.

Methodists and Baptists built permanent structures about two years later.

Burkett's school history covers a period of almost 100 years. The first school there was a one-room log cabin on Gobbler Creek about five miles south-east of the present town. J. T. Evans was a pioneer teacher in the community. In 1875 the log cabin was abandoned and education was carried on in a small house on the J. L. Clark farm, south of Burkett.

The last school there was constructed in 1936-37 and it contributed not a few prominent athletes and scholars before it closed several years ago.

First telephone exchange in Burkett dates back to the early 1900's, the switchboard being operated by several old-timers such as W. M. Burkett, Will Sackett, Tom Audas, and others.

Oil was discovered on the G. M. Gray ranch in 1918 and this prepared the way for the Amerada Petroleum Co. which continues to function just west of Burkett. During the next several years oil was found in just about every direction from the town.

Like many others, Burkett was a frontier town, but unlike so many others, it grew and prospered, for many years, far past what one might expect for "just a little Texas community."

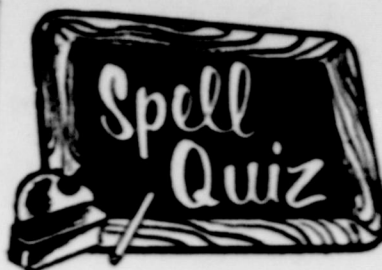
