When thunder was heard in Cross Plains last February, old timers cautioned "there'll be frost in April." The forecast proved true last Thursday morning as a light frost blanketed sections of the town and several nearby areas. Vegetation was only slightly damaged.

G. O. Parrish, who lives in the northeast part of town, had tender potato and bean plants nipped in his garden. The vegetation, which appeared to have been seared, was exhibited in town as evidence for late-risers who did not view the unusuality.

Charley Howard Edgington reports that the frost was rather general near his mother's place on the Bayou between here and Brownwood.

Mrs. Eugene Grider says the frost was 'most evident' at her home next door to the Fonia Worthy place in the western edge of Cross Plains.

C. R. (Mike) Cook reported frost at his home, 11 miles west of town, although his thermometer registered only 38 degrees at the time.

# 1,000 Expected At Dog Show Here

The biggest and best coon, fox and wolf dog show in history of Star Fox Hunters Association is planned for Saturday afternoon and evening in the city park here.

H. H. Harrelson of Cisco, president of the organization, announced yesterday that preparations were almost complete to accommodate an estimated 1,000 people and 700 to 800

dogs in the annual show here. Saturday's event is the fourth straight year for the bench and trial affair to be held in Cross Plains. The club was organized in Rising Star 16 years ago and until 1961 the annual exhibition was held in Eastland County, however the show out-grew facilities in Rising Star and was moved to the Cross Plains City Park.

Coon dog bench show will kick off activities at 2 p.m., and field trials for the coon dogs will take up most of the afternoon. Fox and wolf dog bench show will start at 8 p.m. High point of the annual affair will be a western style barbecue supper with all trimmings, which will be served at 6 p.m. Club officials asked the ladies to bring pies and cakes for the supper, but all other food will be provided. The public is invited to the shows and supper.

Convention judge will be Henry Russell of Brownwood and the ringmaster will be Hazel Russell Ryan of Coleman. Moore Eubank of Goldthwaite will be master of ceremonies. Trophies and ribbons will be awarded in each show, and largest coon brought to the show for field events.

A work day was slated first of the week by a local committee to prepare the grounds for Saturday's show. Cross Plains committeemen are: Mr. and Mrs. R. C. Merryman, Jr., Beryl Lusk, W. B. Holcomb, Ben Porter, Tim Gray, Edwin Erwin, Sam Sipes and Billy Dillard.

Cards were mailed several days ago to the 225 club members. The association has members in all parts of Texas and several other states, the majority, however, is from Central Texas.

Trophies to be awarded at the event are currently displayed in a window in the local Higginbotham store.

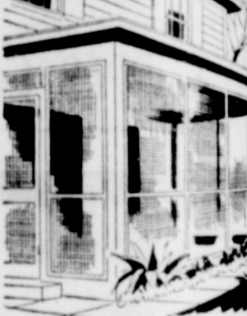
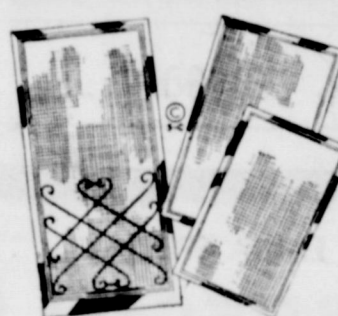

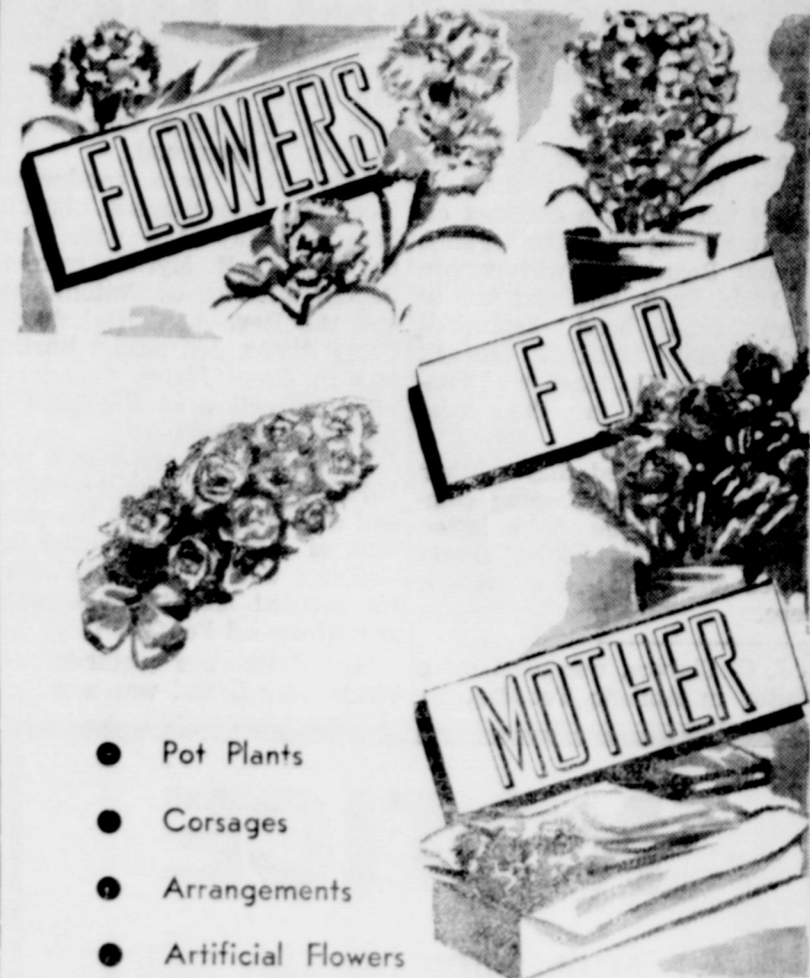
### Indian Missionary Shows Film, Talks

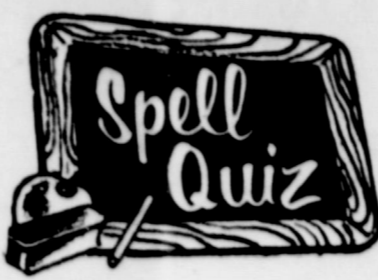
