Border Trial Date Moved To July 9

A scheduled hearing on the boundary dispute between Coleman County and Callahan and Taylor counties was postponed Wednesday afternoon of last week.

A trial has been rescheduled for July 9 in Judge Truman Roberts 52nd District Court in Comanche, same site of the originally slated suit.

The border discrepancy was discovered last year when the Clyde Independent School District levied taxes on land extending to the line Callahan County recognizes. A Coleman district also taxed the area, and the latter brought suit. Coleman contends that its line is the oldest and should be recognized, but Callahan insists that its survey is the one most generally in use. Taylor says that its border coordinates were made three years prior to Coleman's.

Bids Sought For New Burkett Water Plant

Bids for construction of a water system at Burkett are now being sought by the Burkett Water Supply Corporation. Cost of the project is expected to run about \$67,000.

Construction will begin early in July.

The water system, designed by Yeatts and Decker, Consulting Engineers of Abilene, will consist of a water treatment plant, a 50,000 gallon storage tank and a distribution system which will serve 51 water customers in Burkett initially.

The non-profit corporation will own the water project, and will be financed through a 40-year loan obtained through the

Farmers Home Administration. All customers of the corporation will be stock holders paying \$50 per share for their stock.

Water will be obtained from Pecan Bayou near Burkett, and treated at the proposed water treatment plant in Burkett.

The County FHA office in Coleman is headed by John H. Curry; C. K. Foster is the regional director. Members of the water board are Gilder Adams, president; Raymond Jennings, vice-president; L. D. Evans, secretary; Merrel Burkett and Carl Burns.

Woodward and Johnson of Coleman are the corporation attorneys.

Captain David Gray Cited For Heroism

Capt. David B. Gray, formerly of Cross Plains, who is currently assigned to duty at Fort Benning, Ga., has been awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross for action in Vietnam.

The military citation accompanying presentation of the medal read: "For heroism in connection with aerial operations against a hostile force: Captain David B. Gray distinguished himself by heroism while participating in aerial flight on 18 July 1964, in the Republic of Vietnam. On this date he was assigned the mission of visual reconnaissance of preplanned areas in order to confirm reports of Viet Cong activity. Upon arrival in the area he received heavy ground fire from insurgent forces. With complete disregard for his own personal safety he immediately volunteered to locate and attack enemy emplacements. Captain Gray pressed the attack until his ordnance was expended forcing him to return to base. Disregarding deadly capabilities of the enemy he refused to abort the mission and returned to the area of operations. Upon arrival in the same area his aircraft again received heavy fire from weapons concealed in a tree line and a machine gun aboard a sampan. He skillfully used superior flying techniques to avoid receiving disabling hits to his aircraft and continued making passes at the enemy positions until they were destroyed. Throughout this action Captain Gray's courage and devotion to duty were in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Army and reflect great credit upon himself and the military service."

Donald Crisp, a Life Scout, second highest rank a scout can attain, will take over the reins of the local Boy Scout troop Thursday night.

Housing Authority Planning Land Purchases Here Soon

"Purchasing of land for a 20-unit low-rent housing project in Cross Plains appears imminent," said Mrs. Gene Rhodes, executive director of the Public Housing Authority here.

She explained, "A few legal difficulties are yet to be cleared up, but we expect to buy the land in the near future." Two one-half block areas and one 90x100 foot plot is under option for sites of the proposed units. One half-block site and the 90x100 plot is in the downtown district on lots across the street east of Cromer Hotel and Williams Planning Mill and Callahan County Co-Op, respectively. Other half-block joins Colonial Oaks holdings on the north.

Fourteen units have been designated as housing for the elderly, and all these will be located in the downtown section. Six units have been classified as general and will be situated in the northern part of town.

Mrs. Rhodes and acting mayor Gerald Bowden were in Fort Worth Thursday where architectural plans for the local project were submitted to housing authority officials. "Some revision of the initial drafts were suggested and plans have been returned to the engineers in Houston," Mrs. Rhodes stated.

"No target date has been set for actual construction," Mrs. Rhodes explained, "but we hope it won't be long."

FRIENDS SEND HUGE LOG FOR FIREPLACE

Little Interest Shown In Street Paving Projects

"Little interest has been shown in paving of additional streets in Cross Plains," J. P. McCord, city council street commissioner, said yesterday.

In a meeting last month with members of the Cross Plains City Council, an Odessa paving firm offered to hard surface roads in the township and gave its prices. The council agreed to allow the contractors to enter into transactions with property owners here.

According to the proposition, owners of property on each side of the street would share paving costs and the city would pay for the paving of intersections where warranted. Approximate charge would be 50 cents per square foot, or for a 27 foot wide street, \$1.50 per lineal foot, divided equally by property owners. Surfacing would include a prime coat and two penetration coats.

Latest check, however, revealed very little interest in the project.

Repairs Continue

McCord also stated that repairs to city streets already blacktopped resumed Monday. Patching holes and side stripping of the hard-surfaced roads began two weeks ago, but wet weather forced postponement.

McCord opined that the job would be completed early this week.

Need Top Dressing

Doyle Cowan, city employee in charge of the street repairs, said, according to McCord, that the city pavement was in much worse condition this year than at any other time since it was initially paved in 1955.

"The black-top really needs a top dressing following patching," McCord stated. He continued, "A thin layer of asphalt is needed to protect the initial investment." He pointed out, however, that it would probably require property owners bordering the city pavement to agree to a cost sharing plan.

Special Mayor Election Scheduled Here Friday

Voters in Cross Plains will elect a mayor to serve for the next 10 months Friday in a special election.

Only two names are on the printed ballot, Doyle Burchfield, local accountant, drew the number one position, and C. H. Dawson, real estate dealer, is second.

Polls will open in the City Hall here at 8 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. Alton E. Hornsby will be election judge, and will be assisted by clerks, Mrs. W. F. Kilgore, Mrs. L. D. Koenig and Mrs. Chester Glover.

Ava Childers, city secretary, reported Tuesday afternoon that there had been only two absentee votes cast. Hornsby predicted a light vote.

The election became necessary when M. E. Roth resigned his mayor's post and moved to Lamesa. He had served slightly more than a year of the two-year term.

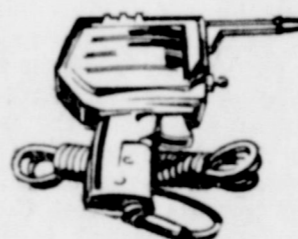
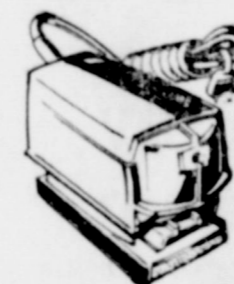
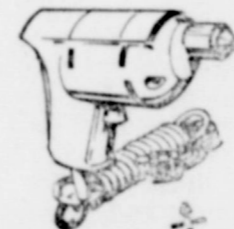

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON SEPTEMBER 7, 1965.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 44 proposing an Amendment to Sections 2 and 25 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to provide for an increase in the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members; to fix the membership in the House of Representatives at 150 members; to require apportionment of the Senate according to population; and to delete the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Sections 2 and 25 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read respectively as follows:

"Section 2. The Senate shall consist of 39 members. The House of Representatives shall consist of 150 members.

"Section 25. The state shall be divided into Senatorial Districts of contiguous territory according to population, as nearly as possible.

"Should the Legislature enact any enabling legislation in anticipation of this Amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature.

"This Amendment shall be-

come effective upon its adoption."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the 7th day of September, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment increasing the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members, retaining the present membership of the House of Representatives, requiring apportionment of the Senate according to population, and deleting the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment increasing the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members, retaining the present membership of the House of Representatives, requiring apportionment of the Senate according to population, and deleting the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

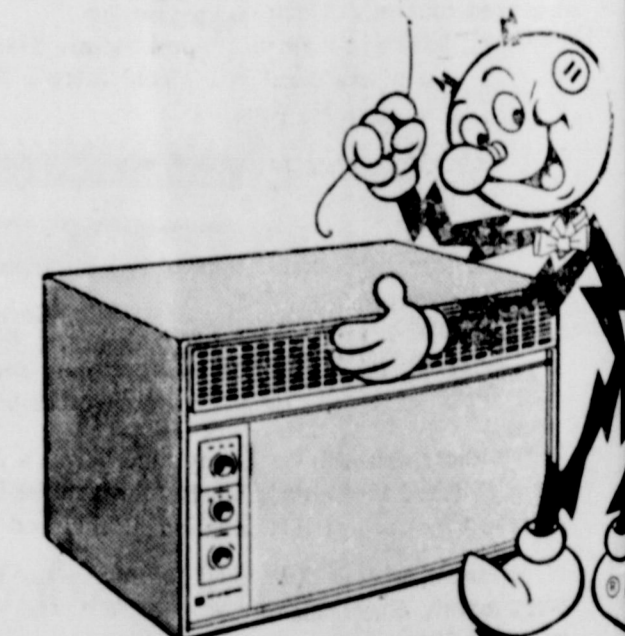

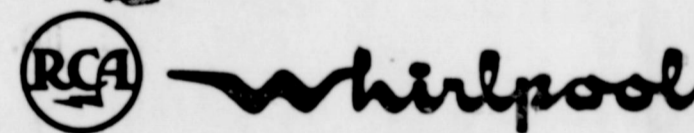

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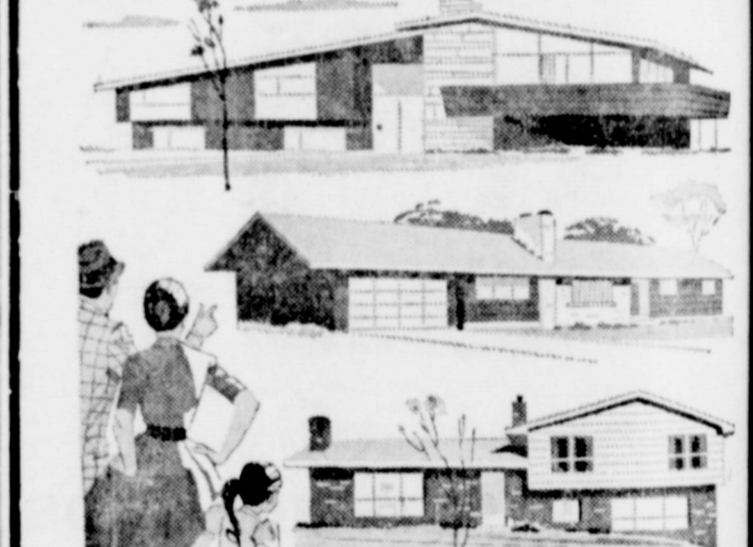
