

Local Schools Open Monday

22 Teachers And 475 Students Wait Class

Cross Plains schools will open Monday with enrollment estimated to be about the same as when school ended last Spring. During the last six week period local schools had an average daily attendance of 475.53.

High School Gains

Wayne Ford, principal, estimated that high school would gain about 25 students. He said the increase was due primarily to the small senior class of 1965 and a large freshman class this year. His estimate was for 178 students in high school this semester.

Ford reported that he had counseled with 135 students through Monday and expected 40 to 45 more. Arranging schedules thus far have been 31 seniors, 39 juniors, 31 sophomores and 34 freshmen.

Jack Watkins, elementary principal, said that the preliminary counts indicate a drop of 20 to 25 students in grade school. He said the incoming first graders number in the twenties, whereas last year's eighth grade had over 40 students.

Four teachers were cut from last year's staff due to about a 50-student drop in enrollment over 1963-64. Instructors were decreased from 26 to 22.

Quick Start

A full day of classes is planned for the initial day, Monday, according to Supt. Paul L. Whitton. He continued that high school students have been working on schedules the past week, and that the first day should go smoothly because of this.

Classes will begin each morning at 8:10 and will dismiss at 3:25 p.m. Daily sessions are divided into seven periods of about 55 minutes each.

Buses will run regular schedules and the lunchroom will be open. Meals will again cost 20 cents per day, according to Whitton. Elementary students will be served between 11 and 12 o'clock, and high school will eat beginning at 12:04. Two vacancies in the lunchroom staff are slated to be filled tonight. Whitton said yesterday. Present members are Mrs. Robert Brashear, Mrs. Doyle Cowan and Mrs. Herman Harris.

Twelve bus drivers will make initial runs Monday. They are

Either March 4 or 11 a day's recess will be called for the district teachers meeting, and two days will be taken for Easter, April 8 and 11.

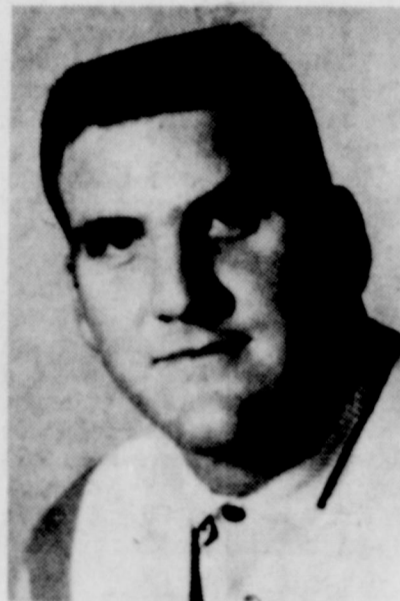
The show is produced by Harold Heath of Burkett, who produces many area rodeos.

The constitutional change to be voted upon is whether or not membership of the Texas Senate shall be raised from 31 to 39 members, retaining the present membership of the House of Representatives, requiring apportionment of the Senate according to population, and deleting the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator.

Polls for the election will open at 8 a.m. and close at 7 p.m.

Council Approves New Type Of Street Lights

Action was taken by the City Council recently calling for the installation of 19 additional mercury vapor street lights in the downtown district. Ten of the lights will be placed along State Highway 36, between the Dairy Bar and the Ira H. Hall home. Nine more will be added on Main Street, five between the T. Y. Woody Service Station property and the blinker light at the intersection of South Main and Highway 36, and four will be installed between the Church of

Christ and the turn on the pavement toward Cottonwood.

Plans call for the installation of new type fixtures on all street lights in the residential area. No action has yet been taken by the council determining whether this type light will be mercury vapor or the existing kind.

Installation of the illumination will be by West Texas Utilities and Bill Button, local manager, told members of the City Council that work will be started very soon.

100 Entries Expected At Horse Show Here

Cross Plains Riding Club will stage its final horse show of the year in the arena in the west part of town Saturday.

Alex Shocklee, president of the local organization, said, "We expect 100 or more entries for the any breed exhibition." Both pedigreed and non-registered horses are welcome and invited to participate.

Shocklee also stated that the show would be judged by a qualified out-of-town judge.

Three divisions of halter class competition will get underway at 9:30 Saturday morning with mares being judged first. Stallions will follow and judging of geldings will round out the morning show. First two events will have five classifications. They are divided by years beginning with 1965 foals and continuing through 1961 and before. Geldings are to be in three classes,

foaled in 1963 and later, 1961 and '62, and 1960 or before.

Ribbons will be presented through sixth place and rosettes will be awarded to grand and reserve champions of each division.

Performance events are scheduled to begin shortly after noon and continue to conclusion.

Three age brackets are included in the four performance class divisions. Groups are 12 years and under, age 13 through 19, and 19 and over. Divisions are western pleasure, reining, pole bending and barrel racing.

Ribbons will also be awarded through sixth place in this class and three high point trophies will be given, one to each age group.

Entry fee is \$3 per event in both halter and performance classes. Entries should be mailed to L. D. Koenig in Cross Plains.

Callahan Ranks 103rd County In Texas With Oil Production

Callahan County's producers and royalty owners are marketing some \$7.3 million in crude oil and natural gas a year, according to statistics released by Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association this week.

Ranking 103rd among Texas' oil and gas producing counties, Callahan in 1963 received some \$7 million from wellhead sales of oil and an estimated \$299,000 from natural gas. County production of oil was approximately 2.4 million barrels; natural gas, 2.4 billion cubic feet.

Farmers, ranchers and other mineral owners share in a \$918,000 distribution of oil and gas royalty payments annually.

The association based its annual study of this county's oil and gas output on statistics compiled by the U. S. Bureau of Mines for 1963. Production data for 1964 would be approximately the same.

Statewide, Texas oil and gas wells produced an estimated \$3.6 billion in income; \$2.9 billion from oil, \$730 million from gas.

Data from the Texas Employment Commission indicate direct employment in oil and gas industry jobs for more than 80 Callahan County citizens with a payroll of approximately \$349,000 a year. Because oil operations require such a large number of service contractors and supply firms, which are not included in this figure, direct employment figures are only part of the story of local economic impact.

An important indicator of activity is the amount expended on drilling of wildcat wells seeking new fields and those wells drilled to develop fields already located. The association estimates that in 1964 approximately \$2.5 million was

risked by Texas oil and gas operators on drilling ventures in Callahan County. About 46.9 per cent of this expenditure, or \$1.2 million, went into dry holes.

A tabulation by the Oil and Gas Journal shows 224 wells were drilled in the county in 1964: 77 oil, 8 gas, 105 dry holes, and 34 service wells. A total of 334,000 feet of hole was drilled — 239,000 for development wells and 95,000 for wildcats.

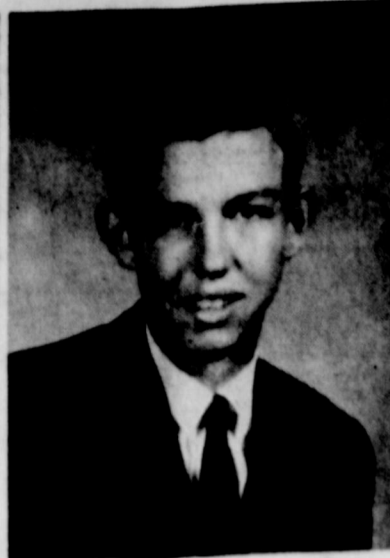

2 Victims Of Odd Mishaps Escape With Minor Injuries

Two persons were injured, neither believed serious, in separate and unusual accidents here last week.

First of the odd mishaps occurred Wednesday at approximately 10 p.m. six and one-half miles north of Cross Plains on State Highway 206.

Johnny Critendon of Austin was driving north on the road when he lost control of his vehicle and skidded off the road into a 10-foot deep livestock underpass on the Edwin Erwin farm in the Sabanno community.

Found Next Morning

That, in itself, was not unusual. But the accident was not

discovered until the following morning.

The crash was found by Mrs. Oscar Pierce and Mrs. R. G. Marsh of Cross Plains who immediately sought help from Truett Dawkins who lives nearby. He called a physician and ambulance.

According to reports of persons aiding, Critendon crawled from the wreckage and spent the night in the sandy bottom of the underpass.

Noise Heard

Two Sabanno citizens, Mrs. Edwin Erwin and Lester King who live close-by, heard a noise about the time of the crash, but thought little about

it. The car came to rest barely visible from the highway.

A local physician, who attended the victim, said that he believed Critendon to be only slightly injured, however, he was taken to an Abilene hospital.

Deputy Sheriff Howard Cox of Cross Plains and Highway Patrolman Jack Therwanger of Eastland investigated. No damage estimate was available.

Driverless Truck

Second of the odd mishaps happened about 7 a.m. Saturday morning in a field just north of the junction of farm roads from Cottonwood to Admiral and Putnam.

Aaron Wall, who listed his home as Bangs and who was drilling a water well on the Aaron Varner land, left his late model water truck parked on an incline while he went behind the vehicle to close a wire gate leading from the field into a pasture 30 yards west of the highway. The truck rolled back into Wall, knocking him down, and according to Dr. Carl J. Sohns who received a report Monday, fractured his pelvis. He was slated for release Wednesday or Thursday from an Abilene hospital where he was rushed by Higginbotham ambulance.

Crawls Into Vehicle

Wall crawled about 20 feet to his truck after the accident and sounded the vehicle's horn. Mrs. M. P. Wilcoxon, Sr., who lives nearby said at the scene that she thought she heard a horn about 7 o'clock, but thought it to be a neighbor calling cows.

Approximately an hour later W. T. Wilcoxon, who also abides nearby, heard the horn and Wall's cries for help. He rushed to M. P. Wilcoxon's house for help who in turn had to drive to another neighbor's, the Jack Smiths, to call for a doctor and ambulance.
