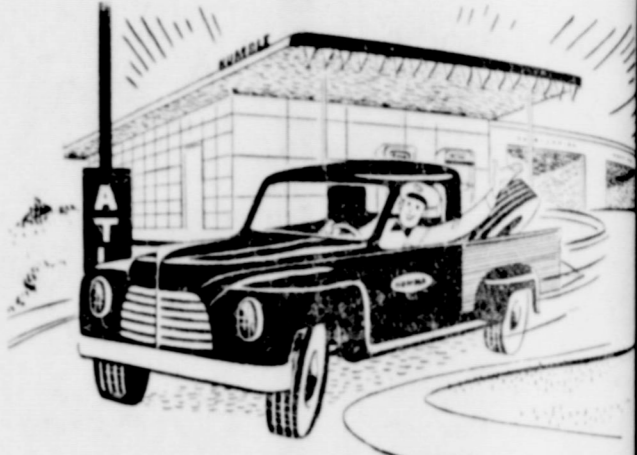

## Local Man Gets Year In Jail For Assault On Small Stepson

Thomas Lynn Dewbre, 18, of Cross Plains, was given one year in jail and fined \$500 Thursday morning of last week, after he pleaded guilty to aggravated assault on his 16-month-old stepson.

The punishment was assessed by County Judge Byron Richardson upon a charge that Dewbre had held the child's feet against a hot stove.

Dewbre signed a statement the day before in 42nd District Attorney Bradley Miles' office in Abilene, after he reportedly "failed" a lie-detector test. He had volunteered to take the test after a Callahan County grand jury in Baird began investigation of the incident.

Callahan County Attorney James Paul Shanks filed the misdemeanor count against Dewbre after Miles turned over the statement and information in the case. Miles explained no felony was involved.

The statement, officers said Dewbre signed, declared that the child's feet were held against a hot stove in the bathroom. "It was done on impulse because I was mad," Dewbre was quoted as having said.

The statement related that the mother doctored the child's

feet but that he was not taken to a physician because she didn't have any money.

The mother later took the child to her parents in Abilene, because "she feared for his safety," the statement continued. The grandparents had the boy treated by an Abilene doctor.

Action was immediately instituted to give the grandparents legal custody of the child.

Dewbre married the child's mother last November and the baby came here to live with them in January.

Grand jury investigation of the incident began after Callahan County officers heard persistent rumors of aggravated assault upon the child by his stepfather.

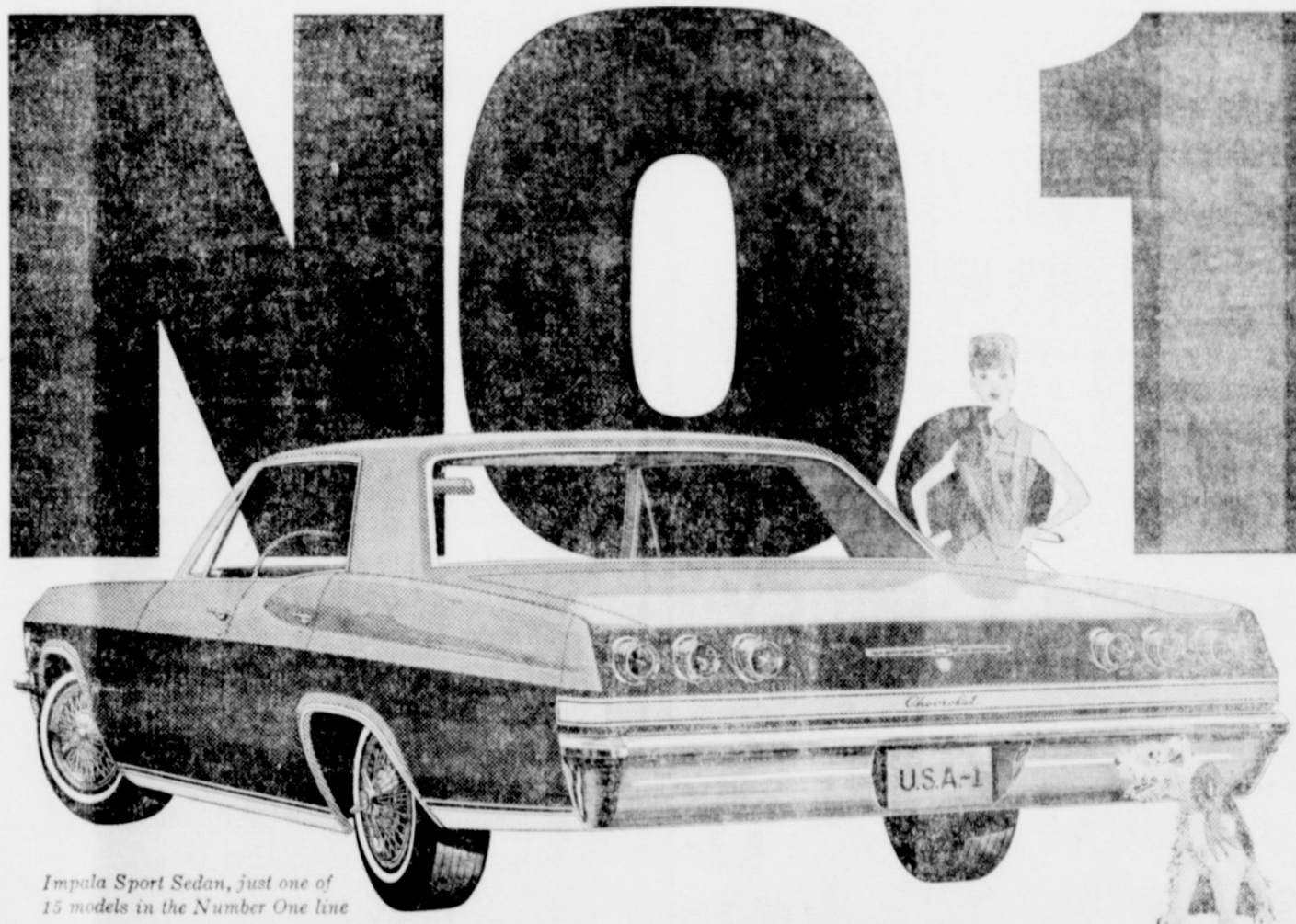

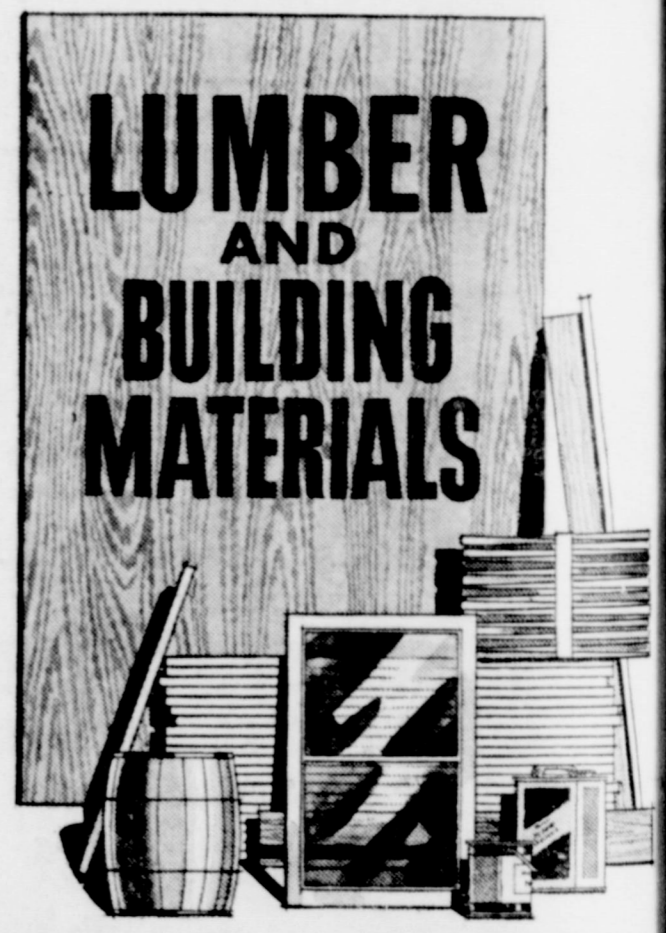

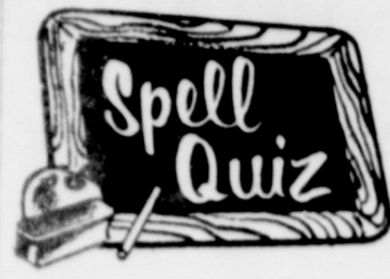
