## Court Convictions Go To 3 Scranton Youths

Three juveniles of the Scranton area were sentenced in hearings before Callahan County Judge Byron Richardson Monday at Baird.

A 16-year-old youth was sentenced to the State School for boys at Gatesville, and two other boys, ages 15 and 14, were placed on probation.

The boys reportedly stole gasoline from Bill Boland and gasoline, a battery and some

wrenches from a tractor owned by Gilmer Reese, both of the Scranton community. The thefts were reported Thursday of last week and Howard Cox, Cross Plains deputy sheriff, had the two older boys in custody Friday. Cox said that the battery and wrenches had been recovered.

Judge Richardson was to have transported the oldest youth to Gatesville first of the week.

## \$2,000 Goal Set For UF Drive Scheduled Oct. 28

Plans are being formulated for a United Fund drive to be held in the Cross Plains area, beginning Oct. 28, with Mrs. J. Peyton Smith as campaign chairman.

Goal of this year's undertaking will be \$2,000, says UF president Bill Button.

Budget for the ensuing year was worked out recently after UF directors had conferred with charitable and civic organizations regarding the need for funds. Of the \$2,000 to be raised, \$1,970 is budgeted, leaving only \$30 unallocated.

Mrs. Smith will announce a slate of women to assist in the upcoming drive and schedule a meeting of the group just prior to beginning the canvass. Appointed as her chief assistant was Mrs. Clyde D. Sims.

Button pointed out Tuesday that the upcoming drive is the first to be made in Cross Plains in three years. He expressed hope that the undertaking would be enthusiastically supported.

"This one drive is aimed to eliminate the frequent canvasses of the community for funds

for many worthwhile purposes," he said. "We feel that it is more businesslike and leads to systematic giving to do away with periodic solicitations and combine all charitable endeavors in one well-supported effort."

Major item on the budget for UF expenditures during the year ahead is \$600 to be contributed to West Texas Rehabilitation Center in Abilene. It is pointed out that this institution has treated — and is continuing to do so — scores of persons from this immediate locality. Second largest item on the new budget is \$400 to local and transient relief and Christmas cheer.

This fund is utilized to aid local and transients in distress and to provide foods for families in needy circumstances at Christmas time.

Other items of the budget are: Boy Scouts \$200, girls activities \$100, American Red Cross \$175, Salvation Army \$175, Gonzales Warm Springs Foundation \$100, cancer research \$200 and Texas Mental Health Association \$20.

## New-Crop Peanuts Rate Above Last Year's Mean

First peanuts to be dried and bought by Callahan County Co-operative in Cross Plains were well above the average of the 1964 crop.

James Oscar Koenig, local manager, said that up to noon Tuesday the local drier had processed 22, 262 pounds of nuts. Average grade was 70 and average price per ton was \$225, and according to Koenig, "Grade and price were both better than last year's mean."

J. H. Elam of the Scranton area delivered about 7,000 to

the local drier, but tests were not complete. First peanuts from this area were expected middle of the week. Eldridge Lawson was awaiting a thrasher to move his goobers into the drier here. Koenig said, "We expect them Wednesday."

R. D. Boland of Rising Star is temporarily handling grading chores at the local facility. He is associated with the Texas Federal Inspection Service. A permanent government employed grader is expected to be here by the end of the week.

Senior students of Cross Plains High School who are planning to go to college, and the parents of these students, will have an opportunity to meet and talk with representatives from various colleges at a College Night program at Abilene High School on Tuesday night, Oct. 19, at 7:30. Letters have been sent to the principals of high schools within a 50 mile radius of Abilene issuing an invitation to the college-

bound seniors and their parents to attend this meeting.

Representatives from 26 colleges, universities and junior colleges will participate in College Night. Each student and parent will have an opportunity to attend three different discussion groups to obtain information about the different colleges in which they are interested. The college representatives will discuss such matters as entrance requirements, application procedure, estimated yearly cost, courses of study or fields of specialization offered, type of housing available, financial aid and opportunities for social development.

College Night is being co-sponsored by the Parents Clubs of Abilene High School and Cooper High School for the purpose of giving area seniors and their parents the opportunity to secure first-hand information about colleges early in their senior year.

## Buffaloes Post Better Record But Attendance Down Slightly

Cross Plains High School football team has an improved won-lost record through the first five grid conflicts this year, but gate receipts are off slightly.

First half of the grid campaign in 1965 has netted \$1,426.55, whereas first five games in 1964 brought in \$1,572.71. The Thundering Herd owns a 3-2 record this year as compared to a 1-3-1 slate last season, but shows a \$146.16 decline in gate receipts. Receipts are up, however, over 1963's first five tilts by \$187.06 when the Buffs' share totaled \$1,239.41 in a winless campaign.

Largest single gate this season was at the Rising Star contest, \$810, of which the Bisons got half, \$405, after expenses. Small est was last week's game with Gorman when total receipts amounted to \$369.30.

## Patrolman Reveals List Of Common Traffic Violations

What is the most common traffic violations in and around Cross Plains?

State Highway Patrolman Bill Vineyard has for months been compiling a list of infractions

and this week reveals them in the order in which they were noticed.

He listed speeding too fast for driving conditions, even though under the legal limit, as well as over the limit, impeding traffic, failure to render right-of-way, running stop signs, turning from improper lanes, U turns in no-passing zones, turning without safety, following too closely, failure to stop for school buses, passing stopped school buses in excess of 10 miles per hour, failure to use directional signals, parking on roadways, double parking, driving without lights when required, failure to dim headlights for oncoming vehicles, failure to stop when coming out of alleys and private driveways, numerous infractions near fire-fighting equipment, throwing trash along right-of-ways, defective lighting equipment, no license-plate illumination, defective mufflers, and numerous parking violations.

## Single Sentence News Items

Stray cats are becoming a numerous in Cross Plains as homeless dogs were a few months ago. Average date of the first killing frost in this area each Autumn is Nov. 10.

Cross Plains Buffaloes have scored 106 points in the first five games, surpassing their entire output of last year. A hard-surfaced apron has been completed at the entrance of the local fire station. Although there are several potential oil-bearing formations of greater depth, no well of 4,500 feet has ever produced commercially in this locality. Installation of a new-type street lights is being completed in Cross Plains. The local school library contains 2,124 volumes. Glenn Lawrence will enter training soon to become a Texas Highway

Patrolman. Watches and clocks may vary but not Bailey Wilson; his mail runs to and from Cisco are exactly on schedule. Cutting down trees at the First Methodist Church here to get rid of sparrows has sent the birds to new roosting places in the south part of town. Survey work, preparatory to new construction, is now underway on the highway between here and Cross Cut. Stop signs were erected at all Main Street intersections this week. There are just about as many former school teachers in Cross Plains as there are current members of the local faculty. Less than 10 per cent of autos here bear new safety inspection stickers on their windshields. Steve Foster plans to become an industrial biologist after gradu-

ation from Howard Payne College. Clarence and Lester Bush are building an additional room and repainting a house for Mr. and Mrs. Bill Davee at Burkett. A check of newspapers for the past 12 months reveals that 243 local persons were hospitalized during that time. The Liberty community, seven miles northeast of here, used to be called Poker Hill and had its own horse race track. Tommy Porter, Amarillo newsman, has scheduled his vacation to be here Oct. 23 for the CPHS homecoming. Alton Tatom will retire from barbering the last of this month. Absentee voting on 10 proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution began Wednesday morning in the Callahan County Courthouse at Baird.

## Herd Gaffs Gorman By Six Tonchdowns, 40-8

Cross Plains Buffaloes went a long way Friday toward avenging their 40-point loss to De Leon the previous week in stopping Gorman's Panthers 40-8.

Gorman was awarded the offensive and returned the opening kickoff to their own 15 yard line. But three plays later it was still there. The Buffs returned the punt to their 45, and it was at this point that the game Friday night really "started."

Thirteen plays were needed, the Herd surviving one penalty, to move the ball to Gorman's one-yard line. With 4:30 remaining in the quarter, quarterback Joe Pierce fought his way through Panther defenders for the touchdown. Halfback James Switzer kicked the extra point.

Buff's changed the scoreboard again in the second period when Bo Strickland, halfback, raced 70 yards to score on the night's longest carry. The clock showed 6:08 left in the second frame when Switzer again converted the extra point.

Second half got underway with the kick to Cross Plains, taken by right halfback Jerry Strickland, who returned the ball to the Bison 29. Cross Plains used six plays to move the ball 70 yards to the Panther one yard line, where Bo Strickland again clicked for six points over the middle of the Gorman defense. And once more Switzer's attempt for the courtesy point was successful.

Gorman, moving from their own 24 yard line, kept the ball only three downs before a fourth down punt situation gave

Cross Plains offensive honors. That time Jerry Strickland turned the trick, shutting 39 yards through the center of the Panther secondary to score with 3:59 remaining in the third quarter.

Switzer's kick was wide to the left, and the score stood 27-0.

On first series of downs in the fourth period Gorman moved the line of scrimmage to within one foot of the Cross Plains goal, but the Buffalo defense held for downs and took over with an offensive effort that moved play to their own 30 before a fumble gave the Panthers another shot.

A passing attack fell flat, and Cross Plains pushed the visitors back five yards before taking over on downs.

On the first play from scrimmage Bo Strickland boosted his first scoring carry with a 65-yard trip for his third touchdown of the night, with

4:52 remaining to play in the final period. Switzer's try for the point was good.

Two minutes and forty seconds later the Herd struck again from 10 yards out, fullback Jim Brown doing the honors. Try for the extra point was unsuccessful.

With just a minute and a half left, Gorman left halfback Jackie Harrison completed a pass to quarterback Daryl Hirst who traveled 75 yards for the Panthers' single score of the game. Harrison followed up with the two-point conversion, which brought the final tally to 40-8, Cross Plains.
