In the gelding division Johnny Poor of Abilene showed Rancher to the championship, and Mousiey, owned by Paula Wright of Cross Cut, claimed the reserve laurel.

Mollie Johnson of Abilene won the high point trophy in performance class of 12 and under. Her horse's name is Penny.

Kala Dillard's, Cross Plains, horse Junior was high point in the 13 through 19 bracket. Gerald Burns of Fort Worth rode the horse.

Mike Kelly of Cross Plains captured high point trophy for H. L. King atop April in the 19 and over class.

3-Night Rodeo Set Here On Week End

It will be rodeo time in Cross Plains this week end.

Thursday Cross Plains Riding Club opens its first annual rodeo which will run for three nights performances, Sept. 2, 3 and 4. Each show will begin at 8 p.m.

Ducats are priced at \$1 for adults and 50c for students.

Six events are on tap each night including bareback bronc riding, bull riding, calf roping,

girls barrel racing, team roping and a matched roping.

Harold Heath of Burkett will produce the show. Alex Shocklee, president of the local riding group, said yesterday that Heath has promised a string of exceptionally fine bucking stock for the wild west show. Heath has produced many area rodeos the past few years.

Matched Roping
Matched roping competition

has been slated featuring James Allen of Santa Anna and Tommy Penn of Mercury. "Both are outstanding ropers and ranchers," according to Shocklee, "and both are frequent rodeo contestants."

Each man will rope three calves each night, a total of nine for the show. Winner will be determined by low aggregate time of the nine catches.

Shocklee stated that entries are already coming in for all contests with bronc and bull riding heading the list. He said, "We expect most of them to come in Wednesday and Thursday."

Entry deadline is Thursday at noon. Registering and paying of fees may be done at the rodeo headquarters in the Dillard Drilling Co. building on west Highway 36.

Entry Fees
Shocklee listed the following fees for each division in the show. Both bronc and bull riders will get one ride for \$10 and calf roping is \$15 for two calves. Girls barrel racing stipend is \$5 for each race with three go arounds, and team roping fee is \$19 for two steers. Fees paid will go into a jackpot for each event.

Seating Available
In addition to the spacious parking area where the rodeo may be viewed from cars, Shocklee said that bleachers which will seat 400 to 450 persons have been placed at the arena.

Judges for all events of the show are to be E. G. Roby and Bernie Harpole of Cross Plains.

Parade Saturday
A street parade will be staged Saturday afternoon at 4:30 through downtown Cross Plains. The processional will form at the old ice house on South Main proceeding northward, then double back down the street and terminate near the Dairy Bar on West Highway 36.

First, second and third place trophies will be given out.

History Of Liberty Hill Praises Settlers' Faith

Editor's Note: The following is an excerpt from a letter delivered by Mrs. J. (Hettie) Lacy at the reunion of ex-students of Liberty Hill and Pioneer communities. Mrs. Lacy is a resident of the Liberty Hill and Cross Plains areas and presently lives in Dallas.

At one time it was a little village with a general mercantile store owned and operated by Tom Vestal, later by Ben Marshall and Calier Fore, a drug store, also Dr. E. Payne, two church buildings, a blacksmith shop, a gin and a school. This school was called Union Hill School.

"The first school building I remember was a little building on the southwest corner of the Jeff Westerman place about one and one-half miles northeast of the Liberty Cemetery. T. E. Lane was the last teacher who taught there. We remember him as the fellow walking all over the country spending nights with his pupils.

"There was a larger building built in about 1901 on the northwest corner of my dad's place one mile north of Liberty. The teachers I recall who taught there were: Mr. Moore, Zada Galbrieth, Katus Pierce, Veda Pierce, Mr. Smoot, Stella Sherris, Mr. Boatman, S. P. Collins, Jim Harris, Newtie Duke John Roach and Ella Duke. Then the district was divided and a school building was erected at Liberty across the road and south of the cemetery.

"Some of the teachers there were Carl Butler, May Butler, Ernest Pyle, Helen Tyler, Hazel Wigginton, Jessie Holbrook, Willie McDowell, Willis Conley, Mr. Myrick, Ella Lamotte, Ethel Brown and Emory (Pop) Lusk. The school was consolidated with Cross Plains in the mid-twenties.

"We look back on these days and call them the good old days, and yet we probably would not want them back; children walking two and three miles to school carrying lunch buckets with a cold biscuit and sausage sandwich, baked potato, boiled egg, a glass of syrup with a chunk of butter in it, maybe a sour pickle. It did not make much difference if you got the other fellow's dinner bucket; the contents were about the same. We could say with Will Rogers that we were not particular which side our bread was buttered on; we had to eat both sides.

"Now we have new patterns of behavior, new ideas of correction, and different kinds of law violations.

"There is nothing left at Liberty Hill but these memories, and the silent 'City of the Dead.'

I read this list of names of old settlers at Liberty and Pioneer people will be claiming some of them but I have news for you. We were ours first; you got second hand.

The list included: "Sump Bill Duke, Tom Vestal, Huntington, John Under-Sam Webb, Clay Cade, Wood, Sam Fleming, Hens, John Brown, John Elson Marshall, Jeff Westerman, Billy F. D. Lilly, O. H. Gibbs, Shirley, Jim Phillips, Will Strong, Harve Vestal, D. G. Harris, Calier Fore, Walker and Ech Hunt. Let us pause for a moment in silent memory of Ech's sons, Bon, Tom, Dutch and Charlie, all dead. These are boys we all love. There are only three of Huntington boys living, are Jake, who married beloved Estelle Fore, and two younger boys who grew up after they moved to Liberty to Plainview, and daughter, Zilla Blackburn.

The last but not least we have B. I. (Ben) Marshall. In a list of 30 names there are two living, Graves Harris 90 years old, and Ben who is almost 91. It is utterly impossible for me to over-estimate what Ben has meant to me. He was a friend. I know one who would class Ben as an enemy, but legions who love him. He placed himself before his job or his love him.

Liberty Hill was named by a Presbyterian minister who with other old timers to a brush arbor to hold a prayer under. His name was B. I. He lived at Sabanno, miles north of Liberty.


