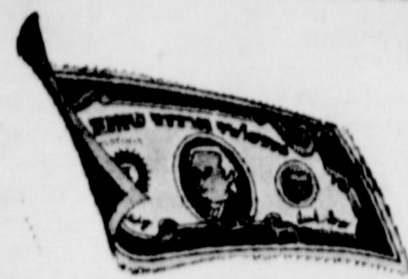

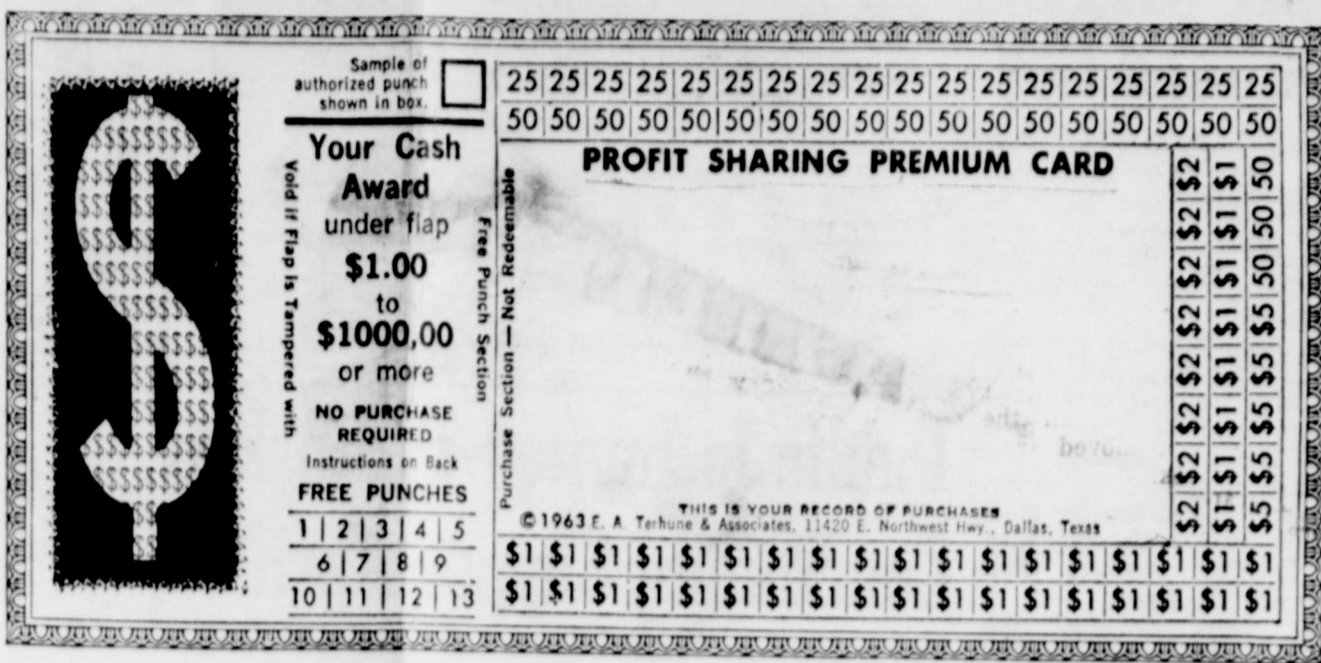

# Only 16 Men Have Served As Sheriff Of Callahan County

Only 16 men have served as sheriff in the 88-year history of Callahan County.

T. J. Norrell was appointed first sheriff and served from Jan. 30, 1887, to Jan. 7, 1879.

J. W. Jones became sheriff Jan. 8, 1879, and served until Nov. 30, 1894.

T. B. Hadley succeeded Jones, taking office Nov. 30, 1894, and served two years. Jones was again elected and served two more years, retiring from the office Nov. 30, 1900.

T. A. (Ab) Irvin who formerly enjoyed the distinction of serving longer than all others, became sheriff Dec. 1, 1900, and filled five terms. It was during his tenure that the much talked of "Mexican hanging" affair took place on the courthouse lawn at Baird.

Following Irvin was F. F. (Felix) Hains, who served two terms, and then moved to Abilene where he became chief of the police department.

John Moore was elected sheriff and took office Nov. 11, 1914. He was reelected in 1916 and served until Dec. 5, 1918.

G. H. Corn became sheriff

Dec. 5, 1918, and served one term, being defeated by C. E. Bray, who served until the last day of 1924. Corn, having defeated Bray for reelection, took office again January 1, 1925, and served two more years.

Everett (Ev) Hughes was sworn in as sheriff Jan. 1, 1927, and completed two terms. He then became associated with a major oil company as a law enforcement officer, which position he held more than 20 years.

R. L. (Bob) Edwards took office Jan. 1, 1930, and was elected three consecutive times. Clarence Nordyke, who had been Edwards' chief deputy, was elected in 1938, and served until Dec. 1, 1942, when he resigned to accept commission as a Texas Ranger.

B. O. Brame was appointed to serve out Nordyke's unexpired term and filled the office until Dec. 31, 1944.

W. A. Peterson was elected in 1944, took office Jan. 1, 1945, and served until Dec. 31, 1946.

S. S. Nichols followed Peterson, taking office Jan. 1, 1947, and serving one term.

Joe Pierce, who had been a deputy under Nichols, was elected and took office Jan. 1, 1949. Pierce served three terms, relinquishing the office Dec. 31, 1954.

Homer Price, incumbent sheriff who now owns the honor of having served in that capacity longer than any other sheriff, was first elected in 1956, a third in 1960, and his fourth in 1964, the latter three being for a period of four years due to a change in Texas statutes.

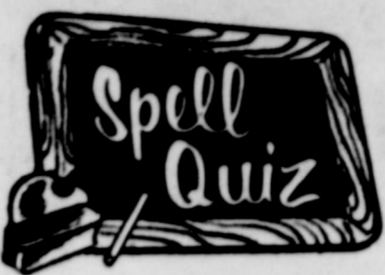
