City Faces Loss Of Cuke Packing Shed

Lack of facilities to accommodate migratory workers threatened probable loss of the local cucumber packing shed for Cross Plains late Tuesday night.

An offer tendered by the City of Rising Star to make available the school cafeteria or the American Legion building for meals, converting the market building there into a dormitory and rental of a bus to transport workers to and from fields appeared to be a lure that would go unmatched in Cross Plains.

To Tuesday at noon 96,000 pounds of cucumbers had been bought here, bringing in about \$3,000 for growers through seven days operation. The harvest is believed less than one-fourth completed, though, and later maturing cucumbers are reported to be of higher quality and are bringing more money.

Wayne Westerman and Horace King were in Rising Star all day Tuesday conferring with civic organizations there to work out adequate facilities

to keep the workers. It was pointed out that without laborers many thousand dollars would be lost.

Rising Star groups have also offered to build a loading ramp to facilitate truckers and packing shed workers, an addition lacking here.

Lack of adequate housing and eating facilities for the influx of cuke pickers promoted the suggested removal of the grading and packing facilities to Rising Star.

It has been reported that some acreage devoted to the crop has already been plowed up due to the lack of workers

It was believed in Cross Plains Tuesday afternoon, that the proposed move would be completed by Thursday. Reports from Rising Star yesterday were that plans were rapidly being put into operation for transfer of the equipment and landing of an expected 100 or more workers.

The local cucumber project is sponsored by the Dalton Pickle Company of Fort Worth, contractors for all local production. The equivalent of approximately 250 acres have been planted to the new crop in the area, primarily in the Cross Plains and Sabanno locality.

Eastland County Leads Oil Sales

Coleman County, where first oil in this area was discovered in 1902, continues to lead Callahan, Brown and Eastland in annual production.

Honor of yielding the most oil through the years, though, belongs to Eastland County, where first production was found in 1917. Although present annual production of Eastland is down to 585,000 barrels, the all-time production figure aggregates 119,265,000 barrels.

This datum, together with nearby counties, was released Monday by Texas Mid-Continent Oil and Gas Association. Excerpts from the report follow:

Callahan County: oil first discovered in 1923; present annual production 2,372,000 barrels, and total lifetime production 45,875,000 barrels.

Brown County: oil first discovered in 1917; present annual production 281,000 barrels, and total lifetime production, 40,027,000 barrels.

Coleman County: oil first discovered in 1902; present annual production 2,423,000 barrels, and total lifetime production 60,337,000 barrels.

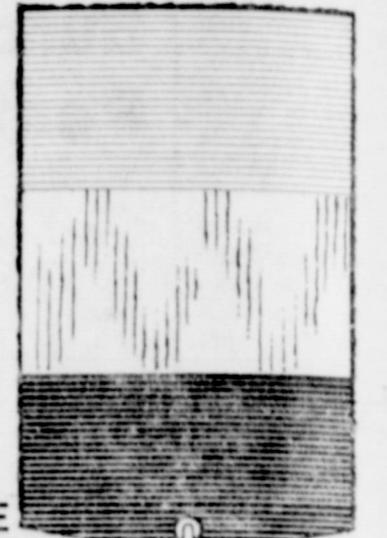

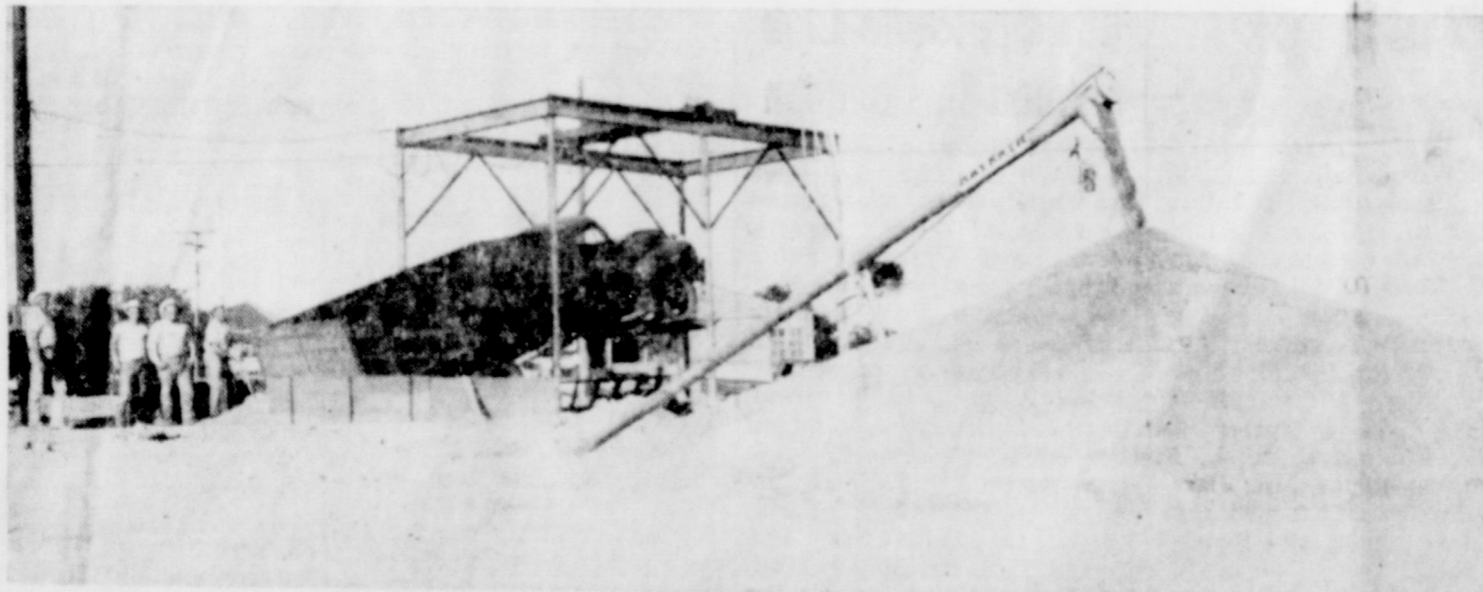

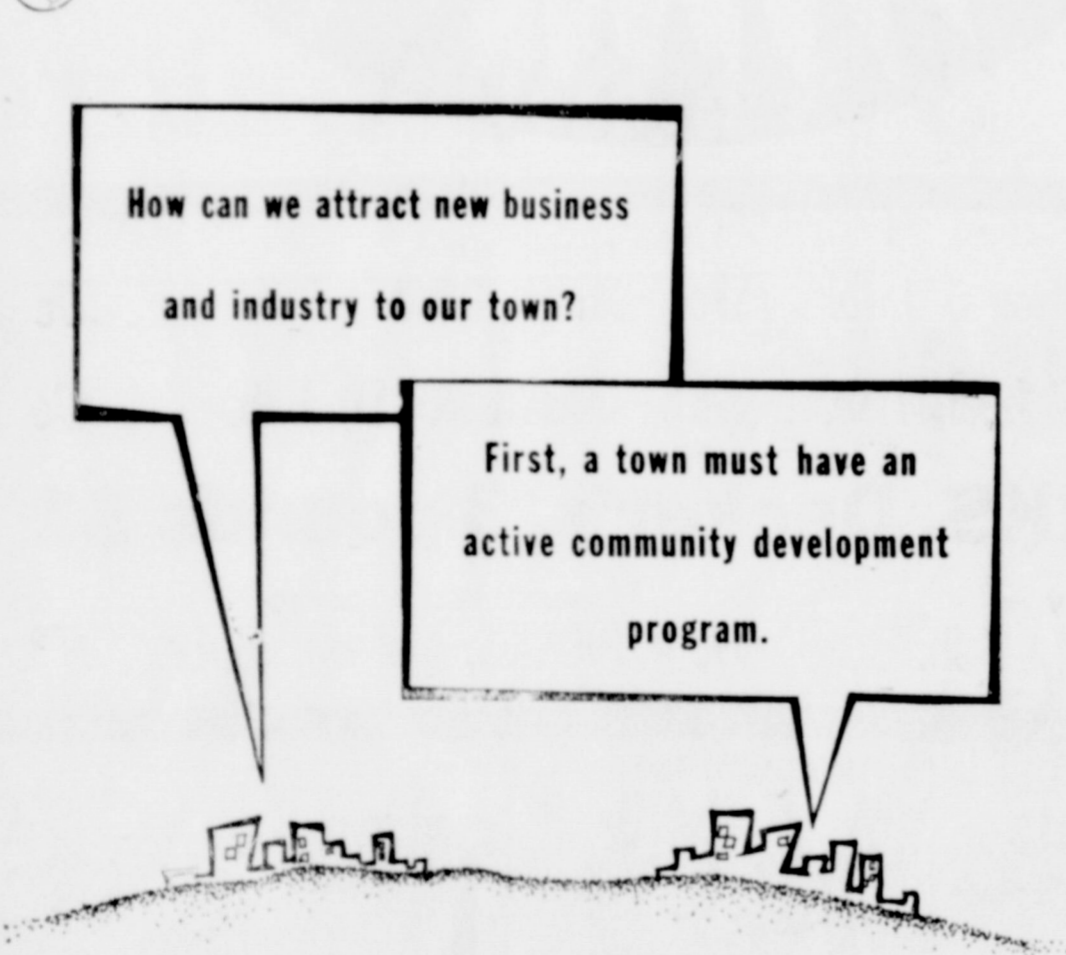

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON SEPTEMBER 7, 1965.
 SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 44 proposing an amendment to Sections 2 and 25 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to provide for an increase in the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members; to fix the membership in the House of Representatives at 50 members; to require apportionment of the Senate according to population; and to delete the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator.
 IT IS RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
 Section 1. That Sections 2 and 25 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read respectively as follows:
 "Section 2. The Senate shall consist of 39 members. The House of Representatives shall consist of 50 members.
 "Section 25. The state shall be divided into Senatorial Districts of contiguous territory according to population, as nearly as possible.
 "Should the Legislature enact any enabling legislation in anticipation of this Amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature.
 "This Amendment shall be-

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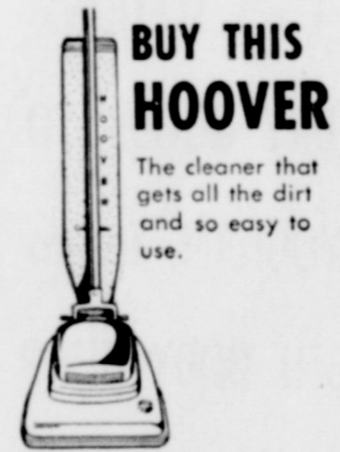
