

Vote Slated Tuesday For Peanuts, Cotton

Peanut and cotton farmers in Callahan County will leave their fields Tuesday to determine by ballot the type farm program they will be operating under for the next three years.

Peanut growers' referendum will be for price support, marketing quotas and acreage allotments for the next three crop years, 1966 through 1968. Cotton producers will be balloting on marketing quotas and whether or not cotton allotments will be sold or leased outside Callahan County.

Both peanut and cotton farmers will vote at the same place, and husband and wife are eligible to cast ballots in both referendums.

Voting Places

Five election boxes will be open in this county. Sites are as follows: Baird, ASCS office; Cross Plains, City Hall; Putnam, regular voting place; Oplin, school; and Clyde, Callahan County Cooperative. J. C. Earp, Jr., office manager for the county ASCS, said yesterday, "Due to the new provisions of the cotton program it is expected that the largest

turn-out in this county's history will be tabulated in Tuesday's vote."

Peanut Vote Important

According to Earp a large vote is also expected in the peanut referendum. He said that if approved, marketing quotas will be affective and price support available at approximately the same level as in the past. Earp added if peanut producers fail to approve marketing quotas Tuesday, the price supports to those growers planting within their allotments will be at 50 per cent of parity, or about \$112 per ton, instead of the present average of \$224 per ton.

Two-Thirds Majority

Cotton farmers will also be required to approve marketing quotas by a two-thirds majority or face loss of price support to 50 per cent of parity for those who plant within allotments for the 1966 crop. Earp pointed out, "In counties where the proposition does not carry by a two-thirds vote, the new program whereby producers may sell, lease, bank or buy cotton allotments will not be in effect."

Williams is charged with coaching boys and Jack Gray will tutor the Buffettes. Billy Pope is in charge of Junior High basketball.

The 4-H Club program will be explained by County Agent Pat C. Garner and slides shown. The program is said to consist of projects in the areas of agriculture and home economics. Some of them are: beef cattle, sheep, horses, foods, clothing, tractors, electricity and wildlife.

Other Callahan County communities with 4-H Clubs include: Clyde, Baird, Oplin and Putnam.

\$252,000 Peanut Crop Moving To Market Here

A total of \$252,000 worth of peanuts are expected to be marketed in Cross Plains from the current crop.

Harvesting was estimated two-thirds completed yesterday at noon.

Slightly more than 1,100 tons (raw weight) had been processed through drying facilities Monday night. The plant here resumed an around-the-clock schedule again Sunday night, following recent rains which had halted digging for about one week.

B. D. Montgomery, veteran

dealer in peanuts, opined yesterday that although yields are larger this year than last, the total tonnage handled here from the crop of 1965 will be very little more than that from the crop of '64.

Grades Better

Grades have been better this year, he pointed out, and cited several exceptional yields to substantiate the statement. Among the highest tested local peanuts were some brought in by J. R. Rector, Jr., who lives north of Pioneer. He had several loads to test 76. His average yield on one dryland field amounted to 56 bushels to the acre. Rector has a crop on the Beeler place, two miles west of Cross Plains, which is registered and certified for seed next year.

Peanuts coming the greatest distance for processing and marketing here were brought from growers at Anson and Carrollton.

A. L. Breeding, who lives between here and Cottonwood, is reporting around 40 bushels an acre from a dryland crop. Edwin Schaefer is reported to

have made about the same amount.

Montgomery said Monday that other local growers with real good yields included: the Rev. Tom Flippin at Pioneer, John Browning and Arnold Powers of Clyde, and W. B. Holcomb of Sabanno.

Installing Augur

There is expected to be no shortage of storage here for nuts held in government warehousing. An augur was being installed at the local plant Monday to move nuts directly from the dryer to a nearby warehouse. Dale Gary was contractor for the augur installation.

The crew employed at the dryer here presently includes: Montgomery, Truett Parsons, Jack Rector, John Purvis and Jessie Harris.

Cecil Carr of Rising Star is the government grader assigned here.

Explanation Given On Cotton Transfer Query

It has been announced by the county ASCS office that a meeting to explain the new cotton and wheat programs in detail will be held in Baird tonight, Thursday. The session will start at 7 p.m. in the 42nd District Courtroom in the courthouse.

Details regarding the transfer of upland cotton allotments were released this week by Tommie Harris of Cross Plains, chairman of the Callahan Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee.

The question which will permit transfer of allotments outside of the county but within the state will be voted on Tuesday in a cotton referendum on marketing quotas, but has no connection with the latter.

Question concerning permit of out-of-county transfers of allotments will be decided by the vote within each county, but marketing quotas will apply to the 1966 crop and will be decided on a national basis.

Decision in the referendum next Tuesday will decide only

the question of whether to permit transfers outside the particular county, but within the state. If approved by two-thirds of the growers voting, transfers may be made out of the county for the next three years. In no case, however, can transfers be made outside the state.

Harris said that if Callahan farmers veto the proposed change of allotments, another referendum will be held next year.

Farm legislation enacted this year concerning transfers of cotton allotments will not be affected by the outcome of the referendum vote. They are: transfers from farm to farm in the same county by sales or lease and transfers from one farm to another across county lines but owned by the same person.

Marketing penalties will be in effect to all excess cotton produced if the referendum is sanctioned. Export market reserve acreage would also be available, under a quota program, for growers who wish to grow cotton for export only without government payment or price support.
