Putnam Meets Novice On Grid Here Thursday Night

Cross Plains will not lack for football this week although the Buffaloes have an open date.

Putnam Panthers will furnish grid action at Buffalo Stadium Thursday night as they tangle with the Novice Hornets. Kick-off time is set for 8 p.m.

Tonight's game will differ from the fare local football fans are accustomed to seeing. It will be a six-man tilt.

Panthers Rebuilding

Putnam this year is rebuilding its football fortunes after posting a 1-7 record during last year's campaign. Six returning lettermen form the nucleus for the Panthers which is headed by three letter-earning backfield men. They are Bob and Johnny Isenhower and Roddy Reynolds. Although a shortage of players plagues Putnam, the

quality of the 11 Panthers is considered adequate for a successful season. Supt. W. R. Reynolds said yesterday that spirit was good and the boys were working hard, although getting started late.

The squad is coached by Warren R. Townley, Hardin-Simmons University, who played high school football at Paducah.

Putnam made its 1965 debut last week by hosting Divide at Baird. The Panthers fell 35-0 to the visitors, but Divide is considered one of the strongest six-man aggregations in this area. Supt. Reynolds added that while no excuses were being made, two of the varsity Panthers were slowed with injuries. "We believe that the boys will be in much better shape and afford more opposition this

week," Reynolds said.

Putnam displayed its grid talents here last in 1962. At that time the Panthers had just a couple of years before begun participating in football. That year was also the most successful year the Panthers have had on the gridiron. They were crowned district champs while going undefeated in regular season play. The Panthers fell, however, in a hard fought battle for the bi-district title.

In their appearance here the Panthers routed the Mozelle Mustangs 44-0.

A six-man contest is vastly different from an eleven man tilt. To begin with, the field is both shorter and narrower. A six-man playing surface is 80 yards long instead of 100, and is about 40 yards wide as compared to 53 on an 11-man team field. Fifteen yards is required for a first down and the game is frequently a free-scoring affair on both sides.

The game is scored somewhat differently too. A touchdown, made either by passing or running over the goal line, is six points, the same as in 11-man games. Extra point conversions, however, are just reversed. When the pigskin is kicked between the uprights it counts two points, and if the conversion is made by passing or running it counts only one point.

Herd Fells Santa Anna 20-0 In Retaining Perfect Record

Cross Plains Buffaloes crowded 20 points into the second half of Friday night's Santa Anna game while holding the Mountaineers scoreless, marking their second season win in as many games.

And while it's probably a little premature to mention it, this is the closest the Buffaloes have been to a district championship in several years (they're tied for first now). In fact, the thundering Herd, which has been living on past glory the last few years has yet to be even scored upon.

Friday's game must have been some kind of a record. The first half, Cross Plains ran only 16 plays and two of them were fumbles while another was a pass interception.

Butts only serious attempt at scoring came during the first series of downs when they plowed down to Santa Anna's three yard line. There a Bison pass was intercepted in the right flat and the Mountaineer squad moved its line of scrimmage to Cross Plains end of the field.

That about tells the first half story.

But when coach Gray took the boys to the bus during the half, something happened. His oratory must have been of a substance comparable to dressing room speeches delivered by Kunte Rockney himself, because when the Herd came back for the third quarter they looked more like the fiery bunch that stopped Early the week before.

Receiving the kickoff, Cross Plains started a drive that continued until it had produced six points for the Herd. Every inch was rolled up on the ground and the determined Buffalo bunch had to overcome effects of penalties, fumbles and setback enroute to paydirt.

Finally, with 4:07 remaining to be played in the third quarter, fullback Jim Brown, leading scorer and ground gainer this season, rambled around his own right end on a fourth down play, bounced off one

Mountaineer defender and found a clear field to touchdown territory.

James Switzer's extra point attempt was unsuccessful, and the score stood 6-0.

Butch Makuta, Santa Anna end, took the kickoff from Brown and eluded all Buff defenders downfield except Mike Ingram who eliminated him for the remainder of the quarter on the Mountaineer 38 yard line.

Santa Anna worked the ball to Cross Plains' 39 before a fumble recovered by Jerry Watson set up another Buffalo tally.

Cross Plains began its drive with only seconds remaining in the third quarter and finished in the final period with six minutes and eleven seconds remaining, after using the airways for 43 yards.

Buffalo backers watched Cross Plains land a first down and goal situation on the Mountaineer one yard line. Buffs hit the goal line defense three times, each time to no avail. But on the fourth try, the whole Cross Plains squad concentrated all its weight against the center spot and quarterback Joe Pierce pushed over to another score.

Switzer's barefooted kick for the extra point conversion was good and the clock gave visitors 13 points while the home side remained unlighted.

Buff's final scoring opportunity was landed by Jim Brown from a defensive position as he intercepted a pass from Mountaineer quarterback Lyndon Wells on Santa Anna's 38 yard line and returned it to the 16. Just one more play was needed to complete scoring.

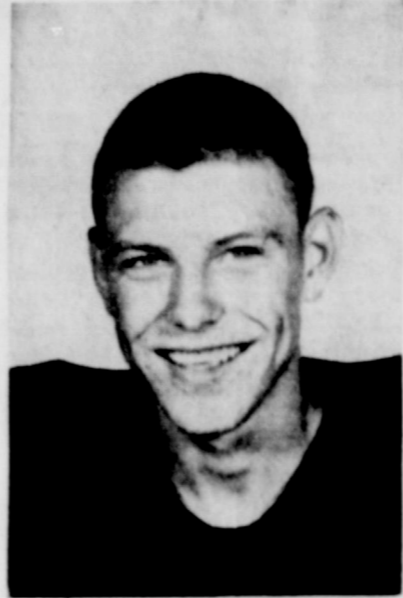
With three seconds remaining in the game, Pierce lobbed a pass to right end Mike Turner who snagged the heave in Santa Anna's end zone.

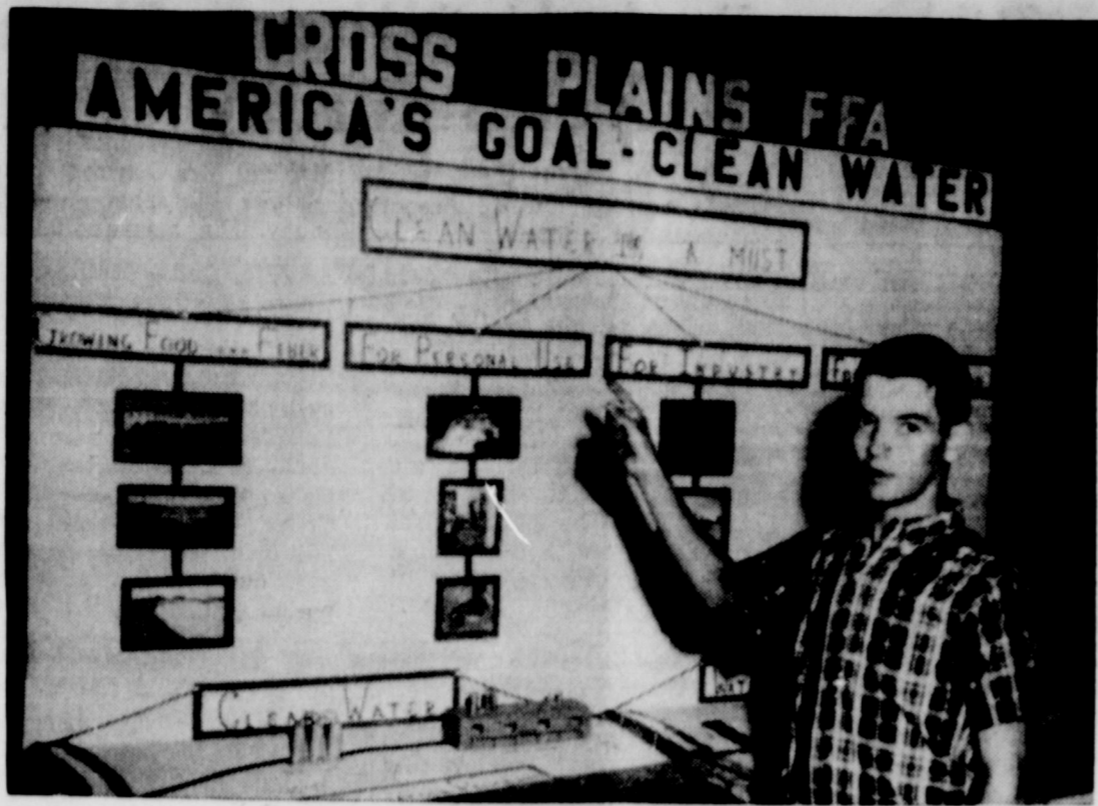

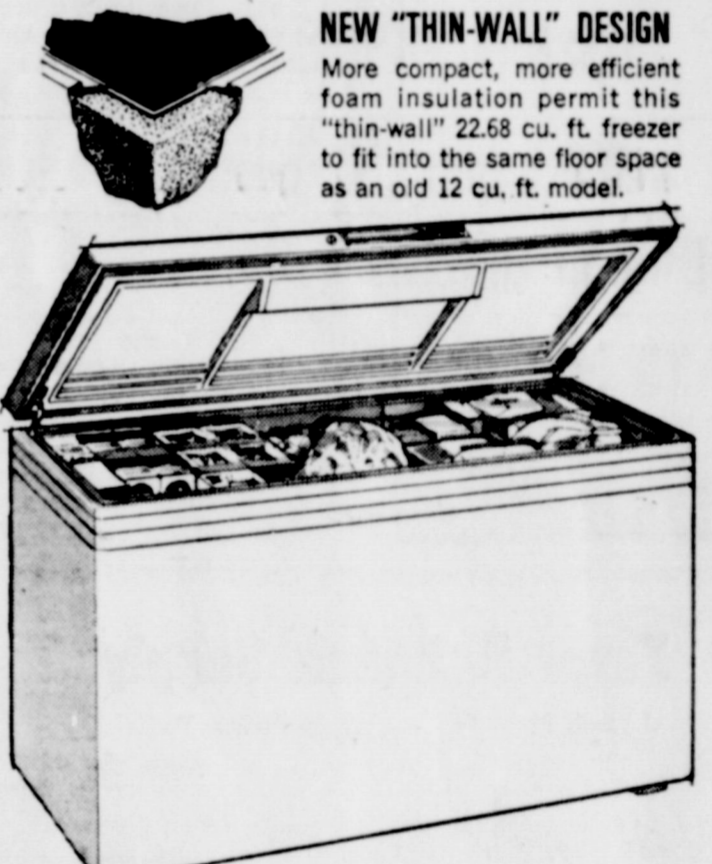

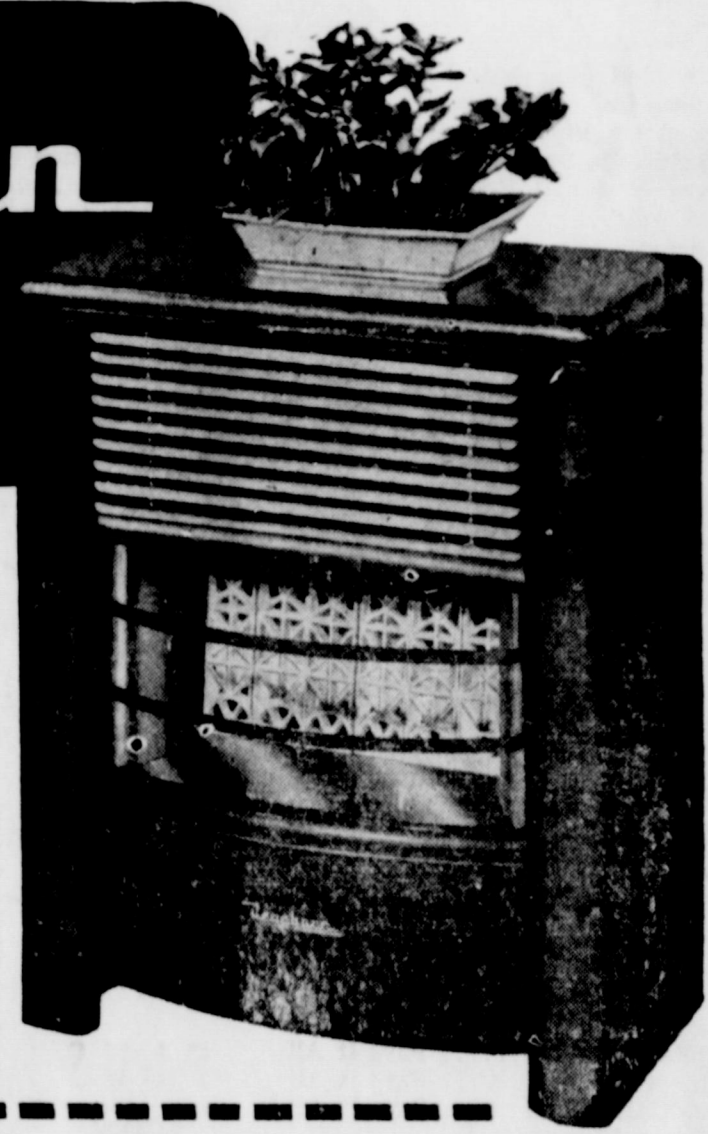
