## Retention Dams Said To Stopped Overflow

Officials of the Turkey Creek Conservation District attributed the prevention of a possible recurrence of Turkey Creek flooding during the recent rains to flood prevention dams built in the past few years.

A. L. Breeding said first of the week that Turkey Creek was bank-full from run-off below the dams, but it did not spill over adjacent land. He said that the dams slowed run-off in the watershed where up to eight inches of rain fell during a 10-day period therefore preventing a reenactment of the devastation of land, fences, livestock and other property in the drainage area such as the 1957 flooding.

Eleven such conservation dams have built on tributaries of Turkey Creek.

The tiny bird shows to have been injured, though not believed seriously, during the two nights of braving the "unaccustomed outside."

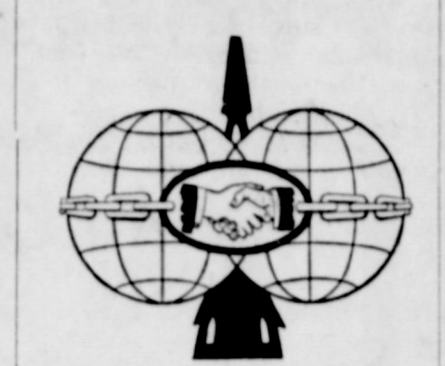
## 43 Young Drivers Pass Written Test

## More Rules Made For Brownwood Lake Use

The 1963 addition of "Rules and Regulations Governing the Use of the Shore Line of Brownwood Lake" received 12 amendments last week, to become effective immediately.

In most cases the amendments were clarifications or extensions and not direct changes to existing rules.

The main changes came under the heading of "Safety Measures" and one entirely new law was added to the eight laws under "General."

The ninth "general" rule is hereby declared unlawful to pollute the water of Lake Brownwood by petroleum oil or salt water to enter the water from any part of the watershed, and every day such pollution shall constitute a criminal offense.

The "safety measures" include prohibiting hunting or shooting a rifle at the lake, and riders on the boat or the backs of the boat or the backs of the boat or the backs of the boat.

The next section amended. One simple sentence was able to accomplish the task.

"All of the foregoing rules covering skiing shall also apply to surfing."

The last major section to have changes made in it was the one controlling "Houseboats, Boat Docks and Other Floating Structures."

It was decided that it would be improper for such structures to be anchored in front of personal property without the consent of the owner and the rules were amended to read so.

Chemical toilets were the next requirement, and all houseboats with sleeping quarters or on which people remain overnight must have them.

Mother knew in a few more weary days she would be where there was no more heartaches, suffering or pain.

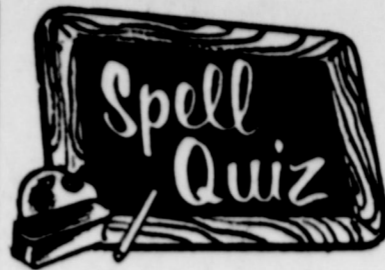
She is not forgotten as dawns another month. Our lonely hours of thinking thoughts of her are always near.

ville, where he will be advisor for the Austin College ASCS program.

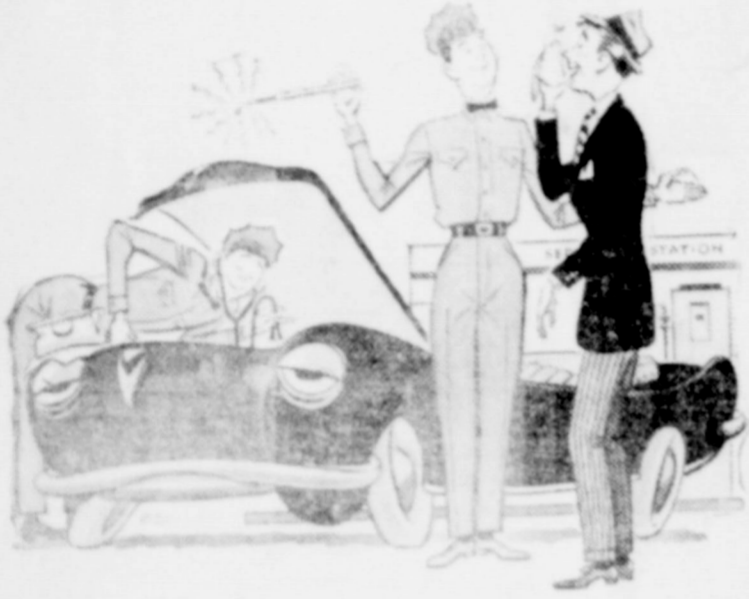
