## Farmers Co-Op Here Sold To McClung And Winfrey

Negotiations are now being completed for purchase of Callahan County Farmers Cooperative's holdings in Cross Plains by Luther McClung of Abilene, prominent Texas oil operator, and Glenn Winfrey, who resides between here and Rising Star.

Agreements were reached and preliminary contracts were drawn Saturday. Final papers are now in the hands of attorneys and are expected to be finalized in a few days. The new owners have already assumed management of the business, now operated as Cross Plains Grain & Peanut Co.

McClung and Winfrey have announced plans to double peanut and grain storage and to enlarge the peanut drying plant before another harvest.

"We intend to have in Cross Plains the most modern and complete facilities obtainable for the handling of these two crops which mean so much to local economy," said McClung speaking for the partners.

It was also pointed out that the firm's inventory of fertilizers, seeds, mixed feeds and other farm and ranch supplies will be enlarged to accommodate local producers.

Neither McClung nor Winfrey are new-comers to this type of business. Although primarily an oil producer, who entered that business during the East Texas boom of the early 1930's, McClung has always maintained a close affinity with the land. He owns a sizeable ranch east of Rising Star and raises purebred cattle. McClung was already well known in the Cross Plains area, having owned and operated oil properties in this immediate locality for a number of years.

Winfrey, who with his wife Peggy, will devote full time to operation of the business, has for a number of years operated grain, peanut and cotton harvesting equipment over Texas and adjacent states. He is described as a young man with a well-rounded knowledge of the agricultural industry.

"There will be no curtailment of services formerly offered in Cross Plains by our successors," Winfrey said; "on the contrary we hope to enlarge and expand the operation and offer a greater diversification of services and merchandise."

Enlargement of storage facilities for 1966 grain and peanut crops will get underway just as soon as the present rush season is passed, the Review was told.

## 1,396 Countians Face Decision On Medicare

More than 1,396 persons over 65 in Callahan County have a decision to make before March 31, 1966, relative to something new under social security — Medicare. Only about half of them have already done so.

This new program offers extensive hospital and health insurance to most all persons over 65. At the present time even those who have never worked under social security may qualify for this protection.

Even those who are still working and are not eligible for the monthly cash payments may qualify.

R. R. Tuley, Jr., Abilene Social Security District Manager, stressed the fact that all persons over 65, or who will be this year, need to contact their social security office now if they are not receiving social security, railroad retirement, civil service retirement, or old-age assistance.

## John Pruet Replacing Bill Button As WTU Manager

Following transfer of W. H. (Bill) Button, John Pruet of Rising Star has assumed duties as local manager for West Texas Utilities Company in Cross Plains.

E. D. (Gene) Rhodes of Cross Plains has replaced Pruet as local manager in Rising Star, and Billy Wright of Abilene has replaced Rhodes as serviceman here. Following retirement of Earl Hughes, Button will assume duties as WTU manager in Merkel on Jan. 1.

Before his transfer to Rising Star in 1961, Pruet had been employed in Cross Plains by WTU for 10 years as a serviceman. His 18 years of service with WTU began in 1947 when he joined the company as a serviceman in Cisco. The following year he was transferred to Rising Star as a lineman-serviceman, and two years later he began his 10 years of service in Cross Plains. He has been local manager in Rising Star the past four years.

Born in Putnam in 1924, Pruet attended the Putnam schools and graduated from there in 1942. He attended Cisco Junior College one and one-half years. He served two and one-half years in the Air Force in World War II in the ETO and was awarded the Air Medal with five Oak Leaf Clusters and the Distinguished Flying Cross.

In 1945 he married Naomi Pinnell of Moran. Their son

Mike is a freshman student at Tarleton State College.

A community leader in both Rising Star and Cross Plains, Pruet is a past master of the Masonic Lodge in Cross Plains and past patron of the Cross Plains O.E.S.

He served as president of the Rising Star Chamber of Commerce for two years, was president of the Band Boosters Club in 1963-64, and was awarded the Citizens Award by the Rising Star Chamber of Commerce in 1964. While living in Cross Plains, he was named recipient of the Cross Plains Citizens award in 1957.

### Rhodes To Rising Star

The new Rising Star local manager was employed by WTU in 1952 in the transmission department in Abilene and was transferred to Cross Plains the following year as a serviceman.

Born in Crosbyton in 1922, Rhodes spent his early life in Cross Plains and attended public school here. He worked in the copper mines in Arizona before joining the Navy in 1942 for service in two theatres in World War II. Following his discharge in 1946, he returned to Arizona, where he worked until he came to Cross Plains.

Mrs. Rhodes, the former Charlene Smith of Cross Plains, is employed by the PHA in Cross Plains. They were married in 1946 and have three sons. The twins, Ronnie and Donnie, are seniors and are out-

standing players on the Cross Plains football team. Ronnie was the starting center; Donnie was a starting tackle, and a younger son, Mike, a freshman student, was the other starting tackle.

He served as manager of a Little League baseball club for four years, has been a member of the Masonic Lodge for 10 years, and served as president of the Band Boosters Club in 1963-64.

Billy Wright, who was transferred from Abilene to Cross Plains in November, is well-known in this area and worked in the WTU service department in Cross Plains in 1952 before joining the army for service in Korea.

Born in Ballinger in 1932, Wright spent his early life in Cross Plains and graduated from Cross Plains High School in 1950. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Everett Wright.

The new Cross Plains serviceman was employed by the company in 1952 and worked in Abilene four months before his transfer to Cross Plains in April. He was called for active duty with the army in November 1952 and was discharged in December 1954. He has been employed in the service department in Abilene for the past 11 years.

The Wrights have two children, Paul Dean, 10; and Beverly, 7. They are members of the Baptist Church.

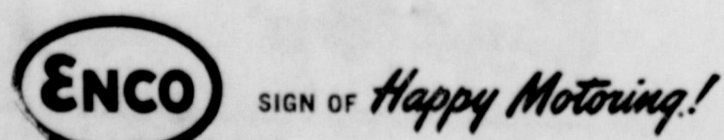

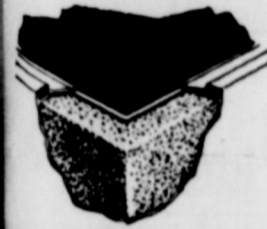

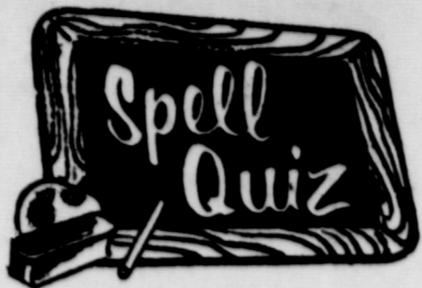
